Caz Matthews spent 22 years with the Indianapolis based WellPoint, Inc. and its predecessor companies, joining the company in 1988 as the Manager of Accounting Systems and Payroll. In her last role with the company, from September, 2006 until her retirement in October, 2009, she served as the President of the WellPoint Foundation. Her responsibilities included all corporate social responsibility overseeing company-wide sustainability, volunteerism, and philanthropy initiatives. Prior to the Foundation position, from December, 2004 to September, 2006, Caz held the position of President, Blue Cross Blue Shield of Georgia, a \$3 billion revenues and 3,000 employee plan. That role was preceded by her five year position from January, 2000 to December, 2004 as President of the Anthem Blue Cross and Blue Shield Plans in Colorado and Nevada, organizations with combined revenues of \$1.5 billion and 1,500 employees. Her intervening WellPoint roles were in various executive positions in Finance, Operations and Information Technology, including a one year assignment as the acting Chief Information Officer. Prior to joining WellPoint, Caz spent her early career years with Price Waterhouse and the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation (Freddie Mac) in Washington D.C.

Caz completed her undergraduate degree in Accounting and Financial Management from Sheffield University, Yorkshire, England in 1982, earning the University Award for Accounting, and received her M.B.A from Indiana University in 1992.

Caz relocated six times during her professional career, two times to Denver. While in Colorado the first time, Caz served on the Mile High United Way Board of Trustees and was the founding volunteer chair of Women's Leadership Council, to promote women's philanthropic leadership. In 2004, she created the Matthews Match Fund to encourage women's philanthropy through Mile High United Way. She also served as a board member of the Denver Metro Chamber of Commerce, the Downtown Denver Partnership, the Colorado Association of Health Plans, the University of Colorado at Denver and Health Sciences Center School of Business, and the Colorado Association of Commerce and Industry. During these years, she was an active member of the Colorado Forum and the Metro Denver Economic Development Council. After her move to Atlanta at the end of 2004, Caz joined the Atlanta Chamber of Commerce board, the Georgia Chamber of Commerce, and was a member of the Mayor's Health Care Task Force until she returned to Denver in September, 2006.

Caz served for six years on the Board of Directors and the Audit Committee of Qwest Communications, the publicly traded communications company headquartered in Denver until its sale to CenturyLink in April, 2011 and served for one year on the Board of Directors of Perot Systems, a publicly traded systems company headquartered in Dallas until its sale to Dell in December, 2010. For the last five years, Caz has also served on the Board of Directors of Denver

Health and Hospital Authority (DHHA), Denver's safety net hospital, a position to which she was appointed in 2007 by then Mayor, now Governor Hickenlooper. Caz serves on the Executive Committee, co-chairs the Finance Committee, and participates on the Business Development Committee for DHHA. In 2011, she was elected to a three year term on the Colorado Hospital Association Board. Committed to remaining current on broad based health care issues, Caz continues to participate actively as a member of the Colorado Forum, a statewide business CEO think tank and policy advocacy group and serves on that organization's Health Care Committee. She has also previously served as a member of the Philanthropy Committee for The Colorado Health Foundation and as a member of the Governor's 2010/2011 Health Care Transition Committee.

Caz has received several business and community awards, including the "Outstanding Businesswoman Award" in 2002 from the Denver Business Journal, the "Frances Wisebart Jacobs Award for Philanthropy" in 2004 from Mile High United Way, and the "CEO of the Year Award" in 2004 from the Denver Business Journal. In 2006, she was selected as a "Business Diva of the Year" by Atlanta's BIZ magazine. Profiles in Diversity Journal named Caz to its list of "Women Worth Watching In 2009". Caz was awarded the Colorado Women's Chamber of Commerce "Athena Award" for excellence, business leadership and community service in 2009 and in 2011, received the "Maverick Thinkers Award" for pioneering leadership from Urban Peak, a non-profit organization in Denver that serves the city's 1,200 homeless youth.
