Mayor Johnston's Citywide Goals


Roads to Recovery is a mayoral initiative designed to support people involved in the criminal justice system who are struggling with addiction and mental health.

It is one of two strategies under the **Safe Denver** 2024 citywide goal.



The Problem: Current Cycle

Many people struggling with addiction or mental health end up locked in a cycle of arrests and incarceration, often for low-level crimes like trespassing and drug possession.




The Problem: Care Navigation Long-Term Stability While many are Short-Term connected to care, the Housing system is fragmented Resource (30 and difficult to navigate, Day Wait) Provider placing a burden on those Provider (30 Long-Term (30 Days) Day Wait) Housing in need. Confusion and gaps in care often result Resource in people falling back into (60 Days) Provider the cycle and having to (15 Days) Resource (45 start over. Day Wait) **Criminal Justice System** Start Over: Arrest, Court, Jail

The Solution: Roads to Recovery

Instead, we lift people out of that cycle before additional contact with the criminal justice system, or by leveraging traditional criminal justice system contacts.

People struggling with addiction or mental health enter a coordinated, high-touch system for immediate intervention, treatment, and rehabilitation.



Roads to Recovery Strategies

Pilot

Focused on high jail-utilizers, many of whom have an underlying mental health or substance use condition.

Diversions

Create diversion pathways at each possible step of the criminal justice system: pre-booking (deflection), court diversion, and upon release from jail.

Appropriate care

Provide a menu of options to ensure the appropriate care for each participant.

Direct Access

Move away from a referral-based system towards near-immediate access to care.

Long-Term Care Navigation


Support participants continuously as they navigate their path through mental health and addiction.

Current Progress

DPD Crisis Services Team, DSD Crisis Response Team, and Dept. of Safety are leading outreach.

As of June 28, 2024:

- 132 people contacted by the program
- 88 people currently engaging
- 49 connected to services



Goals and Metrics



Primary Goal: Move 200 people struggling with addiction or mental health out of the criminal justice system and into a coordinated intervention, treatment, and rehabilitation pipeline by December 31, 2024.

Out of Criminal Justice System

- Total number of arrests and bookings
- Time between arrests
- Number of jail bed days
- Type of arrests

Into Treatment & Services

- Ability to access services within 48 hrs. of contact and willingness to accept services
- Engaged in case management and one additional intervention/ service
- Engaged in MAT treatment
- Successfully completed treatment

Reentry

 Release from jail to services or treatment, not the streets

Wellbeing

Self-reported changes to wellbeing


Provider Partners

Engagement

- More than 20 individual meetings with providers
- Kick-off meeting (40+ attendees)
- Quarterly provider meetings began June 21, 2024
- Provider survey (31 respondents)

New Paid Provider Partners

- Reciprocity Collective (Case Mgmt)
- Authentic Recovery Homes (Low-Barrier Residential)



Project Funding



Funding Strategy: Short- and long-term funding plans include leveraging support from existing programs, shifting resources from partner agencies where feasible, and applying for grants.

- Substance Use Navigators (SUN)
- Co-Responder Outreach Case Coordinators (OCC)
- Behavioral Health Solutions Center
- DSD Crisis Response Team (CRT)

- Denver Dept. of Public Heath and Environment (DDPHE) general fund offset

Grants Timeline and Progress

- State opioid grant submitted (funding announcements in August)
- DOAC funding request submitted (early July)
- On priority list for 2025 Federal Earmark grant
- Fines committee funding request (early July)
