What skills do you bring to the Mayor's Youth Commission?

Collaboration — It takes a village! The youth I work with are like my second family. I love connecting with others who are passionate about working with youth and seeing them thrive. The staff at the Bridge Project are so caring and compassionate that it makes my job easy knowing the youth are always in good hands.

Building Relationships — I feel this is one of my biggest strengths. It is the reason I have been with Bridge for 7 years. I value every single relationship I have made with the youth and young adults I work with. I couldn't imagine being anywhere else. Building strong positive relationships is the foundation of trust especially for a young person. If they do not trust you they want nothing to do with you.

Forward Thinking — "Be the change you wish to see in the world" One of the youth I work with just recently reminded me of the quote and It is very fitting with the work they are doing. Particularly with what the country is currently going through the youth are so determined to see and make changes. I feel I can be that catalyst to propel them forward.

Work/Extracurricular/Volunteer Activities - Indicate past or present

I currently work as the Youth Voice Coordinator for The Bridge Project. The mission of the Bridge Project is to provide a path for youth in Denver's public housing neighborhoods to graduate from high school and go on to attend college or choose a vocation by engaging them in educational opportunities and facilitating the development of life skills and self-sufficiency. I specifically work with our middle school youth around the YELL (Youth Engaged in Leadership and Learning) curriculum. The YELL curriculum is truly youth led and gives the students the opportunity to work on projects affecting their communities.

Along with the YELL group of students I oversee an 8-member Youth Action Board (YAB). The YAB is comprised of 2 students from each Bridge location. We meet monthly to go over what each YELL group is working on and how and where we can present our final project within the community. The YAB students also analyze data collected within the Bridge Project to understand what students want and will then make recommendations to appropriate staff. The YAB students plan a yearly Youth Leadership Summit to invite other youth around the community to share what they are working on. The second annual Youth Leadership Summit will be held in August at the Graduate School of Social Work.

Since working for the Bridge Project for the last 7 years I have continued to grow my network. In 2012 I joined the Rocky Mountain Society for Adolescent Health and Medicine Board of Directors. I held the President position for 2 years and remain a current Board member.

Please explain why you want to be a part of the Denver's Youth Commission (MYC). What unique perspective will you bring the MYC?

I was inclined to apply because one of the youth I currently work with (Elvis Daboni) on the Youth Action Board was interested in applying. Should Elvis and I both be accepted I think we can bring a positive perspective of how youth and adults work together. I have known Elvis for 7 years and have seen the extraordinary commitment he has to his family, friends, community and The Bridge Project. I have been so impressed working with Elvis over the years. 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I remember growing up in a world where there was no anxiety or fear. I lived every day to hang out with my father. An immigrant from Mexico who had a dream to send back home all the money he earned despite his new wife and daughter, me. That did not last very long as my mother was strong and willing to work hard to build their dream but not so willing to give up her hard-earned money. By the time I was fifteen years old, I was hiring and firing employees. I bought inventory, paid my parents mortgage and more exciting to me, negotiated business deals. At the young age of eighteen, I became an entrepreneur. I thought I was on top of the world. Then in my mid to late twenties, right on target with research, my brain matured. What I thought was a good life soon became boring and distasteful. I was not maximizing my full potential. My travels pushed me away from conforming to my California norm and my curiosity for the diversity in people made me seek more.

One day, after birthing two children and one divorce, I decided to move to Vancouver, Washington. I left my business, family and friends in search of me. Turns out all I needed was some time to reflect. It was there where I earned a B.S in Psychology and a minor in Criminology. Soon my interest took me to work with at risk youth through the juvenile justice system, sex offenders through the department of corrections, domestic violence survivors through the YWCA whose mission is to eliminate racism and empower women. I wanted more! So, I moved to Denver where I earned a Master's of Social Work from the University of Denver.

Hello. My name is Gladys Villa. I am a licensed clinical social worker that lives every day to educate and empower individuals to discover that life can be different. Over the past ten years, I have helped youth and families build resiliency skills through education, resourcing, therapeutic techniques, program development and research. My favorite part of my work day is teaching families how to communicate with each other as it improves family dynamics and generalizes into everyday living. It is important that our youth be empowered to advocate for themselves and for their community to build healthy strong connections.

My goal as part of the Mayor's Youth Commission (MYI) is to expand and share my skills to implement macro level interventions that specifically target resiliency building in youth and families. It is proven research and I whole heartedly believe in the power of resiliency as it is the foundation for meaning and thus motivating the desire to live. I believe it's important to pay it forward as homage to some of the mentors I encountered when I was younger – coaches, teachers, older students, etc. I certainly did not go it alone and I would expect that the selected Youth could certainly use someone to help guide them through their many endeavors.

I also think it's important that an Adult Commissioner be someone who is gainfully employed to lead as an example and to demonstrate to the Youth that, no matter your background, any sort of ambition can lead to a fulfilling life. Growing up, money was always a concern in my household, yet, as cliché as it sounds, I knew that education could provide for upward mobility. I was ambitious enough to set certain goals and, fortunately, things worked out. While that is certainly great for me, what is sometimes lost in the shuffle is the message that a traditional education is the *only* means toward a fulfilling life. I think it's important to stress that we are all different thinkers with varied backgrounds and that there is no one magic pill that gets you through life. It's important that the Youth recognize that, as you get older, priorities will change and your ability to overcome obstacles will be likely your greatest strength. I am just one example of a certain trajectory and I hope that I can demonstrate that determination and hard work is invaluable.

What prominent issue(s) that affect youth, would you like to address as part of the Mayor's Youth Commission?

This can be better answered by the youth themselves, not some yuppie 29 year-old who isn't originally from Denver. But in my experience, there is always a need to stress the importance of civic engagement, especially in today's tense climate. We need to find a way to make the Youth care about bringing their communities together, rather than alienating one another. I think a situation particularly unique to Denver is the displacement of families who are being priced out of their homes. I'm curious to see what the Youth think about that.

Moreover, a related issue that I think future generations need to be prepared for is a changing workplace that relies heavily on technology and automation. Are the Youth equipped to deal with that changing dynamic? Do they take an interest in how the workplace is evolving? Do they think about how to be proactive, rather than reactive in regards to the workplace evolution?

Please explain why you want to be a part of the Denver Mayor's Youth Commission (MYC). What unique perspective will you bring the MYC?

The Mayor's Youth Commission is an incredible example of civic engagement and collaboration between local government and the people we serve. Mayor Hancock's commitment to young people in our community is fantastic, and by calling upon the youth themselves to determine priorities and empowering them to hold those priorities among this group and their peers ensure that change is reflective of the needs of the community and will be championed by the people the change effects.

Working in Youth Services, I interact with many young people who are disenfranchised and don't feel that they "belong" anywhere. They face countless obstacles and often lack the support and resources to be successful. As I examine the priorities laid out by the Mayor's Youth Commission, I recognize issues that impact the youth I work with at a disproportional level. I have the ability to bring the perspective of many young people not involved in these conversations and create space for the youth commissioners to understand the obstacles preventing many involved in child welfare from being successful in their teen years. While there are many adults invested in addressing systemic barriers that influence opportunities and outcomes for children and youth, I believe that empowering young people to engage in the dialogue and shape the movement is an intentional and necessary element of creating a more equitable future for the youth of Denver.

What prominent issue(s) that affect youth, would you like to address as part of the Mayor's Youth Commission?

Mental illness is one of the most prevalent issues in America and with 1 in 5 children living with a serious mental health condition, it is vital that youth understand how to destigmatize mental illness among themselves and their peers, and advocate for better and more readily available resources. It is exciting that the Mayor's Youth Commission has already made this a priority and I believe that my involvement, as a professional with a background in psychology as well as a Youth Mental Health First Aid trainer, can provide valuable insight and direction to continue this mission. Through addressing issues of mental health, we are also able to bring light to groups most affected by these issues, like LGBTQ youth and people of color, who are so often left out of the conversation.

In addressing mental illness, we can also explore the ideas of wellness and what components need to be in place for an individual, child, youth or adult, to be well. Things such as equality in education, access to basic needs resources, positive community role models, and job training and opportunities all influence a person's wellbeing and should be discussed as we attempt to strengthen our community's response to mental health. It is important that young people understand the social determinants of health, especially as they relate to mental health, because these young people will have the ability to influence a shift in values and priorities as they move through the world, armed with the understanding that there are many ways to work towards equity and social justice.

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Please explain why you want to be a part of the Denver Mayor's Youth Commission (MYC). What unique perspective will you bring the MYC?

Throughout my childhood, both of my parents have been involved with reforming public education in Colorado. From the time I was really young, I was constantly around public school educators and people who were somehow involved with public policy in education. I was raised with a unique lens that taught me to constantly be aware of the privilege I have within the public school system—privilege that comes from my race, class and zip code.

More recently, after being a student in public school throughout my education, spending a lot of time engaged in social justice and volunteering, and pursuing discussions about educational equity with other adults and peers in my life, I became Interested in equity for my own reasons, separate from my parents. Over the last several years I have spent time at Pine Ridge Native American Reservation, and have subsequently become engaged as a youth leader on Lakota rights. The education system on the reserve is dysfunctional in many ways. With the dropout rate being over 70%, and teacher turnover about 800% more than the national average, making it through high school is a rarity. Spending time at Pine Ridge has provided me personal experience for the same headlines the heard discussed around the dinner table all my life: "a poor education system is one of the most detrimental forces on a community" and fueled for me a greater passion for understanding the systems that create these unjust patterns.

Simultaneous to my developing a passion for working on the educational rights of the Lakota people, my family has become foster family. For the past few years, we have welcomed kids in trauma into our home. Being a foster sister has given me unique insight on the foster care and public health systems of our city and has further shaped my ability to interact with people of all backgrounds. I've gained a new skill set in interacting with kids and adults who are very different from me. My experience as a foster sister has been humbling, to say the least. It has been challenging and frustrating—while also gratifying and purposeful—on a daily basis. My current foster sister came to our home 3 grade levels behind and having attended a failing school that ultimately was closed due to poor performance. Not only did the public education system fail her, so too did the department of human services. Feeling like a child's future hinges on the quality of the governmental system that supports him/her is disempowering. And yet, what is so incredible and exciting about living in a democracy is that I have complete power to change what I see could be better in my city. MYC is an opportunity to have my voice heard in an environment where it has the opportunity to be paired with honest influence over our local democratic systems. No person should feel disempowered by a government intended to support and empower them.

Being on the Denver Mayor's Youth Commission is a unique opportunity to understand and impact broader systems and structures within our city. I've heard a little about the impact that the Commission has had throughout the years from Estee Dechtman, and was immediately impressed by initiatives such as implementing the day of mental health awareness in DPS. It is rare for young people to be able to work so closely with their government systems, and I am eager for the possibility of being part of such an impactful and diverse group.

What prominent issue(s) that affect youth, would you like to address as part of the Mayor's Youth Commission?

While I am excited to engage across many issues affecting youth, I am particularly interested in drawing from my personal experience and engaging on solution generation to support more equitable access to quality education for foster youth and Native American youth. From my experience being a foster sister for the past three years, my eyes have been opened to the fundamental inequity of our city's education and public mental health systems. The sad truth is our system is too fragmented to successfully provide foster children in Denver, especially those who struggle with mental health issues, with the care they need. The achievement gap between foster kids and kids who live in functional families is startling. Homeless youth in Colorado are twice as likely to graduate high school than foster kids in Colorado. This reality is inexcusable. But it is not unsolvable. I am not so ambitious as to think we could narrow the achievement gap merely with work done by the MYC, but I do believe there are many ways we could make a dent in this problem. Creating awareness about Denver's foster care system, building relationships and mentorships for students in the foster system, and building practices that make foster students feel like they are being heard and supported by the Denver's youth, are all things that could work towards this overarching goal. On a broader scale, I would love to think about working with Denver officials and high school students to create a more accessible connection between students and polltics for students- not just on the MYC- but for all students. We are living in a unique time in history, and now more than ever it is imperative that high school students understand how to engage across perspective, across race, across class, across schools in respectful dialogue about social justice, politics, and creating change in our communities. I would love to work towards creating a day for students in high school to learn more about their government and how to engage in it, not just from a historical or purely informational lens, but with the intention of creating a community of young people in Denver who are inspired and prepared to make a difference in their worlds.

Instead of sitting back and watching what happens around me, I want to be an active participant in the place I call home. I will bring the unique perspective of being a minority in the public-school system, a member of a racially blended family, and a witness to both gentrification and the diminishing of the middle class. I believe it is incredibly important, especially with the recent election, for people my age to voice their concerns and opinions.

What prominent issue(s) that affect youth, would you like to address as a part of the Mayor's Youth Commission?

The prominent issues I would like to address are the disparities between low income and minority students and the quality of public education they receive, including the lack of successful public schools in low income and minority neighborhoods. As well as the effect of gentrification on students. For example, the top elementary school, middle school, and high school (according to coloradoschoolgrades.com) in the Denver County 1 District are: Steck Elementary, Slavens K-8 school, and DSST Cole High school. Steck and Slavens are both public schools located in high income neighborhoods and have low minority enrollment. On the other hand, DSST Cole High school is in a low-income neighborhood but is not a public school. Regarding gentrification, when high income families move into low income neighborhoods they require better preforming schools; thus, changing failing public schools to charter schools. This change affects the way students are taught and how low income and minority students adjust to these newly changed schools. I can attest to this because I went to a charter school and was aware of the noticeable and even negative differences between public and charter schools. I believe these issues are extremely pivotal to the academic success of students especially teens who are preparing for life after high school.

I am a member of the Teen Advisory Board of the Schlessman Library. I play on my school's volleyball and basketball teams. I am a writer for the Lowry Community Newspaper (Lowry Aviator) and my guest column is called "The Armchair Traveler". I am also building a website to support teenage leaders.

Please explain why you want to be part of the Mayor's Youth Commission. What unique perspective will you bring the Mayor's Youth Commission?

I want to be a part of the Mayor's Youth Commission so that I can effect change in Denver, particular in attitudes towards children and teens with learning disabilities. I would also like to gain new perspectives on issues that may be relevant to me and to my peers. I was fortunate to meet several members of the current commission who were proud of the impact they were having, I was inspired to apply for this opportunity, in order to feel the same sense of accomplishment.

I believe that I will bring the perspective of youth who live in Denver but do not necessarily go to public school. Approximately eight percent of youth in Denver attend private school. This is approximately 10,000 youth, I hope to be able to represent this large group of youth on the Mayor's Youth Commission.

I have been told by many of my peers and teachers that I bring a unique perspective when solving complex problems. I look at many things in a quantitative and analytical manner. For the past two summers, I have attended a program called "Camp Inc.". This program teaches entrepreneurial skills to young people, and the experience trained my mind to look at situations from a business and economic perspective.

I hope to have an impact on the issues teens are faced with on a regular basis. I hope that my tendency for leadership, being proactive, and my analytical skills will enable me to solve problems within the Mayor's Youth Commission. I believe that the Mayor's Youth Commission will expose me to different ways of approaching and solving issues youth face in Denver.

What prominent issues that affect youth, would you like to address as part of the Mayor's Youth Commission?

I am a dyslexic student. As a result, I am very passionate about youth with learning disabilities. I am most passionate about breaking down the stereotypes associated with having a learning disability, and about advocacy for those affected. Statistically one in ten students has a learning disability such as APD (Auditory Processing Disorder), ADHD (Attention Deficient Hyperactivity Disorder), or Dyslexia.

When I was in fourth grade I was diagnosed with Dyslexia. I was distraught, I thought this meant I was not smart. Over time I learned that it just meant I needed some accommodations on certain activities, and sometimes I would have to work harder to understand a concept. Since I overcame my Dyslexia, several of my close friends have been diagnosed with learning disabilities. I watched them go through the same emotions that I experienced. They came to me for advice, because I had experienced this first hand. Eventually, they realized that this would not limit what they were able to accomplish in life, and that struggling with this made them stronger. Before they could realize this, however, their self esteem took a major blow. On the Mayor's Youth Commission I would like to address what having a learning disability does to the self esteem and confidence of youth in Denver.

Unfortunately, there are many stereotypes that dominate many people's perspective of learning disabilities. For example, it is a common misconception that students with Dyslexia read backwards. On the Mayor's Youth Commision, I would like to raise awareness of the true effects of learning disabilities. This would be for the benefit of students with these learning disabilities, so they could be informed about what this diagnosis actually means, However, this would also target their peers. It is important that their non-affected peers be informed about the struggles that some of their friends face. It would replace the stereotypes with factual information.

I am hopeful that I will have an opportunity to serve on the Mayor's Youth Commission in order to help the children and teens of Denver with not only learning disabilities, but with the many other challenges that they may be currently facing.

This was a real event that I witnessed on Colfax and Monsco. I learned more from this act of kindness than I have in the past two weeks of school. If I am on the commission, I will try my hardest to spread awareness and make an impact on the demographic.

This is one of many issues I would like to address but preventing prejudice in schools is very important to me. I see it almost everyday. I currently attend East High School and everyday, I am used to hearing racial sturs or other actions that could cause racial tension. In my 8th grade language arts class, I had many thought provoking discussions regarding prejudice in class. It was then that I discovered my voice to speak up for others. One way I would love to help resolve this conflict is through awareness. I know the ADL has programs established to prevent hate. I would love to implement these programs all throughout the district.
