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

- 3. Integration of PBIS, targeted strategies for equity, and social emotional learning.
- 4. Engaging parents and families around the use of school & community restorative best practices.
- 5. Engaging youth leadership in restorative practices through the peer Youth Justices Alliance.


### **Department of Mental Health**

Proactive approach to supporting students mental wellness, health and behavioral health needs aligned to the <u>CDC's recommendations</u>.

 Assess individual student needs to plan and deliver appropriate intensive interventions/iplans of support (social, emotional, behavioral, safety and cognitive based).

 Trained school social workers and/or school psychologists in ALL schools provide psychosocial skills training, cognitive behavioral interventions and other therapeutic targeted interventions.

- Assess student/group needs to plan and deliver appropriate targeted interventions/iplans of support (social, emotional, behavioral, safety and cognitive based).
- Trained school social workers and/or school psychologists in ALL provide psychosocial skills training, cognitive behavioral interventions and other therapeutic targeted interventions.
- Increase students' Mental Health Literacy, promote social, emotional and behavioral learning for all students (including suicide prevention, human trafficking, substance prevention).
- Screen all eligible students for risk of having or developing mental health challenges.
- Enhance connectedness among students, staff, families and community.

Work Group Name & Link To Notes	Summary of Focus
Case Mgmt for System Involved Youth	Pushing forward policy changes that will prevent youth from falling through system cracks and enhancing data systems to sustain those changes
School Mindsets & Related Supports	Incorporate culturally responsive preventative supports consistently and equitably in DPS schools in the areas of restorative justice practices, trauma-informed mindsets, and social emotional learning (SEL)
Youth Resiliency	Bring YVP lens to well established, universal areas of focus: career development and out of school time
Wrap-Around Supports	Coordinate distribution of city and community resources through school system to address the impact of poverty
Mental Health Talent Pipeline	Cultivate a talent pool of mental health professionals who have lived experiences similar to those of our students and can speak their native languages

# **Denver Youth Employment Program**

#### **Workforce Development and Career Exposure**

- Provides youth access to workforce development, career exposure, and opportunities to further their individual passions and goals through foundational work experience opportunities with local organizations, businesses and other high growth industries.
- Over the last 4 years, \$1,464,032.80 in wages were earned by 1,028 youth from Denver's low income and high violence communities.

#### **Student Opportunities**



### **FACE Family Connect**

Through a multi-generational theoretical framework that focuses on addressing the needs of both the child and the adults in their lives together, voluntary services are intended to support families in connecting with resources that enhance family stability and improve educational outcomes for their children.



# Multilingual Education (MLE)

**District Advisory Council:** Promotes academic partnerships and leadership to support families' to be their child's best first advocate at both the school and district level.

**New Arrival's Toolkit:** Resources for Principals and Teachers to share Wrap Around Services and Denver Outreach Programs, information on climate, safety and youth violence prevention.



# **Community Hubs**

The Denver Public Schools Community Hubs are community resource center connecting students, families and the greater community with services to maximize family stability and increase academic success. All services are at no cost and open to DPS parents and community members.
