To the Landmark Board,

The application for Tom's Diner is an improper use of the landmark ordinance and should be rejected. The Diner's use as a restaurant and the nostalgia the applicants feel for eating there can't be separated from the application. Since the owner does not wish to continue operating a diner, and the applicants do not wish to buy the property to keep the diner, this is not an eligible criteria. Tom's Diner will be gone no matter which way this application goes.

Second, while the "Googie" style is indeed distinct, it stretches credulity to claim that this mass produced structure is somehow a valuable piece of architecture. Many far more unique and interesting structures from this time period exist in our city. This building isn't even the original White Spot, and contains virtually nothing that connects it back to that era. Will we be deeming Chili's buildings and Outback Steakhouses as landmarks in 40 years simply because of age?

Finally, another pillar of this application is the hostility towards the construction of housing by the applicants, who mostly live really far away. Many members of our community have tried to taint the landmark process as a way to stop buildings from being built, rather than as a means of preserving our history. I do not believe opposition to the content of a future project makes a building a landmark.

I hope you will reject this application.

Dear Members of the Landmark Preservation Commission:

Neighbors for Greater Capitol Hill is a newly-registered neighborhood organization (representing the area bounded by Broadway, East 6th Avenue, York/Josephine and approximately East 23rd Avenue). By a unanimous vote of our Historic Preservation Committee on June 24, 2019 and of our board of directors on June 26, 2019, Neighbors for Greater Capitol Hill supports the designation of Tom's Diner at 601 East Colfax Avenue as a structure for preservation.

The structure, designed by the California architectural firm of Armet and Davis, was built in 1967 as a White Spot Diner operated by William Clements. It is an excellent example of Googie architecture and 24-hour diner use, both of which are now rare in Denver. This White Spot (now Tom's Diner), during the 1960s to the present has provided a safe, comfortable, hospitable gathering place for the wide spectrum of diverse persons who frequent East Colfax, including high-school and college students, business-persons, elderly citizens, homeless persons, LGBTQ individuals, concert attendees and police officers.

The keeper of the National Register of Historic Places determined Tom's Diner to be eligible for the National Register on September 24, 2009.

We urge the LPC to recommend designation of Tom's Diner to City Council.
