


Resolution 25-0818 to approve a contract with Rocky Mountain Human Services (RMHS) to administer the Denver START Program

June 16, 2025 - scheduled for first reading before city council









Intellectual and <u>D</u>evelopmental <u>D</u>isabilities <u>E</u>quitable <u>A</u>ccess to <u>S</u>ervices

Stewardship of Denver's mill levy fund dedicated to benefit residents with **intellectual and developmental disabilities** (I/DD).

Funding secured through voter-approved initiative passed in 2003 by margin of nearly 70%

Denver's Community Centered Board (CCB) and Case Management Agency (CMA)

Only legal entity in Denver authorized to complete I/DD determination


Access Point for Early Intervention (birth- 3) and I/DD services; Expert in I/DD service delivery system

Only certified provider of START services in Colorado

Systemic Therapeutic Resource Assessment Treatment




- Community-based crisis intervention and prevention for people ages 6 and older with I/DD and mental health needs (IDD-MH)
 - High emergency service utilizers
- Cross-Systems, Evidence-Based Practice
- START coordination; therapeutic coaching; 24/7 Crisis Response; psychopharmacology consultation
- Develops community capacity while achieving wellbeing for those served

Overseen by the <u>University of New Hampshire's</u> <u>National Center for START Services</u> (UNH NCSS).




START Program Locations



Staffing and Training



Maintain Team of approx. 16 FTEs

- Clinical Director, Program Director, Clinical Team Leader, Therapeutic Coach Team Leader (1 FTE each)
- START Coordinators (7 FTE*)
- Therapeutic Coaches (3 FTE*)
- Medical Director (0.25 FTE)
- Administrative Assistant (1 FTE)
- Data Analyst (1 FTE)

Ongoing training, coaching, and supervision to maintain START certification

- START program service coordination and therapeutic coaching
- Clinical assessment, treatment, and stabilization services and consultation

Community Outreach and Capacity Building



Enhance the capacity of local providers to serve Denver persons with IDD-MH through activities that enhance relationships and build expertise

- Community trainings (12 per contract period)
- Clinical Education Team (CET) meetings open to community partners (10+ per year)
- Access to START National Online Training Series for up to 50 community partners
- Denver START Program Advisory Council
- Linkage Agreements with Community Partners (framework for cross-system collaboration)

University of New Hampshire National Center for START Services (UNH NCSS) provides technical assistance, training, evaluation, and certification to START programs.

- RMHS will sub-contract with UNH NCSS to provide consultation, training, technical assistance, and provide START program certification renewal
- Certification renewal every 2 years





Primary languages include: Spanish, Amharic, Arabic, Burmese, and American Sign Language.

Figure III.A: Change in Frequency of Pre- and Post- START Enrollment Emergency Service Utilization





Figure III.B: Disposition of Denver START Crisis Contact

What is I/DD?

Intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD) – this umbrella term is often used to describe differences in a person's brain, and how those differences impact their life.

- Appear before the age of 22
- Result from a variety of different conditions*

Examples of conditions* that *may* result in someone qualifying for an I/DD determination**

- Down Syndrome
- Autism Spectrum Disorder

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Cerebral Palsy

* These conditions impact individuals differently, so their presence in someone's life doesn't always result in an I/DD. ** In Colorado, organizations called Case Management Agencies are responsible for determining if someone has an I/DD that qualifies for certain publicly funded services. **I/DD determinations are made for people ages 5 and older.**


