# Jacqueline Hinman engineers her rise to top at CH2M Hill

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The interest in Jacqueline Hinman is understandable.

The 52-year-old is about to become CEO of CH2M Hill, joining a small club of women to head Fortune 500 companies. If that weren't enough to fuel public interest, she will be one of the only women to run a major U.S. engineering firm — a field traditionally dominated by men.

A rarity? Yes. A surprise? Not for those who know her.

“It is really important that she is a woman, but the fact that she is a woman isn’t the reason she was selected,” said Mike Szomjassy, president of the energy, water and facilities division. “She was the right choice. She has the right profile for the enterprise. She has the experience, and having worked outside the company for a stint, I think she provides perspective.”

With only 4 percent of Fortune 500 companies led by women, Hinman acknowledges she belongs to a statistically small group, yet doesn’t consider her path to be unique.

“To be honest, I’ve never felt like ‘Oh, my gosh I am a woman, I can’t do this.’ It has just never crossed my mind,” Hinman said. “That is the story. How did I get to be the CEO? I moved through every single step.”

Her résumé backs that statement, but a closer look reveals rapid ascension through upper management and the accumulation of diverse experiences during her career that have primed her to steer the large ship, which ranks No. 1 in Engineering News-Record’s Top 200 Environmental Firms.

Douglas County-based CH2M Hill is among Colorado’s largest companies, with revenue that increased from \$5.6 billion in 2008 to \$6.2 billion in 2012. It saw worldwide employment double to 30,000 during the same four-year period.

But CH2M Hill is about more than balance sheets. The company’s code of ethics — documented in its “Little Yellow Book” — requires its people to display respect and integrity, and the CEO is expected to embody these traits.

“She has a high moral compass,” said her mother, Rose Crenca. “One Christmas she gave me a water buffalo,” she said, referring to aid organizations such as Heifer International that set up donation thresholds where an individuals can purchase livestock for struggling families in the developing world.

While her mother admits she can’t speak to her daughter’s abilities as a CEO, her recollections of Hinman’s childhood reveal leadership traits that would show up again in the future.

“I recently bumped into one of her old teachers who taught driver’s ed,” Crenca said. “She was his teacher’s aide, and some of the kids were kind of rowdy in there. He told me that all he had to do was put Jacque in there; they would straighten out.”

Crenca asked him what she did to control them, and he replied, “I have no idea, but it worked.”

Past and present colleagues describe Hinman as strategic, objective, enthusiastic, energetic, savvy and strong in character — traits, they say, that will be essential in her succession of CEO Lee McIntire, 64, on Jan. 1.

Hinman never disqualified herself by shying away from a challenging assignment. She also attributes her success to having the support of mentors who invested in her and who she believed in.

“I had to raise my hand and say I wanted to have all of these challenges and experiences. So I had to ask for it,” Hinman said.

The first time she raised her hand for a challenging assignment was at her first job, just two years out of college in 1985. It was a pivotal experience where she established her authority.

” I was assigned to be construction manager on a landfill job ... and this was a big construction job,” Hinman said.

At 23, Hinman was the only woman on-site, walking into a group of men with senior-level experience in construction. The men promptly told her to go sit in the trailer, have some coffee, fill out her reports — and they would let her know when they were done in six months.

“I could’ve very easily said OK and then gone away or sat in the trailer. ... But it was the very first time I said, ‘I’m being challenged,’ and I’m going to respectfully say, ‘I’ve been asked to do my job. You’ve been asked to do your job. Can we work together? I’m sure you can teach me something. Let me help you understand what I am supposed to do,’ ” Hinman said.

“I’ve got to tell you, that guy taught me more about construction than anybody in my whole life.”

Two years later, Robert Card recruited her to join CH2M Hill. After a stint in Southern California with the company, she moved to Denver in 1993 as the director of marketing. During that tenure she worked on the Rocky Flats cleanup.

Then, in 1997, she left CH2M Hill to start a technical and engineering consulting company, which she stayed with for two years after it was acquired by a larger company. In 2005, CH2M Hill recruited her back.

Within her first year back, the opportunity to bid on the London Olympics landed on CH2M Hill’s doorstep. Card pulled her onto his team to lead the bid process.

“She was the day-to-day person responsible for winning this project,” said Card, now president and CEO of Montreal-based SNC-Lavalin. “This was a huge undertaking. We knew it would be a heavy lift.”

Bechtel, an engineering behemoth, was considered the “obvious” choice to win the Olympics, with its Europe, Africa, Middle East and Southwest Asia headquarters in London and a size about five times larger than CH2M Hill.

But the underdog managed to land the nearly \$200 million contract based on its reputation as a leading environmental firm and its track record as a good collaborator.

“CH2M Hill is known as being nice people,” Card said. “That is what I think cinched the deal. They probably felt (CH2M Hill) would be the best to work with.”

This was the point where Hinman's executive climb accelerated. From 2006 to 2007, she headed all international business development, during which the firm won the Panama Canal expansion, the Mumbai International Airport modernization and the U.S. base relocation in South Korea.

From 2008 to 2009, she oversaw CH2M Hill's Center for Project Excellence. In 2010 she oversaw major programs and mergers and acquisitions, in 2011 she headed the facilities and infrastructure division, and since 2012 she has served as president of the international division.

It was during these high-powered international conversations, that Hinman's informed decisiveness and boldness became most evident, which her colleagues say is a major asset for an engineering company moving forward in a highly competitive field.

"If you look at the growth of CH2M Hill, while it has been fantastic, it needs to be sure that it is positioned to keep up with its peer group," said Card. "She is strategic enough to fully understand this. And she is not hidebound by past dogma, lore and protocols. She will break out of that and judge things for what they are."

Hinman offers two pieces of advice for young people, beginning with understanding their own career goals.

"You don't have to say exactly what you want, but you have to say that 'This is where I might want to get. Help me figure it out,'" she said, and second, "if you work somewhere where you really believe in what you are doing and you can align yourself with its values and respect the people you work for, you are willing to take on new challenges because you are excited for it."

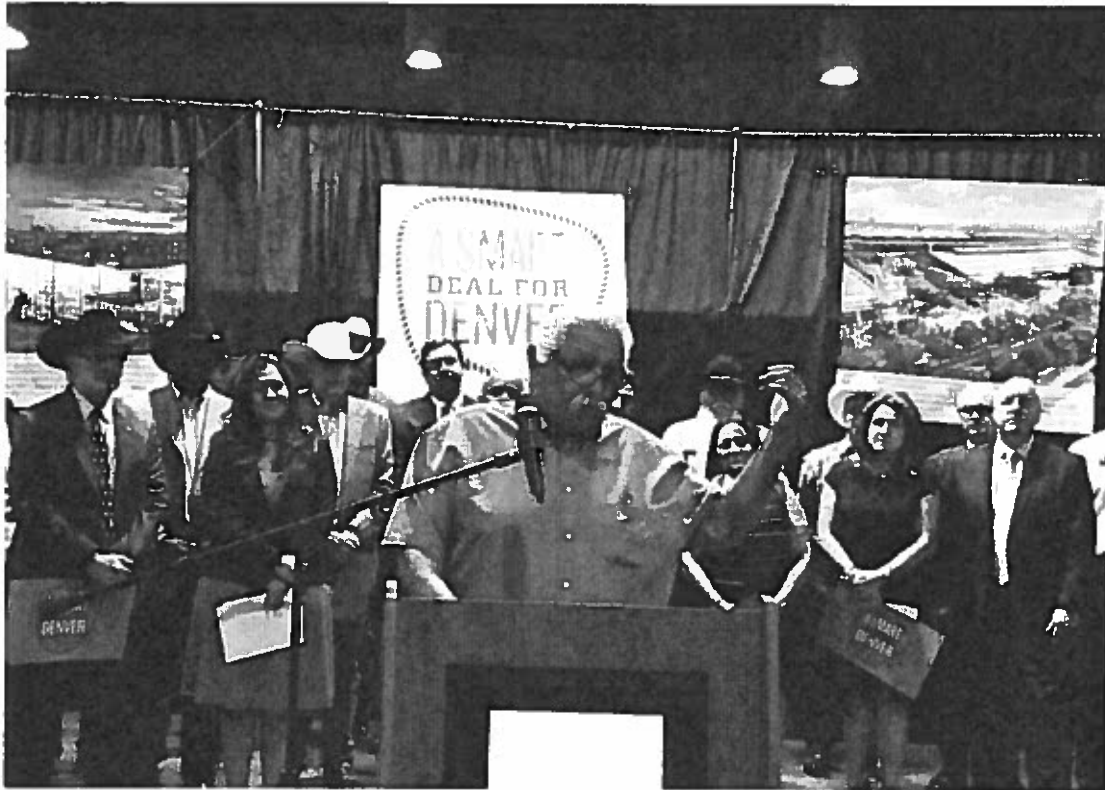

# Supporters kick off campaign for National Western tax extensions

City, state and civic leaders on Wednesday kicked off the drive to win voter approval of tourist tax extensions to help foot the bill for the National Western Center plan.

A common refrain from Mayor Michael Hancock and other speakers played on the campaign's name, "A Smart Deal for Denver."

"It's one of the best I've seen," Hancock told more than 100 attendees in the 1909 Stadium Arena at the stock show complex. "And we're ready to giddyup."



Ahead of the Nov. 3 election, the city is asking voters to approve extensions of twin 1.75 percent lodging and car-rental taxes that had helped pay for the last Colorado Convention Center expansion.

If approved, the city would tap those to repay \$476 million in borrowing to support \$856 million in projects outlined for the remade National Western Center. City leaders are seeking other sources of money to help pay for the projects; other components in the next decade likely will push the total price tag above \$1 billion.

The tax extensions also would support another expansion and upgrades at the convention center, estimated at \$105 million.

The city's National Western master plan calls for transforming the site into a year-round tourism, event and education center. Colorado State University, armed with \$250 million in newly authorized state backing, is making plans for an innovation and research hub there.

The plan has won cautious support from neighborhood activists in Elyria-Swansea and Globeville for components meant to inject new economic activity and reconnect those neighborhoods with better streets and bridges.

“That opportunity will not only benefit those here, it will benefit the entire city,” said John Zapien, a Globeville resident who served on an advisory committee. “And that’s the message we’ve got to take out to the public. Obviously, our neighborhoods will benefit. Even though we’ve been overlooked, neglected and isolated by these barriers, this initiative on the ballot will provide opportunities — opportunities totally unheard of before.”

The ballot question is one of four tax-related measures that may appear on Denver’s ballot this fall.

Others would authorize a sales tax to help Denver students repay college costs, allow the city to keep marijuana tax proceeds, and approve a deal with Adams County to share future tax revenue from commercial development at Denver International Airport.
