


Our Mission To provide excellent legal representation and holistic support to our clients by upholding their rights, telling their stories, and restoring dignity.

OMPD Clients

- 100% are living at or below the poverty line
- 80% or more are living with trauma, mental health, brain injury, or substance misuse conditions
- Majority are unhoused or experiencing housing instability
- Limited access to behavioral healthcare - especially for black, Hispanic, and people of color





Justice-involved individuals and homelessness

- People experiencing homelessness
 (PEH) are 11 times more likely to be arrested than housed individuals [1]
- In Denver, nearly 40% of municipal cases involve PEH, often for low-level offenses like trespass and open container violations [2]


Holistic representation is a clientcentered, communityoriented approach to criminal defense

- Provide wraparound, on-demand peer support, case management, & behavioral health navigation
- Connect clients to community resources, services, and behavioral health treatment
- Support adult/youth OMPD clients in 6 courtrooms, Outreach Court, office, & jail and reentry support
- Collaborate with City & community partners to coordinate care and link clients directly to services
- Facilitate training for staff & clients,



Price Savings for the Community

- Jail Beds approximately \$164/night
- Low level offenders spending time in jail- recidivate
- Limited MH/Addiction Programming at DDC and our office connects people to services
- Help with housing, transportation, clothing, food
- Cases get resolved more expediently

MISSION: WHY and HOW?

School To Prison Pipeline & Collateral Consequences Black young adults are 11 times more likely to be arrested by age 20 if they had an initial encounter with law enforcement in their early teens than Black youth who don't have that first contact.

Who gets the right to have a childhood or make a "child" mistake?

Core Values:

- Supporting youth labeled as "high risk" by sharing their perspectives and connecting them with youth-led orgs
- Combat public defender stigms within justice-involved community
- Disrupting the school to prison pipeline
- Allow youth to identify their hierarchy of needs and provide holistic support

KEY FINDINGS 2024

320 cases from 2024 July-December

Roughly 40% of cases are brought against Black youth. 20% brought against Black girls and 20% against Black boys.


Roughly 32% of charges are brought against Hispanic Youth.


43% percentage of cases were resolved through Diversion on arraignment date.

A large majority of cases are Assaults, with 102 of total charges being assault.

About 30% of all of the new charges brought forward originated in schools









SCHOOL CASES IN 2024 AND PUSH OUT

- 24% of the cases from school are brought against Black girls.
- 23% of the cases from school are brought against Black Boys.
- 31% of the cases from school are brought against Hispanic Youth.
- Denver Public Schools and DPS charter schools ticket their students at a disparate rate.
 - 52% of DPS are Hispanic youth
 - 13.5% of DPS are Black youth.
 - 25% of DPS is white.







Figure 3 Representation of Girls who Received Discipline compared to Overall Population 2017-2018

KEY FINDINGS 2025 SO FAR

332 new cases from January 2025-July of 2025


34% of our new cases are of Black Youth. 36% of our new cases are Hispanic Youth.

133 out of those 332 originated from school. That is about 40% of our cases.

We anticipate an increase in this percentage as school begins.

This marks a 10% increase from last year.


22 cases out of 332 came from residential facilities housing youth (either detention or group home placements).





SCHOOL CASES IN 2025 AND **PUSH OUT**

- 22% of the cases from school are brought against Black girls.
- 20% of the cases from school are brought against Black boys.
- 45% of the cases are from Hispanic youth.
- Denver Public Schools and DPS charter schools ticket their students at a disparate rate.
 - 52% of DPS are Hispanic youth
 - 13.5% of DPS are Black youth.







Figure 3 Representation of Girls who Received Discipline compared to Overall **Population 2017-2018**


