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# Participatory Budgeting in Denver

# Participatory What?

Participatory Budgeting (PB) is a democratic process where community members decide how to spend part of a public budget.

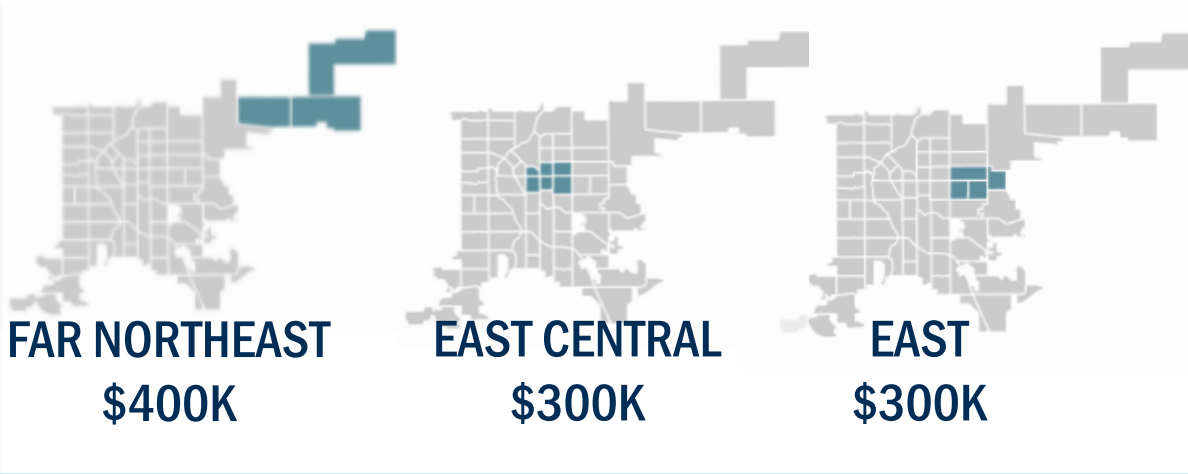

# \$1.7 million on capital improvements

Distributed across three areas with completed neighborhood plan initiatives (NPI)

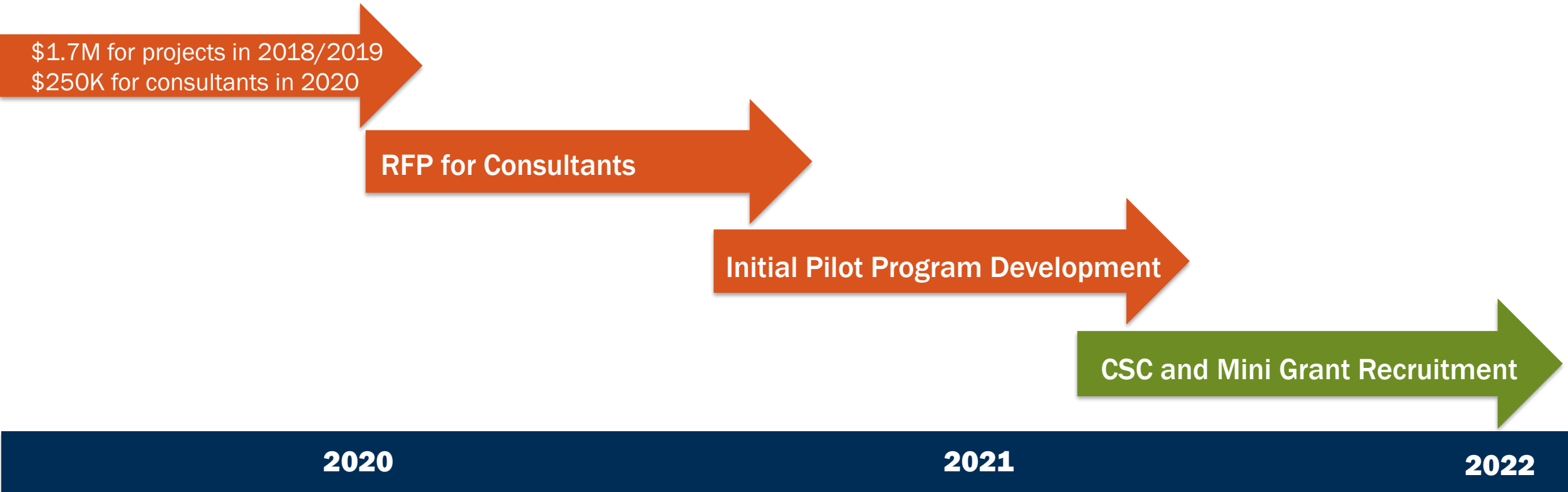


**\$700,000**

Initial planning for Denver PB started in 2018



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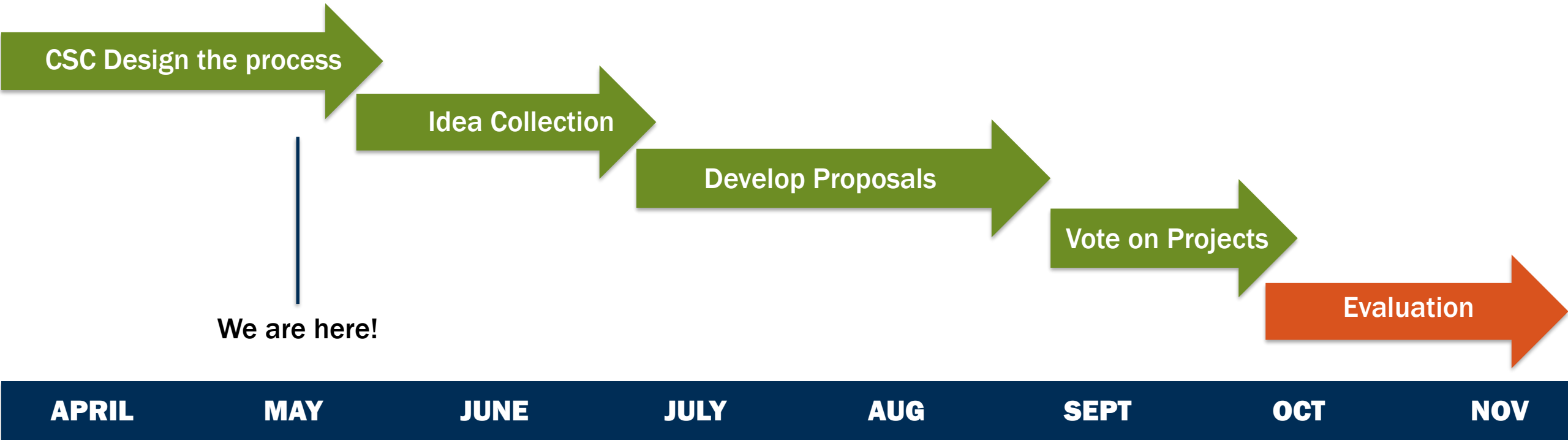

Seating the CSC to design the process



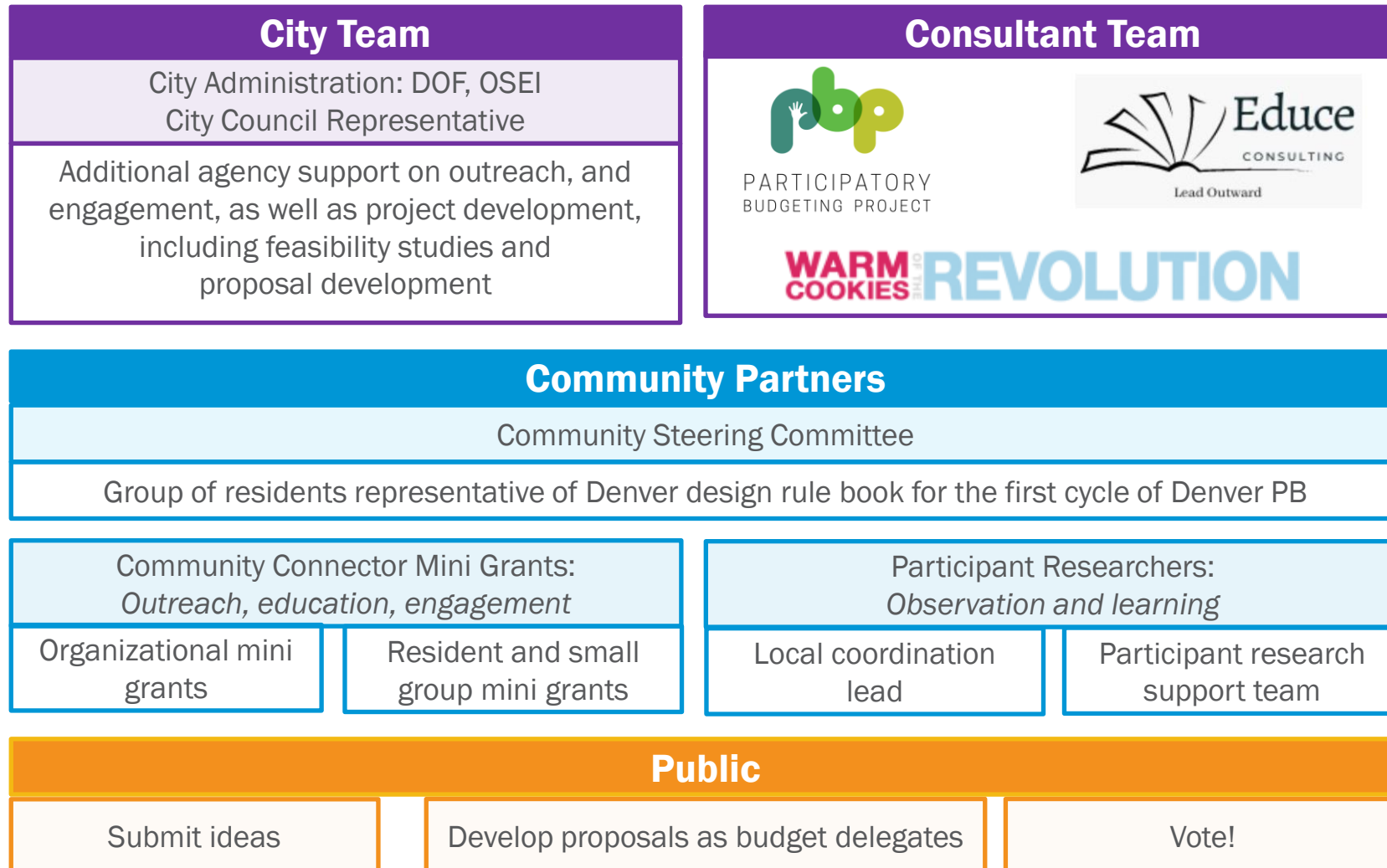
# Denver PB Timeline: Current Status

The first cycle of Denver PB will take place over the next several months.



The City may start designing and constructing selected projects as early as the end of 2022.

# Program Structure



## Civic Engagement

- Resident ownership in government and participation in long-term, collective decision-making

## Community Capacity and Education

- Individual and collective capacity to shape civic affairs

# Denver PB Goals

## Equity and Accessibility

- Equitable outcomes for historically underserved communities, especially BIPOC residents, people with disabilities, youth, and immigrants and refugees

## Institutional Capacity

- Authentic collaboration rooted in improved listening and dialogue to create a more responsive government that invests in residents and community power

# Commitment to Equity and Inclusion

Denver PB is committed to an inclusive process that prioritizes residents who have historically faced the highest barriers to civic engagement, including:

Black, Indigenous,  
People of Color (BIPOC)

Immigrants and  
refugees

Persons with  
disabilities

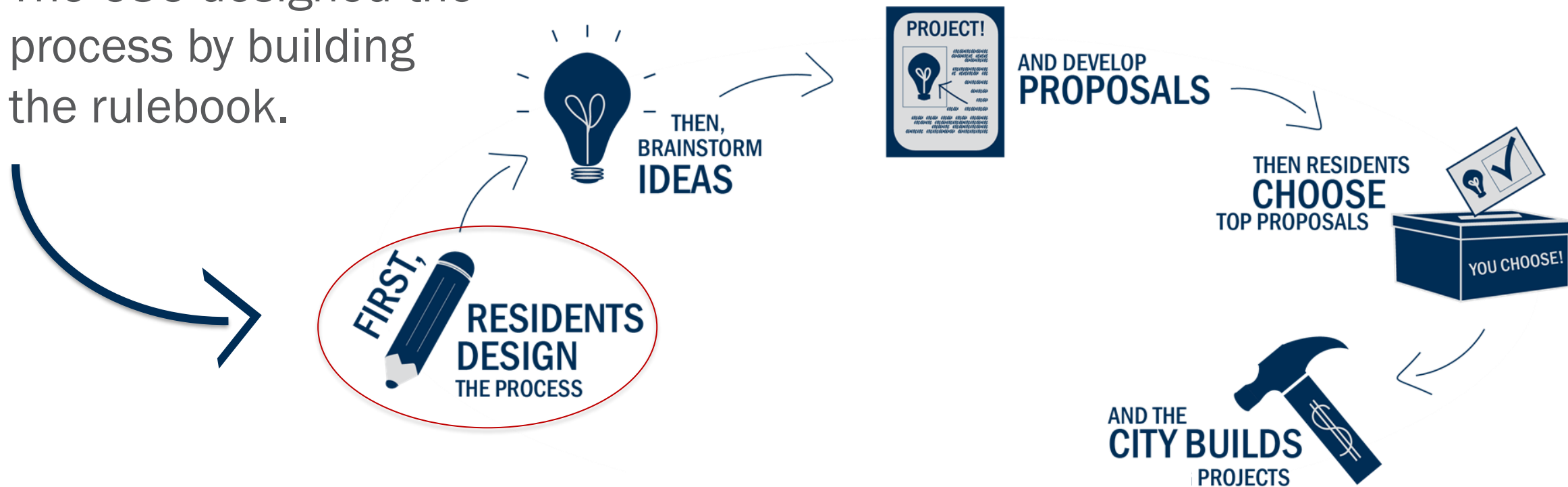
Youth

Equity is built into every step of the process, including consideration of:

- Language justice
- Compensation
- ASL and captioning
- Transportation support
- Childcare support
- Flexible meeting times

# Community Steering Committee (CSC)

The CSC designed the process by building the rulebook.



# Community Steering Committee



CSC members have vibrant and diverse perspectives:

## Strong advocates for historically underserved communities:

Representation from persons with disabilities and LGBTQ identities. Strong advocacy for unhoused residents.

## Culturally rich and committed to language justice:

Members speaking Karen, Poe Karen, Burmese, Thai, Poah, Fulani, Spanish, Lakota, Nyanja, Bemba, and Tonga

## Citywide representation with Focus in NPI areas:

Strong representation in FNE, E, and EC. Members represent 12 different neighborhoods across the city.

## Racially and Ethnically Diverse:

Strong representation from Black, Indigenous, People of Color as well as immigrants and refugees

## Youth representation:

Two members 18 or under, with the youngest member under the age of 15

# CSC Engagement

Alejandro Galaza (he, his) to Everyone  
 AG I voted for 13 years old, but I'm not opposed to lowering the age to 10.

Anaya Robinson (he/him) to Everyone  
 There's also youth who grow up without supportive adults, and unhoused youth may not be able to participate if they do not have adults to consent in their lives.

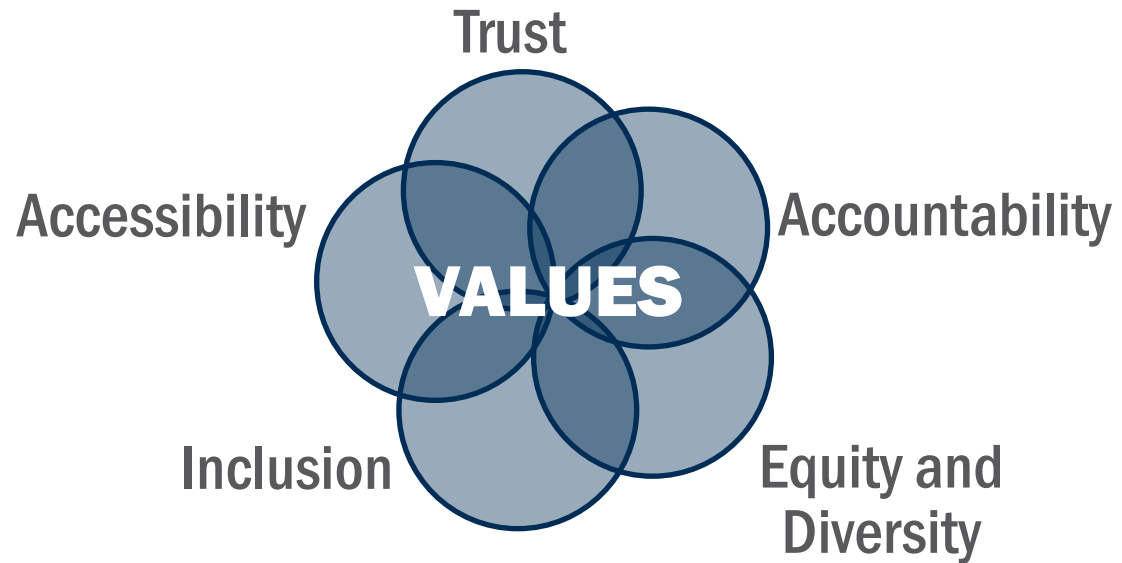

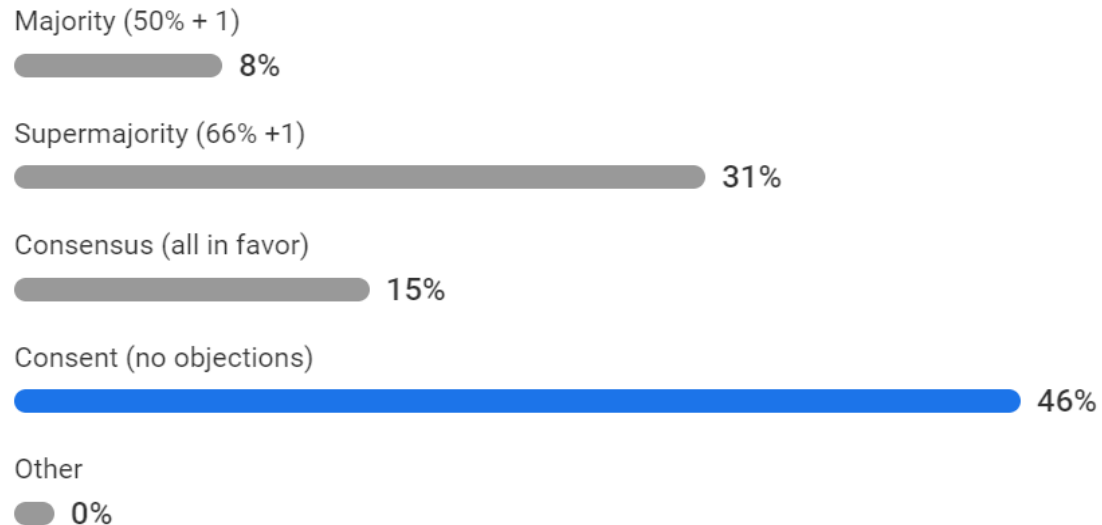




# Let's Budget, Denver Rulebook

## Decision-making: Consent

Clarify when making proposal vs brainstorming ideas – support each other in clarifying

# Let's Budget, Denver Rulebook

## NPI Participation Criteria (specific to each NPI area)

**Submit ideas**



- Participants must live, go to school, or work at a micro business in an NPI area.
- There is no age limit to submit an idea.

**Develop proposals**



- Participants must live or go to school in an NPI area.
- Participants must be at least 10 years old

**Vote for projects**



- Participants must live or go to school in an NPI area.
- Participants must be at least 10 years old

# Let's Budget, Denver Rulebook

## Citywide Participation Criteria

### Submit ideas



- Participants must live, go to school, or work at a micro business in Denver.
- There is no age limit to submit an idea.

### Develop proposals



- Participants must live or go to school in Denver.
- Participants must be at least 10 years old

### Vote for projects



- Participants must live or go to school in Denver.
- Participants must be at least 10 years old



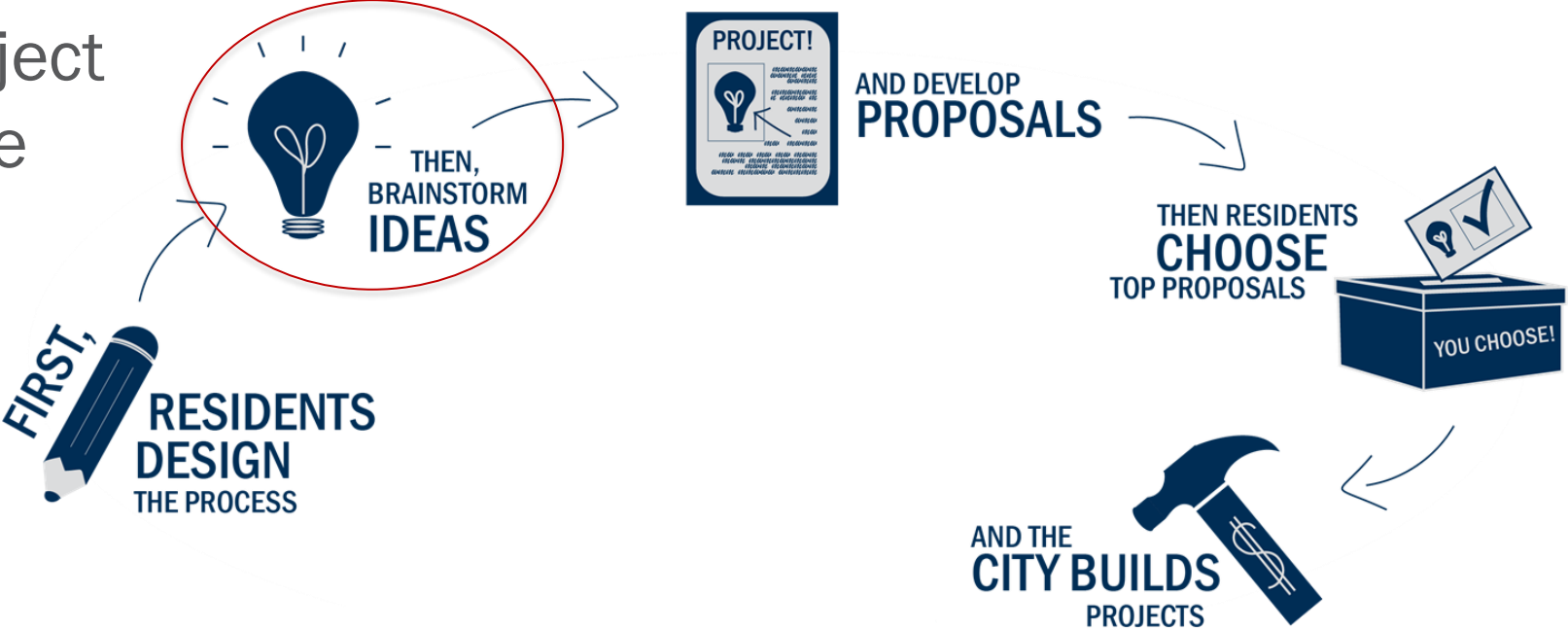

# Community Connector Mini Grants

 **\$30K in mini-grants to amplify community engagement** 

**\$21K** for Organizations

**\$9K** for Individuals/Small Groups

**Let's Budget, Denver  
Community Connectors will**

- Motivate residents to participate in the process and develop long-term skills to lead future civic processes
- Coordinate and host events to make the process accessible and inviting, and to encourage new and diverse perspectives to participate

Tactics proposed by  
Community Connectors:

- Navigators/canvassing
- Budget workshops
- Budget storytelling
- Neighborhood events
- WhatsApp and text outreach





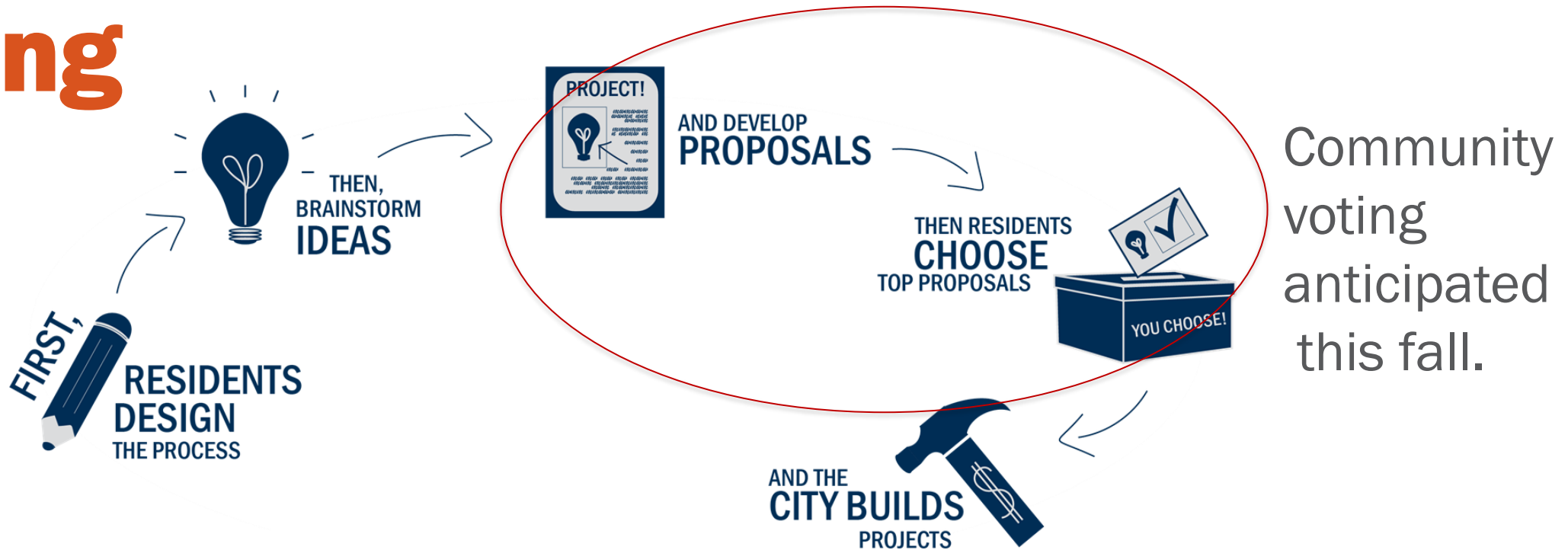

# Proposal Development & Voting

Budget delegates will work with City staff to develop proposals, complete with cost estimates.



# Proposal Development & Voting Process



Public reviews/submits  
**Project Idea**



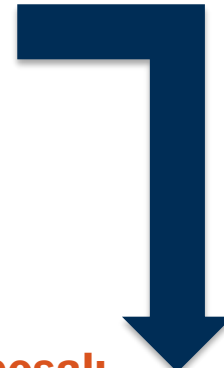
## **Feasibility Review:**

City determines if an idea meets city feasibility requirements



## **Budget Delegate Scoring:**

Does it align with the “Lets Budget, Denver” values and goals?



## **Draft Proposal:**

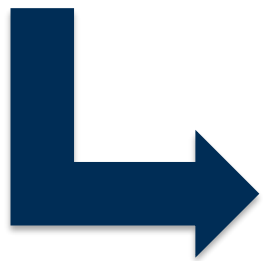
Budget delegates work with city staff to create detailed project descriptions and costs



**Final Projects**  
are added to the ballot

# Evaluation

- Observe the pilot Program's development, including responses to scale and geographic scope, decision-making processes, representation of the Steering Committee, and overall Program participation
- Interview City staff and Denver-based organizations/individuals who partnered with the Program to provide local support.
- Engage in Program events and processes, including idea collection and deliberation events, budget delegate meetings, and voting events.



After the pilot cycle of Denver PB is complete, the Evaluation Consultant will provide a complete analysis and evaluation answering the questions:

- What did we achieve and learn in relation to our established goals and outcomes?
- Which approach- neighborhood v. citywide – was more effective?
- What could be improved?
