

A Profile on Immigrant and Refugee Community

- □ Denver Population: 604,404 [2010 Census]
- □ Foreign Born in Denver: 16% or 98,236 residents
- Denver Public Schools languages spoken: 145
 identified languages and dialects [DPS MultiCultural Outreach Office]
 (Spanish, Vietnamese, Arabic, Somali, Amharic, Nepali)
- Refugee Resettlement: 1878 refugees/asylees in 2011

What will the Commission focus on?

- Creating a bridge of communication and partnership between all immigrant and refugee communities with the City of Denver.
- Identify issues and find opportunities to partner with the city to address those issues.
- The Commission will not focus on the plight of any one community or group, but instead will identify universal priorities that impact all the immigrant and refugee communities.

Who will be on the Commission?

- The Commission will have up to 21 appointed and confirmed commissioners.
- They will represent Denver's diverse immigrant and refugee communities.
- We will look for Commissioners who will be a bridge between the City of Denver and their immigrant or refugee community
- Commissioners should live or work in the City of Denver to apply to sit on the Commission.

How will Commissioners be appointed?

- Applicants will be subject to the same recruitment, appointment and confirmation process that our other nine Commissions adhere to.
- For the first round of appointments, the applicants will be screened by Anthony Aragon, Jamie Torres and a small panel of key stakeholders.
- Recommendations will be made to Mayor Hancock for his consideration.
