- 2018 Denver voters passed a ballot initiative known as **Denver College Success Corporation**. A 0.08% sales tax (less than one cent on \$10) is distributed in the form of reimbursements to nonprofits providing scholarships to Denver students.
- **2019** The City Council finalized the ordinance governing the organization, which took the name **Prosperity Denver Fund**.
- **2020** Before the pandemic, less than 50% of DPS students pursued a 2- or 4-year **college pathway**. That number decreased due to COVID, putting Denver's students at risk of lacking workforce skills to compete in the evolving job market.
- 2023 The Denver City Council voted to expand the scope of the ordinance, allowing Prosperity Denver Fund to fund services in **high school** to encourage students to create a post-secondary plan, to support training programs for industry **credentials and apprenticeships**, and to fund Denver residents **up to age 30**.

Slides to follow show the impact of the 2023 Ordinance changes:

- Expanded funding to reach students pursuing **credentials and apprenticeships**
- Dedicated up to 20% of funding each year to go to **high school** support services
- Expanded age eligibility **up to age 30** for Denver residents




### **Students Served**

# Dramatic increase in # of students served followed the 2023 City Council changes to the ordinance.

### 2024 numbers:

- Collegiate: 2,611\*
- Credentials: 540
- High School: 28,230
- Total: 31,381

\*Even beyond the new programs, the # of students served in the Collegiate program increased by 18% from 2023 to 2024.

## **Supported Organizations**




Dramatic increase in *#* of supported organizations followed the 2023 City Council changes to the ordinance.

### 2024 numbers:

- Collegiate: 33
- Credentials: 12
- High School: 18\*
- Total: 47 individual organizations funded



# Outcomes



## **Preliminary Findings: Evaluation Studies**

PROSPERITY DENVER FUND

- Study **#1**:
  - Study conducted by CU Leeds School of Business estimates that **college attendance and graduation rates in Denver increased by about 8% per year** because of Prosperity Denver Fund, at a time when these numbers are decreasing around the country.
  - **Median incomes will increase** as a result of this higher participation in postsecondary education.

### • Study #2:

- Study conducted by Prosono found that supported organizations are **increasing scholarship awards** and **reducing student debt** with Prosperity Denver Fund support.
- Students are **better prepared** for life in college and beyond.
- Prosperity Denver Fund **builds capacity and collaboration** among scholarship providers.

# **Examples of Impact**

- Denver Scholarship Foundation:
  - Increase in number of DSF scholars awarded: 27% (from 1,760 to 2,330)
  - Increase in amount of scholarship awarded: 29% (from \$2,800 to \$3,600)
  - All expansion has been accomplished while maintaining graduation rates at 80% and above.

### Puksta Foundation:

- Added the **CU Denver Puksta Scholars Program** with all scholars coming from Denver
- Increased scholarship awards at CSU: 50% (from \$5,000 to \$7,500)
- Increased scholarship awards at MSU: 50 85% (from \$3500/\$5,000 to \$6,500)

# 2025 – 2027 Strategic Plan





### • Expand Prosperity Denver Fund impact:

- Through all programs (Collegiate, Credentials, and High School) expand:
  - Number of Denver residents pursuing post-secondary opportunities
  - Number of supported organizations
  - Amount of scholarships/training awards
  - Amount of support services to facilitate graduation/completion
- Fully implement 2023 City Council update of ordinance.
- Create a centralized resource for scholarships and support services available to Denver students.
- Expend \$12.8 M in reserve funds within 3 years to achieve these goals.



- Use data and stories to demonstrate Prosperity Denver Fund's value, building toward reauthorization:
  - Compile data to show how Prosperity Denver Fund both expands individual opportunity and builds the Denver economy.
  - Use communications strategies to amplify awareness of post-secondary opportunities and the work of our supported organizations.
- Build and maintain internal systems to steward taxpayer investments efficiently and effectively:
  - Partner with Office of Children's Affairs on quality assurance.
  - Implement data management solution to facilitate accuracy.
