




# COLLABORATING ACROSS COLORADO

In October 2019 with support from Community Solutions, Kaiser Permanente, and the Colorado Health Foundation, the State of Colorado launched Built for Zero: Colorado. A collaborative effort between local community teams, statewide partners, and federal agencies, Built for Zero: Colorado is focused on using real-time, person-specific data to measurably end homelessness, one population at a time.

We believe that by adopting a system-wide approach, improving data systems, establishing rigorous goals and corresponding benchmarks, embracing peer-learning, and supporting local leadership structures, we can drive this critical work forward in a measurable and sustainable manner. Our vision is that everyone in Colorado has a safe, stable, and affordable place to live. Together we can create a future where homelessness is rare and brief when it occurs, and no one gets left behind.



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
