14	Sec. 2-255.48.	- Legislative intent.			
15	The city counci	I hereby declares that neighborh	ood safety, crime prevention, and control are major		
16	goals for the C	ity and County of Denver. The I	egislative intent of this division is to implement an		
17	evidence-base	d, accountable, and efficient publ	ic safety strategy to reduce crime, including juvenile		
18	delinquency, and to increase neighborhood safety. To that end, the council establishes a crime				
19	prevention and	control commission which shall	have the following purposes:		
20	(1)	To reduce crime, partly by redu	ucing criminal recidivism;		
21	(2)	To facilitate coordination amo	ng justice system agencies and community-based		
22		organizations;			
23	(3)	To support the development of	f a data-driven criminal justice system that offers a		
24		range of evidence-based sanc	tions and programs;		
25	(4)	To consider the impact on ne	eighborhoods when formulating or recommending		
26		alternatives to incarceration an	nd the release of individuals into the community;		
27	(4 <u>5</u>)	To facilitate the development	of information technology and data necessary for

- To facilitate efficient use of jail space by encouraging alternatives, where appropriate; and

 To recommend expenditures from the crime prevention and control fund request annual appropriations as determined by a vote of the Commissioners.
- 5 Sec. 2-255.49. Commission created.
- 6 There is hereby created a crime prevention and control commission, (hereinafter referred to as
- 7 "the commission"). The members of the commission should reflect the diversity of Denver,
- 8 including the ethnic, racial, and geographic constitution of the population as well as the diverse
- 9 professional backgrounds, experience, and expertise of the citizens people of Denver. The
- 10 commission shall consist of up to thirty-three (33) members as follows:
- 11 (a) The following fifteen (15) officers or the officer's designated representative:
- 12 (1) The mayor.
- 13 (2) The manager of human services.
- 14 (3) The manager of safety.
- 15 (4) The chief of police.
- 16 (5) The sheriff.

- 17 (6) The presiding judge of the county court.
- 18 (7) The city attorney.
- 19 (8) The chief municipal public defender.
 - (9) The Denver director of community corrections.
- 21 (10) The manager of public health and environment.
- 22 (11) The director of the division of adult parole.
- 23 (12) The chief probation officer, Denver adult district court probation department.
- 24 (13) The chief probation officer, Denver county court probation.
- 25 (14) The office head, Denver's state public defender's office.
- 26 (15) The Denver district attorney.
- 27 (b) The following fifteen (15) members to be appointed by the mayor and confirmed by the city council:

- (1) An attorney in private practice from the defense bar.
 (2) A provider of services for <u>individuals</u> <u>offenders</u>-with demonstrated expertise in evidence-based criminal justice policy and practices.
- 4 (3) A representative of Denver public schools' leadership team.
- 5 (4) Two (2) representatives of the juvenile justice system.
- 6 (5) An academic knowledgeable in evidence-based criminal justice policy and practices.
- 7 (6) A representative of the behavioral health service system.
 - (7) A representative of homeless service providers.
 - (8) Up to three (3) victim advocates or victim representatives or representatives from community coalitions/organizations that are focused on justice and/or crime prevention from geographically diverse areas of Denver most impacted by crime.
- 12 (9) A member of the Denver state legislative delegation.
- 13 (109) Up to three (3) representatives of the Denver community.
- 14 (110) A previous justice-involved community representative.
- 15 (c) Up to three (3) members of the city council, to be appointed by the president of the city council.
- 17 Sec. 2-255.50. Term of commissioners.

- 18 (a) The appointed members of the commission shall serve for a period of <u>four (4) years.</u> three
 19 (3) years to be staggered by appointing one third of the initial non-designated membership
 20 for three-year terms, another third for two (2) years, and the remaining third for one (1)
 21 year. Initial terms shall be set by the appointing authority.
- 22 (b) Commissioners may be reappointed for successive terms up to a maximum of three (3) terms.

- 1 Sec. 2-255.51. Vacancies.
- 2 Any vacancy which occurs on the commission shall be filled in accordance with the provisions of
- 3 section 2-255.49 and the new member so appointed to the commission shall serve the un-expired
- 4 term.
- 5 **Sec. 2-255.52. Compensation.**
- 6 The members shall serve without compensation; provided, however, that members of the
- 7 commission may be reimbursed for reasonable expenses incurred in performance of their duties
- 8 pursuant to the rules and regulations of the city for such reimbursement.
- 9 **Sec. 2-255.53. Officers.**
- 10 The commission shall establish officers in accordance with its bylaws.
- 11 Sec. 2-255.53<u>4</u>. Meetings.
- 12 (a) The schedule of regular meetings of the commission shall be established by a majority of the membership, but the commission must meet at least six (6) times annually.
- 14 (b) Additional meetings shall be called as needed by the chair of the commission.
- 15 Sec. 2-255.545. Powers and duties.
- The purpose of the commission shall be to formulate foster innovation and alternatives in the
- 17 criminal justice system, to provide initial funding opportunities for projects that advance these
- ideals, and make recommendations to other agencies as provided in this section. Any such
- 19 recommendation may be made either to criminal justice departments and agencies of the city
- 20 itself, or to independent <u>community-based</u> criminal justice <u>agencies organizations</u> operating in the
- 21 second judicial district pursuant to the authority of the state constitution or state laws; provided
- 22 however, nothing in this division 41-shall be construed to affect in any way the authority of any
- 23 state officer or agency to exercise the powers and duties vested in such officer or agency by state
- law. The powers and duties of the commission shall be as follows:
- 25 (a) To c Conduct strategic planning and analysis and strategic planning related to
 26 management of Denver's criminal justice system, to promote accountability by criminal
 27 justice departments and agencies, and to develop performance measures and standards
- by which to evaluate the performance of the commission itself;

- 1 (b) To f Facilitate development of a coordinated criminal justice system sanctioning philosophy
 2 and policies, and monitor implementation of the philosophy and policies by the departments
 3 and agencies responsible for administering the criminal justice system in the City and
 4 County of Denver:
- To the extent permitted by state law, to-collect and analyze data on the incidence and nature of crime in Denver and assess the impact of criminal activities and juvenile delinquency upon the residents of Denver, including the extent to which social determinants of health, including, but not limited to, housing, employment, education, health care, behavioral health care, economic stability, and neighborhood safety addressing behavioral health needs may affect those who become involved in the justice system before, during and after systems' involvement;
- 12 (d) To establish a process by which to recommend funding support for programs which
 13 includes monitoring the expenditures and available budget for the commission, and
 14 advising the mayor, city council and other departments or agencies on the continuation or
 15 termination of programs;
- 16 (e-d) Make recommendations to the mayor, the city council and other departments and agencies
 17 through the expending authority regarding the distribution, expenditure, and management
 18 of any and all monies appropriated from the Denver crime prevention and control fund, to
 19 support criminal justice planning activities and use of evidence-based programs and
 20 services to improve public safety;

- (f-e) To u-Undertake, on a continuing basis, an evaluation of the capacity and operations of the criminal justice system by completing regular system mapping, analyzing offender flow of individuals and "bed" usage, establishing projections to manage future space needs and recommending policy to utilize scarce jail beds for people whose behaviors cannot be managed through community- and system-based alternatives the most serious offenders and facilitating the development of a range of evidence-based sanctions and programs that will reduce recidivism;
- 28 (f) Stimulate community interest and involvement in appropriately addressing criminal justice

- 2 To r Report annually by July 15 October to the mayor and city council recommending (g) 3 changes in policies and programs to reduce victimization, to promote data-guided 4 management, to help guide budgeting and administration, to diminish criminal recidivism and to improve overall public safety; The annual report shall include a detailed plan of 5 6 recommended expenditures from the Denver crime prevention and control fund for the 7 following fiscal year. The report shall also include information about the jail population by 8 characteristics, length of stay, and offense, trends in the jail population, comparative jail 9 population and crime data, and other appropriate measurements of how the criminal justice 10 system is functioning;
- (h) To s Seek federal grants and private sources of funding for innovative criminal justice
 projects and programs;
 - (i) <u>To p Promote cooperation</u>, collaboration and shared responsibility among justice system departments and agencies including but not limited to: programming, grant writing, appropriations and budgeting, and use of <u>offender risk</u> assessment systems to guide the imposition or modification of sanctions;
- 17 (j) To seek public input regarding commission activities and citywide needs, all commission meetings are open to the public; <u>and</u>
- 19 (k) To consider the impact on residential neighborhoods related to the release of offenders into
 20 the community when formulating or recommending any alternatives to incarceration,
 21 including but not limited to the expansion and concentration of community corrections
 22 facilities:
- 23 (I) To foster innovation and alternatives in the criminal justice system and to provide initial
 24 funding opportunities for projects that advance these ideals; and
- 25 (mk) To p-Perform ongoing system data collection, to the extent permitted by state law, 26 including, but not limited to: as described in commission bylaws.
- 27 (1) Researching the jail population, how it has changed, and the measures needed for each individual to reduce repeat offense;

- 1 Mapping the criminal justice system to identify decision points and timelines for 2 processing compared to appropriate performance standards; and
 - (3) Conducting an inventory of existing programs, whether programs address factors that research shows reduce offender recidivism, and the extent to which they follow evidenced-based practices.
 - (n) As appropriate, the commission will work with judicial officers in an advisory capacity.

The commission will establish and adopt bylaws and internal guidelines governing its operations, including duties and responsibilities of the commission's leadership officers, and will promulgate rules and regulations as necessary to achieve the purposes of this division.

Sec. 2-255.567. – Crime prevention and control fund created.

There is hereby created a crime prevention and control fund, hereinafter "fund," for the purpose of implementing recommendations from the commission, receiving revenue and making transactions per said recommendations.

Sec. 2-255.578. – Staffing and administrative support.

Staffing and other administrative support for the commission shall be provided by the department of safety, of public health and environment and hiring decisions shall be made with input from the commission's officers.

Sec. 2-255.589. – Relation to city departments, agencies, and expending authorities.

- 20 (a) Departments and agencies of the city responsible for administering the criminal justice system and related services shall cooperate with the commission to support the purpose of 22 this division.
 - (b) No expending authority shall make any expenditure from the fund unless and until the commission is consulted on the expenditure and afforded an opportunity to review the proposed expenditure and make a recommendation to the expending authority prior to the disbursement of any monies in the fund. However, the expending authority of the commission is authorized to approve payments of up to ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) for expenditures that are consistent with the commission's annual plan for expenditures

1	from the fund, as required by section 2-255.54, without prior consultation with the
