

AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is made between the **CITY AND COUNTY OF DENVER**, a municipal corporation of the State of Colorado (the “City”) and **THE COLORADO COALITION FOR THE HOMELESS**, a Colorado non-profit corporation whose address is 2111 Champa Street, Denver, Colorado 80205 (the “Contractor”), individually a “Party” and jointly the “Parties.”

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the City desires a contractor to provide supportive housing services for individuals who have a history of homelessness and are utilizers of the City’s jail system;

WHEREAS, the services associated with supportive housing include, without limitation, intensive case management, crisis intervention, substance use counseling, mental health treatment, peer support, skills building, connection to primary health care, and various other services identified as necessary in each particular participant’s treatment plan; and

WHEREAS, the Contractor wishes to provide such supportive housing services, and the City wishes to retain the Contractor to provide such supportive housing services, all in conformance with the terms and conditions herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements hereinafter set forth and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the Parties incorporate the recitals set forth above and agree as follows:

1. **COORDINATION AND LIAISON**: The Contractor shall fully coordinate all services under this Agreement with the Executive Director/Chief Housing Officer (along with any designees, “Director”) of the City’s Department of Housing Stability (“Agency” or “HOST”).
2. **SERVICES TO BE PERFORMED**: As the Director directs, the Contractor shall diligently undertake, perform, and complete all of the services and produce all the deliverables set forth in **Exhibit A**, Scope of Work, to the City’s satisfaction. The Contractor is ready, willing, and able to provide the services required by this Agreement. The Contractor shall faithfully perform the services in accordance with the standards of care, skill, training, diligence, and judgment provided by highly competent individuals performing services of a similar nature to those described in the Agreement and in accordance with the terms of the Agreement. All records, data, specifications, and documentation prepared by the Contractor under this Agreement, when delivered to and accepted by the Director, shall become the property of the City.
3. **TERM**: The Agreement will commence on January 1, 2023, and will expire, unless sooner terminated, on December 31, 2023 (the “Term”). Subject to the Director’s prior written authorization, the Contractor shall complete any work in progress as of the expiration date and the Term will extend until the work is completed or earlier terminated by the Director.
4. **COMPENSATION AND PAYMENT**
 - 4.1. **Budget**: The City shall pay, and the Contractor shall accept as the sole compensation for services rendered and costs incurred and paid under the Agreement payment not to exceed the line budget amounts set forth in **Exhibit A**. The Contractor certifies the budget line items in **Exhibit A** contain reasonable allowable direct costs and allocable indirect costs in accordance with 2 C.F.R. 200, Subpart E. The City shall not allow claims for services furnished by the Contractor that are not specifically authorized by this Agreement.
 - 4.2. **Reimbursable Expenses**: There are no reimbursable expenses allowed under the Agreement. All the Contractor’s expenses are contained in the budget in **Exhibit A**. The City is

not obligated to pay the Contractor for any other fees, costs, expenses, or charges of any nature that may be incurred and paid by the Contractor in performing services under this Agreement including but not limited to personnel, benefits, contract labor, overhead, administrative costs, operating costs, supplies, equipment, and out-of-pocket expenses.

- 4.3. Invoicing:** The Contractor shall provide the City with a monthly invoice in a format and with a level of detail acceptable to the City. Invoices shall be accompanied by documentation of expenses for which payment is sought as well as other supporting documentation required by the City. The City's Prompt Payment Ordinance, §§ 20-107 to 20-118, D.R.M.C., applies to invoicing and payment under this Agreement. Funds will be disbursed in appropriate monthly increments, upon receipt and approval of Contractor's monthly invoices and any City required budget documents or reports. The Contractor's invoices will include all appropriate supporting documentation that may be pertinent to the services performed or expenses incurred and paid under this Agreement. The Contractor's invoices must identify costs and expenses incurred and paid in accordance with the budget contained in **Exhibit A**. Funds payable by the City hereunder shall be distributed to the Contractor on a reimbursement basis only for work performed and expenses incurred and paid during the prior month. Invoices submitted for payment must be received by the Agency as detailed in the attached **Exhibit A** or as otherwise directed. Invoices submitted for services rendered that are submitted after such deadline are untimely and must be submitted separately to be considered for payment. Payment for such late-submitted invoices shall be made only upon a showing of good cause for the late submission.
- 4.4. Timesheets:** If applicable, timesheets must reflect the amount of time, in hours and tenths of hours, attributable to each activity performed under this Agreement. The Contractor must not allocate costs billed to this Agreement to another federal award, if applicable, unless the City notifies the Contractor in writing that that the City has shifted costs that are allowable under two or more federal awards in accordance with existing federal statutes, regulations, or the terms and conditions of an applicable federal award. Each invoice requesting payment under this Agreement will contain all necessary attestations as directed by the City.
- 4.5. Maximum Contract Amount**
- 4.5.1.** Notwithstanding any other provision of the Agreement, the City's maximum payment obligation will not exceed **Three Million, Three Hundred and Seventy-Seven Thousand Dollars and Zero Cents** (\$3,377,000.00) (the "Maximum Contract Amount"). The City is not obligated to execute an Agreement or any amendments for any further services, including any services performed by the Contractor beyond that specifically described in **Exhibit A**. Any services performed beyond those in **Exhibit A** or performed outside the Term are performed at the Contractor's risk and without authorization under the Agreement.
- 4.5.2.** The City's payment obligation, whether direct or contingent, extends only to funds appropriated annually by the Denver City Council, paid into the Treasury of the City, and encumbered for the purpose of the Agreement. The City does not by this Agreement irrevocably pledge present cash reserves for payment or performance in future fiscal years. The Agreement does not and is not intended to create a multiple-fiscal year direct or indirect debt or financial obligation of the City.
- 4.6. Budget Modifications:** If applicable, budget line items may only be modified in accordance with Budget Modification Policy No. 1703-495, as amended. Notwithstanding the preceding sentence, each budget line item modification to **Exhibit A** shall not take effect until approved in writing in accordance with Budget Modification Policy No. 1703-495, and any modification to **Exhibit A** that requires an increase in the Maximum Contract Amount shall be evidenced by a written amendment prepared and executed by both Parties in the same manner as this Agreement.

5. **PROGRAM RESTRICTIONS**

- 5.1. **Funding Contingency:** If federal funds or non-City funds constitute all or some of the funding under this Agreement, the City's obligation to pay the Contractor shall be contingent upon such federal funds or non-City funding continuing to be made available for payment. If state, federal, or other funds are not appropriated, or otherwise become unavailable to fund this Agreement, the City may, upon written notice, terminate this Agreement, in whole or in part, without incurring further liability. The City will, however, pay for services and goods that are delivered and accepted prior to the effective date of notice of termination, and this termination shall otherwise be treated as if this Agreement were terminated in the public interest.
- 5.2. **Recovery of Incorrect Payments:** If, because of any audit or program review relating to the performance of the Contractor or its officers, agents or employees under this Agreement, there are any irregularities or deficiencies in any audit or review, then the Contractor will, upon notice from the City, correct all identified irregularities or deficiencies within the time frames designated in the City's written notice. If corrections are not made by such date, then the final resolution of identified deficiencies or disputes shall be deemed to be resolved in the City's favor unless the Contractor obtains a resolution in its favor from the responsible official conducting the audit or review. In any event, the Contractor shall be responsible to indemnify and save harmless the City, its officers, agents and employees, from and against all disallowed costs. The foregoing in no way limits the Contractor's obligation to reimburse the City for any costs or expenses paid under this Agreement that have been determined to be unallowable or disallowed by the federal government of the United States, the State of Colorado, or the City in accordance with applicable federal laws, state, and local laws. The closeout of a federal award does not affect the right of the federal agency, the State of Colorado, or the City to disallow costs and recover funds because of a later audit or other review.
- 5.3. **Matching Funds:** As may be required by federal, state, or local law, the Contractor shall provide eligible matching funds or in-kind contributions as provided in **Exhibit A**. Prior to using federal funds as a source of matching funds, the Contractor shall require approval from the City and the applicable awarding agency. If applicable, the Contractor shall report in writing to the City all contributions to be applied toward any non-federal match required under this Agreement ("Match Report(s)"). Match Reports shall be submitted every four (4) months from the Term start date and attached to that month's invoice. The Contractor shall be responsible for documenting and maintaining accurate records to the reasonable satisfaction of the City and provide documentation that supports the match consistent with the federal guidelines found in 24 C.F.R. §§ 578, *et seq.* Such contributions shall be recorded on a Match Report and submitted to the City and shall be available along with back up documentation for review at the request of the City. Match Reports shall list all contributions provided by the Contractor toward the match requirement and shall list the total amount of contributions made as of the date of the Match Report. The City reserves the right to withhold, adjust and/or reallocate final payments under this Agreement if it determines that the required match is not being met to the City's satisfaction or the current spending is inconsistent with amounts of non-federal match contributions. The Contractor's Match Report shall be certified to be correct by an authorized representative of the Contractor and shall reference the Agreement number as designated below on the City's signature page.
- 5.4. **Closeout Procedures:** The Contractor shall comply with all contract closeout procedures directed by the City under this Agreement for final reimbursement, including but not limited to final review of payments, invoices, referrals, and required reporting documents, including closeout signature. To complete closeout, the Contractor shall timely provide the City with all deliverables, including documentation, and the Contractor final reimbursement request or invoice.

- 5.5. Client Records:** The use or disclosure by any party of any information concerning a program participant for any purpose not directly connected with the administration of the applicable award or this Agreement is prohibited except upon written consent of the program participant, their attorney, or guardian.
- 5.6. Pass-Through Provisions Required:** If the Contractor enters into any subcontracts or subgrants with other individuals or entities and pays those individuals or entities for such goods or services with federal or state funds, the Contractor shall include provisions in its subcontracts regarding the federal and state laws identified or referenced in this Agreement. The Contractor retains full responsibility for complying with the terms of this Agreement, whether the services are provided directly or by a third party, and for including all relevant terms in its subcontracts.
- 5.7. Grievance Policy:** The Parties desire to ensure that program participants are being adequately informed over pending actions concerning their continued participation in the program or activity provided by the Contractor. Also, program participants must be allowed adequate opportunity to communicate dissatisfaction with the facilities or services offered by the Contractor. To satisfy this requirement, the Contractor agrees to provide a written “Grievance Policy” as a mechanism to provide opportunities for the City and the program participants to meaningfully communicate problems, dissatisfaction, and concerns and to establish procedures for resolution of grievances. The policy must be communicated to clients upon their initial receipt of services. The Contractor agrees that a formal “Grievance Policy” will be adopted by its governing body and submitted to the Director for approval at the City’s discretion on or before the commencement of the term of this Agreement. Failure to provide an acceptable Grievance Policy shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement.
- 5.8. Verification of Lawful Presence:** To the extent required by law, the Parties will cooperate to verify the lawful presence in the United States, of each natural person eighteen (18) years of age or older, who applies for federal, state, or local public benefits conferred pursuant to this Agreement. Verification of lawful presence in the United States is not required for any purpose for which lawful presence in the United States is not explicitly required by law, ordinance, or rule. Any expenditure by the Contractor in violation of this provision, or any related federal or state laws, rules, or regulations are unauthorized expenditures subject to reimbursement.
- 5.9. Political Activity:** The Contractor agrees that political activities are prohibited under this Agreement and further agrees that no funds paid by the City hereunder will be used to provide transportation to polling places or to provide any other services in connection with elections or political activities.
- 5.10. Non-Discrimination:** The Contractor agrees to comply with all federal and state statutes relating to nondiscrimination, including but not limited to, Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Pub. L. 88-352, which prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color or national origin; Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, 20 U.S.C. §§ 1681-1683 and 1685- 1686, which prohibits discrimination on the basis of sex; Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, 29 U.S.C. § 794, which prohibits discrimination on the basis of handicaps and the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990; the Age Discrimination Act of 1974, 42 U.S.C. §§ 6101-6107, which prohibits discrimination on the basis of age; the Drug Abuse Office and Treatment Act of 1972, Pub. L. 92-255, relating to nondiscrimination on the basis of drug abuse; the Comprehensive Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism Prevention, Treatment and Rehabilitation Act of 1970, Pub. L. 91-616, relating to the nondiscrimination on the basis of alcohol abuse or alcoholism; §§ 523 and 527 of the Public Health Service Act of 1912, 42 U.S.C. §§ 290, *et seq.*, relating to confidentiality of alcohol and drug abuse patient records; Executive Order 11246; the Vietnam Era Veterans’ Readjustment Assistance Act of 1974, 38 U.S.C. § 4212, relating to nondiscrimination of protected veterans; Title VIII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968, 42 U.S.C. § 3601, *et seq.*, relating

to nondiscrimination in the sale, rental or financing of housing; all regulations and administrative rules established pursuant to the foregoing laws; any additional nondiscrimination provision in any specific statute applicable to any federal or state funding for this Agreement; and the requirements of any other nondiscrimination statutes which may apply.

6. **EXAMINATION OF RECORDS AND AUDITS:** Any authorized agent of the City, including the City Auditor or his or her representative, has the right to access, and the right to examine, copy and retain copies, at City's election in paper or electronic form, any pertinent books, documents, papers and records related to the Contractor's performance pursuant to this Agreement, provision of any goods or services to the City, and any other transactions related to this Agreement. The Contractor shall cooperate with City representatives and City representatives shall be granted access to the foregoing documents and information during reasonable business hours and until the latter of five (5) years after the final payment under the Agreement or expiration of the applicable statute of limitations. When conducting an audit of this Agreement, the City Auditor shall be subject to government auditing standards issued by the United States Government Accountability Office by the Comptroller General of the United States, including with respect to disclosure of information acquired during the course of an audit. No examination of records and audits pursuant to this paragraph shall require the Contractor to make disclosures in violation of state or federal privacy laws. The Contractor shall at all times comply with D.R.M.C. 20-276.
7. **REPORTS:** The Contractor shall provide the Agency with the reports described in **Exhibit A** in such a format as may be designated by the City. Reports may be submitted electronically by disk or e-mail, followed by hard copy transmittal. In addition, the Contractor shall disclose, in a timely manner, in writing to the City and the federal or state awarding agency, all violations of federal or state criminal law involving fraud, bribery, or gratuity violations potentially affecting the applicable award. The City, the State of Colorado, or any relevant federal agency may impose penalties for noncompliance allowed under 2 C.F.R. Part 180, 2 C.F.R. § 200.338, and 31 U.S.C. § 3321, which may include, without limitation, suspension, or debarment.
8. **PERFORMANCE MONITORING/INSPECTION:** The Contractor shall permit the Director to monitor and review the Contractor's performance under this Agreement. The Contractor shall make available to the City for inspection all files, records, reports, policies, minutes, materials, books, documents, papers, invoices, accounts, payrolls and other data, whether in hard copy or electronic format, used in the performance of any of the services required hereunder or relating to any matter covered by this Agreement to coordinate the performance of services by the Contractor in accordance with the terms of this Agreement. All such monitoring and inspection shall be performed in a manner that will not unduly interfere with the services to be provided under this Agreement. The Contractor agrees that the reporting and record keeping requirements specified in this Agreement are a material element of performance and that if, in the opinion of the City, the Contractor's record keeping practices and/or reporting to the City are not conducted in a timely and satisfactory manner, the City may withhold part or all payments under this Agreement until such deficiencies have been remedied. In the event of a withheld payment, the City agrees to notify the Contractor of the deficiencies that must be corrected to bring about the release of the withheld payment.
9. **STATUS OF CONTRACTOR:** The Contractor is an independent contractor retained to perform professional or technical services for limited periods of time. Neither the Contractor nor any of its employees are employees or officers of the City under Chapter 18 of the Denver Revised Municipal Code, or for any purpose whatsoever.
10. **TERMINATION**
 - 10.1. The City has the right to terminate the Agreement with cause upon written notice effective immediately, and without cause upon thirty (30) days prior written notice to the Contractor.

However, nothing gives the Contractor the right to perform services under the Agreement beyond the time when its services become unsatisfactory to the Director.

- 10.2. Notwithstanding the preceding paragraph, the City may terminate the Agreement if the Contractor or any of its officers or employees are convicted, plead *nolo contendere*, enter into a formal agreement in which they admit guilt, enter a plea of guilty or otherwise admit culpability to criminal offenses of bribery, kickbacks, collusive bidding, bid-rigging, antitrust, fraud, undue influence, theft, racketeering, extortion or any offense of a similar nature in connection with the Contractor's business. Termination for the reasons stated in this paragraph is effective upon receipt of notice.
- 10.3. The City is entering into this Agreement to serve the public interest. If this Agreement ceases to further the City's public interest, the City, in its sole discretion, may terminate this Agreement, in whole or in part, for convenience by giving written notice to the Contractor.
- 10.4. Upon termination of the Agreement, with or without cause, the Contractor shall have no claim against the City by reason of, or arising out of, incidental or relating to termination, except for compensation for work duly requested and satisfactorily performed as described in the Agreement.
- 10.5. If the Agreement is terminated, the City is entitled to and will take possession of all materials, equipment, tools, and facilities it owns that are in the Contractor's possession, custody, or control by whatever method the City deems expedient. The Contractor shall deliver all documents in any form that were prepared under the Agreement and all other items, materials and documents that have been paid for by the City to the City. These documents and materials are the property of the City. The Contractor shall mark all copies of work product that are incomplete at the time of termination "DRAFT-INCOMPLETE."
- 10.6. If a relevant funding agreement between the City and the applicable state or federal funding entity is terminated for any reason, the total amount of compensation to be paid to the Contractor under this Agreement shall be reduced effective as of the date of termination of such funding agreement.

11. REMEDIES FOR NONCOMPLIANCE: If the Contractor does not correct an identified default within the specified timeframe, then the City may impose any or all the following remedial actions, in addition to all other remedial actions authorized by law:

- 11.1. Withhold any or all payments to the Contractor, in whole or in part, until the necessary services or corrections in performance are satisfactorily completed during the authorized period to cure default;
- 11.2. Deny all requests for payment and/or demand reimbursement from the Contractor of all payments previously made to the Contractor for those services or deliverables that have not been satisfactorily performed and which, due to circumstances caused by or within the control of the Contractor, cannot be performed or if performed would be of no value to the program. Denial of requests for payment and demands for reimbursement shall be reasonably related to the amount of work or deliverables lost to the City;
- 11.3. Deny in whole or in part any application or proposal from the Contractor for funding of the program for a subsequent program year regardless of source of funds;
- 11.4. Reduce any application or proposal from the Contractor for refunding for the program for a subsequent program year by any percentage or amount that is less than the total amount of compensation provided in this Agreement regardless of source of funds;
- 11.5. Refuse to award the Contractor, in whole or in part, all additional funds for expanded or additional services under the program;
- 11.6. Deny or modify any future awards, grants, or contracts of any nature by the City regardless of funding source for the Contractor;

11.7. Modify, suspend, remove, or terminate the Agreement, in whole or in part. If the Agreement, or any portion thereof, is modified, suspended, removed, or terminated, the Contractor shall cooperate with the City in the transfer of the services as reasonably designated by the City; and/or

11.8. If this Agreement is terminated as a result of a default by the Contractor, the City may procure, upon such terms and conditions as the City deems appropriate, services similar to those terminated, and the Contractor shall be liable to the City for any damages arising from obtaining similar services.

12. WHEN RIGHTS AND REMEDIES NOT WAIVED: In no event will any payment or other action by the City constitute or be construed to be a waiver by the City of any breach of covenant or default that may then exist on the part of the Contractor. No payment, other action, or inaction by the City when any breach or default exists will impair or prejudice any right or remedy available to it with respect to any breach or default. No assent, expressed or implied, to any breach of any term of the Agreement constitutes a waiver of any other breach.

13. INSURANCE

13.1. General Conditions: The Contractor agrees to secure, at or before the time of execution of this Agreement, the following insurance covering all operations, goods or services provided pursuant to this Agreement. The Contractor shall keep the required insurance coverage in force at all times during the term of the Agreement, including any extension thereof, and during any warranty period. The required insurance shall be underwritten by an insurer licensed or authorized to do business in Colorado and rated by A.M. Best Company as "A-VIII" or better. Each policy shall require notification to the City in the event any of the required policies be canceled or non-renewed before the expiration date thereof. Such written notice shall be sent to the parties identified in the Notices Section of this Agreement. Such notice shall reference the City contract number listed on the signature page of this Agreement. Said notice shall be sent thirty (30) days prior to such cancellation or non-renewal unless due to non-payment of premiums for which notice shall be sent ten (10) days prior. If such written notice is unavailable from the insurer, the Contractor shall provide written notice of cancellation, non-renewal and any reduction in coverage to the parties identified in the Notices Section by certified mail, return receipt requested within three (3) business days of such notice by its insurer(s) and referencing the City's contract number. The Contractor shall be responsible for the payment of any deductible or self-insured retention. The insurance coverages specified in this Agreement are the minimum requirements, and these requirements do not lessen or limit the liability of the Contractor. The Contractor shall maintain, at its own expense, any additional kinds or amounts of insurance that it may deem necessary to cover its obligations and liabilities under this Agreement.

13.2. Proof of Insurance: The Contractor may not commence services or work relating to this Agreement prior to placement of coverages required under this Agreement. The Contractor certifies that the certificate of insurance attached as **Exhibit B**, preferably an ACORD form, complies with all insurance requirements of this Agreement. The City requests that the City's contract number be referenced on the certificate of insurance. The City's acceptance of a certificate of insurance or other proof of insurance that does not comply with all insurance requirements set forth in this Agreement shall not act as a waiver of the Contractor's breach of this Agreement or of any of the City's rights or remedies under this Agreement. The City's Risk Management Office may require additional proof of insurance, including but not limited to policies and endorsements.

13.3. Additional Insureds: For Commercial General Liability, Auto Liability and Excess Liability/Umbrella (if required), the Contractor and subcontractor's insurer(s) shall include the

City and County of Denver, its elected and appointed officials, employees, and volunteers as additional insured.

- 13.4. Waiver of Subrogation:** For all coverages required under this Agreement, with the exception of Professional Liability, the Contractor's insurer shall waive subrogation rights against the City.
- 13.5. Subcontractors and Subconsultants:** The Contractor shall confirm and document that all subcontractors and subconsultants (including independent contractors, suppliers or other entities providing goods or services required by this Agreement) procure and maintain coverage as approved by the Contractor and appropriate to their respective primary business risks considering the nature and scope of services provided.
- 13.6. Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability Insurance:** The Contractor shall maintain the coverage as required by statute for each work location and shall maintain Employer's Liability insurance with limits of \$100,000 per occurrence for each bodily injury claim, \$100,000 per occurrence for each bodily injury caused by disease claim, and \$500,000 aggregate for all bodily injuries caused by disease claims.
- 13.7. Commercial General Liability:** The Contractor shall maintain a Commercial General Liability insurance policy with minimum limits of \$1,000,000 for each bodily injury and property damage occurrence, \$2,000,000 products and completed operations aggregate (if applicable), and \$2,000,000 policy aggregate. Policy shall not contain an exclusion for sexual abuse, molestation, or misconduct.
- 13.8. Automobile Liability:** The Contractor shall maintain Automobile Liability with minimum limits of \$1,000,000 combined single limit applicable to all owned, hired, and non-owned vehicles used in performing services under this Agreement.
- 13.9. Professional Liability (Errors & Omissions):** The Contractor shall maintain minimum limits of \$1,000,000 per claim and \$1,000,000 policy aggregate limit. The policy shall be kept in force, or a Tail policy placed, for three (3) years for all contracts except construction contracts for which the policy or Tail shall be kept in place for eight (8) years.
- 13.10. Cyber Liability:** The Contractor shall maintain Cyber Liability coverage with minimum limits of \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$1,000,000 policy aggregate covering claims involving privacy violations, information theft, damage to or destruction of electronic information, intentional and/or unintentional release of private information, alteration of electronic information, extortion and network security. If Claims Made, the policy shall be kept in force, or a Tail policy placed, for three (3) years.

14. DEFENSE AND INDEMNIFICATION

- 14.1.** The Contractor agrees to defend, indemnify, reimburse and hold harmless City, its appointed and elected officials, agents and employees for, from and against all liabilities, claims, judgments, suits or demands for damages to persons or property arising out of, resulting from, or relating to the work performed under this Agreement ("Claims"), unless such Claims have been specifically determined by the trier of fact to be the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the City. This indemnity shall be interpreted in the broadest possible manner to indemnify City for any acts or omissions of the Contractor or its subcontractors either passive or active, irrespective of fault, including City's concurrent negligence whether active or passive, except for the sole negligence or willful misconduct of City.
- 14.2.** The Contractor's duty to defend and indemnify City shall arise at the time written notice of the Claim is first provided to City regardless of whether Claimant has filed suit on the Claim. The Contractor's duty to defend and indemnify City shall arise even if City is the only party sued by claimant and/or claimant alleges that City's negligence or willful misconduct was the sole cause of claimant's damages.

- 14.3.** The Contractor shall defend any and all Claims which may be brought or threatened against City and shall pay on behalf of City any expenses incurred by reason of such Claims including, but not limited to, court costs and attorney fees incurred in defending and investigating such Claims or seeking to enforce this indemnity obligation. Such payments on behalf of City will be in addition to any other legal remedies available to City and will not be the City's exclusive remedy.
- 14.4.** Insurance coverage requirements specified in this Agreement in no way lessen or limit the liability of the Contractor under the terms of this indemnification obligation. The Contractor is responsible to obtain, at its own expense, any additional insurance that it deems necessary for the City's protection.
- 14.5.** This defense and indemnification obligation shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.
- 15. COLORADO GOVERNMENTAL IMMUNITY ACT:** In relation to the Agreement, the City is relying upon and has not waived the monetary limitations and all other rights, immunities and protection provided by the Colorado Governmental Immunity Act, C.R.S. §§ 24-10-101, *et seq.*
- 16. TAXES, CHARGES AND PENALTIES:** The City is not liable for the payment of taxes, late charges or penalties of any nature, except for any additional amounts that the City may be required to pay under the City's prompt payment ordinance D.R.M.C. §§ 20-107, *et seq.* The Contractor shall promptly pay when due, all taxes, bills, debts, and obligations it incurs performing the services under the Agreement and shall not allow any lien, mortgage, judgment, or execution to be filed against City property.
- 17. ASSIGNMENT; SUBCONTRACTING:** The Contractor shall not voluntarily or involuntarily assign any of its rights or obligations, or subcontract performance obligations, under this Agreement without obtaining the Director's prior written consent. Any assignment or subcontracting without such consent will be ineffective and void and will be cause for termination of this Agreement by the City. The Director has sole and absolute discretion whether to consent to any assignment or subcontracting, or to terminate the Agreement because of unauthorized assignment or subcontracting. In the event of any subcontracting or unauthorized assignment: (i) the Contractor shall remain responsible to the City; and (ii) no contractual relationship shall be created between the City and any subconsultant, subcontractor, or assign.
- 18. INUREMENT:** The rights and obligations of the Parties to the Agreement inure to the benefit of and shall be binding upon the Parties and their respective successors and assigns, provided assignments are consented to in accordance with the terms of the Agreement.
- 19. NO THIRD-PARTY BENEFICIARY:** Enforcement of the terms of the Agreement and all rights of action relating to enforcement are strictly reserved to the Parties. Nothing contained in the Agreement gives or allows any claim or right of action to any third person or entity. Any person or entity other than the City or the Contractor receiving services or benefits pursuant to the Agreement is an incidental beneficiary only.
- 20. NO AUTHORITY TO BIND CITY TO CONTRACTS:** The Contractor lacks any authority to bind the City on any contractual matters. Final approval of all contractual matters that purport to obligate the City must be executed by the City in accordance with the City's Charter and the Denver Revised Municipal Code.
- 21. SEVERABILITY:** Except for the provisions of the Agreement requiring appropriation of funds and limiting the total amount payable by the City, if a court of competent jurisdiction finds any provision of the Agreement or any portion of it to be invalid, illegal, or unenforceable, the validity of the remaining portions or provisions will not be affected, if the intent of the Parties can be fulfilled.
- 22. CONFLICT OF INTEREST**

22.1. No employee of the City shall have any personal or beneficial interest in the services or property described in the Agreement. The Contractor shall not hire, or contract for services with, any employee or officer of the City that would be in violation of the City’s Code of Ethics, D.R.M.C. §§ 2-51, *et seq.*, or the Charter §§ 1.2.8, 1.2.9, and 1.2.12.

22.2. The Contractor shall not engage in any transaction, activity or conduct that would result in a conflict of interest under the Agreement. The Contractor represents that it has disclosed any and all current or potential conflicts of interest. A conflict of interest shall include transactions, activities or conduct that would affect the judgment, actions or work of the Contractor by placing the Contractor’s own interests, or the interests of any party with whom the Contractor has a contractual arrangement, in conflict with those of the City. The City, in its sole discretion, will determine the existence of a conflict of interest and may terminate the Agreement if it determines a conflict exists, after it has given the Contractor written notice describing the conflict.

23. NOTICES: All notices required by the terms of the Agreement must be hand delivered, sent by overnight courier service, mailed by certified mail, return receipt requested, or mailed via United States mail, postage prepaid, if to the Contractor at the address aforementioned and to the City at the addresses below:

Notices hand delivered or sent by overnight courier are effective upon delivery. Notices sent by certified mail are effective upon receipt. Notices sent by mail are effective upon deposit with the U.S. Postal Service. The Parties may designate substitute addresses where or persons to whom notices are to be mailed or delivered. However, these substitutions will not become effective until actual receipt of written notification.

24. NO EMPLOYMENT OF A WORKER WITHOUT AUTHORIZATION TO PERFORM WORK UNDER THE AGREEMENT

24.1. This Agreement is subject to Division 5 of Article IV of Chapter 20 of the Denver Revised Municipal Code, and any amendments (the “Certification Ordinance”).

24.2. The Contractor certifies that:

24.2.1. At the time of its execution of this Agreement, it does not knowingly employ or contract with a worker without authorization who will perform work under this Agreement, nor will it knowingly employ or contract with a worker without authorization to perform work under this agreement in the future.

24.2.2. It will participate in the E-Verify Program and confirm the employment eligibility of all employees who are newly hired for employment to perform work under this Agreement.

24.2.3. It will not enter into a contract with a subconsultant or subcontractor that fails to certify to the Contractor that it shall not knowingly employ or contract with a worker without authorization to perform work under the Agreement.

24.2.4. It is prohibited from using the E-Verify Program procedures to undertake pre-employment screening of job applicants while performing its obligations under the Agreement, and it is required to comply with any and all federal requirements related to use of the E-Verify Program including, by way of example, all program requirements related to employee notification and preservation of employee rights.

24.2.5. If it obtains actual knowledge that a subconsultant or subcontractor performing work under the Agreement knowingly employs or contracts with a worker without authorization, it will notify such subconsultant or subcontractor and the City within three (3) days. The Contractor shall also terminate such subconsultant or subcontractor if within three (3) days after such notice the subconsultant or subcontractor does not stop employing or contracting with the worker without authorization, unless during the three-day period the subconsultant or subcontractor provides information to establish that the subconsultant or subcontractor has not knowingly employed or contracted with a worker without authorization.

24.2.6. It will comply with a reasonable request made in the course of an investigation by the Colorado Department of Labor and Employment, or the City Auditor, under authority of D.R.M.C. 20-90.3.

24.3. The Contractor is liable for any violations as provided in the Certification Ordinance. If the Contractor violates any provision of this section or the Certification Ordinance, the City may terminate this Agreement for a breach of the Agreement. If the Agreement is so terminated, the Contractor shall be liable for actual and consequential damages to the City. Any termination of a contract due to a violation of this section or the Certification Ordinance may also, at the discretion of the City, constitute grounds for disqualifying the Contractor from submitting bids or proposals for future contracts with the City.

25. DISPUTES: All disputes between the City and the Contractor arising out of or regarding the Agreement will be resolved by administrative hearing pursuant to the procedure established by D.R.M.C. § 56-106(b)-(f). For the purposes of that administrative procedure, the City official rendering a final determination shall be the Director as defined in this Agreement.

26. GOVERNING LAW; VENUE: The Agreement will be construed and enforced in accordance with applicable federal law, the laws of the State of Colorado, and the Charter, Revised Municipal Code, ordinances, regulations and Executive Orders of the City and County of Denver, which are expressly incorporated into the Agreement. Unless otherwise specified, any reference to statutes, laws, regulations, charter or code provisions, ordinances, executive orders, or related memoranda, includes amendments or supplements to same. Venue for any legal action relating to the Agreement will be in the District Court of the State of Colorado, Second Judicial District (Denver District Court).

27. NO DISCRIMINATION IN EMPLOYMENT: In connection with the performance of work under the Agreement, the Contractor may not refuse to hire, discharge, promote, demote, or discriminate in matters of compensation against any person otherwise qualified, solely because of race, color, religion, national origin, ethnicity, citizenship, immigration status, gender, age, sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, marital status, source of income, military status, protective hairstyle, or disability. The Contractor shall insert the foregoing provision in all subcontracts.

28. NO DISCRIMINATION IN PROGRAM ASSISTANCE: In connection with the performance of work under the Agreement, the Contractor may not, in providing program assistance, discriminate against a program beneficiary or prospective program beneficiary on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin, ancestry, gender, age, military status, sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression, marital or domestic partner status, political beliefs or affiliation, familial or parental status—including pregnancy, medical condition, military service, protective hairstyle, genetic information, or disability. The Contractor shall insert the foregoing provision in all subcontracts.

- 29. LIMITED ENGLISH PROFICIENCY:** Executive Order 13166, Improving Access to Services for persons with Limited English Proficiency, and resulting agency guidance, states national origin discrimination includes discrimination based on limited English proficiency (“LEP”). To ensure compliance with the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 and Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Contractor must reasonably ensure that LEP persons have meaningful access to its programs, services, and activities. The Contractor shall not charge program participants for the use of an oral or written translator or interpretation services. The Contractor shall comply with the City’s requirements concerning the provision of interpreter services under this Agreement.
- 30. FAITH BASED ORGANIZATIONS AND SECTARIAN ACTIVITIES:** The Contractor shall not engage in inherently religious activities, such as worship, religious instruction, or proselytizing as part of the programs or services funded under this Agreement.
- 31. COMPLIANCE WITH ALL LAWS:** The Contractor shall perform or cause to be performed all services in full compliance with all applicable laws, rules, regulations and codes of the United States, the State of Colorado; and with the Charter, ordinances, rules, regulations and Executive Orders of the City and County of Denver. These laws, regulations, and other authorities are incorporated by reference herein to the extent that they are applicable and required by law to be so incorporated.
- 32. STATUTES, REGULATIONS, AND OTHER AUTHORITY:** Reference to any statute, rule, regulation, policy, executive order, or other authority means such authority as amended, modified, codified, replaced, or reenacted, in whole or in part, and in effect, including rules and regulations promulgated thereunder, and reference to any section or other provision of any authority means that provision of such authority in effect and constituting the substantive amendment, modification, codification, replacement, or reenactment of such section or other provision, in each case except to the extent that this would increase or alter the Parties respective liabilities under this Agreement. It shall be the Contractor’s responsibility to determine which laws, rules, and regulations apply to the services rendered under this Agreement and to maintain its compliance therewith.
- 33. LEGAL AUTHORITY:** The Contractor represents and warrants that it possesses the legal authority, pursuant to any proper, appropriate, and official motion, resolution or action passed or taken, to enter into the Agreement. Each person signing and executing the Agreement on behalf of the Contractor represents and warrants that he has been fully authorized by the Contractor to execute the Agreement on behalf of the Contractor and to validly and legally bind the Contractor to all the terms, performances and provisions of the Agreement. The City shall have the right, in its sole discretion, to either temporarily suspend or permanently terminate the Agreement if there is a dispute as to the legal authority of either the Contractor or the person signing the Agreement to enter into the Agreement.
- 34. LICENSES, PERMITS, AND OTHER AUTHORIZATIONS:** The Contractor shall secure, prior to the Term, and shall maintain, at its sole expense, all licenses, certifications, permits, and other authorizations required to perform its obligations under this Agreement. This Section is a material part of this Agreement.
- 35. PROHIBITED TERMS:** Any term or condition that requires the City to indemnify or hold the Contractor harmless; requires the City to agree to binding arbitration; requires the City to obtain certain insurance coverage; limits the Contractor’s liability for damages resulting from death, bodily injury, or damage to tangible property; or that conflicts with this provision in any way shall be *void ab initio*. Any agreement containing a prohibited term shall otherwise be enforceable as if it did not contain such term or condition, and all agreements entered into by the City, except for certain intergovernmental agreements, shall be governed by Colorado law notwithstanding any term or condition to the contrary.
- 36. DEBARMENT AND SUSPENSION:** The Contractor acknowledges that neither it nor its principals nor any of its subcontractors are presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible or voluntarily excluded from entering into this Agreement by any federal agency or by any department, agency, or political subdivision of the State of Colorado. The Contractor shall

immediately notify the City if any subcontractor becomes debarred or suspended, and shall, at the City's request, take all steps required to terminate its contractual relationship with the subcontractor for work to be performed under this Agreement.

- 37. NO CONSTRUCTION AGAINST DRAFTING PARTY:** The Parties and their respective counsel have had the opportunity to review the Agreement, and the Agreement will not be construed against any Party merely because any provisions of the Agreement were prepared by a particular Party.
- 38. ORDER OF PRECEDENCE:** In the event of any conflicts between the language of the Agreement and the exhibits, the language of the Agreement controls—except for certain federal and state terms and conditions.
- 39. INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY RIGHTS:** The City and the Contractor intend that all property rights to any and all materials, text, logos, documents, booklets, manuals, references, guides, brochures, advertisements, URLs, domain names, music, sketches, web pages, plans, drawings, prints, photographs, specifications, software, data, products, ideas, inventions, and any other work or recorded information created by the Contractor and paid for by the City pursuant to this Agreement, in preliminary or final form and on any media whatsoever (collectively, “Materials”), shall belong to the City. The Contractor shall disclose all such items to the City and shall assign such rights over to the City upon completion of the Project. To the extent permitted by the U.S. Copyright Act, 17 USC §§ 101, *et seq.*, the Materials are a “work made for hire” and all ownership of copyright in the Materials shall vest in the City at the time the Materials are created. To the extent that the Materials are not a “work made for hire,” the Contractor (by this Agreement) sells, assigns and transfers all right, title and interest in and to the Materials to the City, including the right to secure copyright, patent, trademark, and other intellectual property rights throughout the world and to have and to hold such rights in perpetuity. The Parties agree that all materials, text, logos, documents, booklets, manuals, references, guides, brochures, advertisements, URLs, domain names, music, sketches, web pages, plans, drawings, prints, photographs, specifications, software, data, products, ideas, inventions, and any other work or recorded information of the Contractor made available, directly or indirectly, by the Contractor to the City as part of the Scope of Services (collectively, “Contractor Materials”), are the exclusive property of the Contractor or the third parties from whom the Contractor has secured the rights to use such product. Contractor Materials, processes, methods, and services shall at all times remain the property of the Contractor; however, the Contractor hereby grants to the City a nonexclusive, royalty free, perpetual, and irrevocable license to use Contractor Materials. The Contractor shall mark or identify all such Contractor Materials to the City. The Contractor acknowledges that pursuant to law, the federal or state government may reserve ownership or a royalty-free, non-exclusive, and irrevocable license to reproduce, publish or otherwise use, and to authorize others to use, all copyrighted material and all material which can be copyrighted under this Agreement.
- 40. SURVIVAL OF CERTAIN PROVISIONS:** The terms of the Agreement and any exhibits and attachments that by reasonable implication contemplate continued performance, rights, or compliance beyond expiration or termination of the Agreement survive the Agreement and will continue to be enforceable. Without limiting the generality of this provision, the Contractor's obligations to provide insurance and to indemnify the City will survive for a period equal to any and all relevant statutes of limitation, plus the time necessary to fully resolve any claims, matters, or actions begun within that period.
- 41. ADVERTISING AND PUBLIC DISCLOSURE:** The Contractor shall not include any reference to the Agreement or to services performed pursuant to the Agreement in any of the Contractor's advertising or public relations materials without first obtaining the written approval of the Director. Any oral presentation or written materials related to services performed under the Agreement will be limited to services that have been accepted by the City. The Contractor shall notify the Director in

advance of the date and time of any presentation. Nothing in this provision precludes the transmittal of any information to City employees or officials.

42. CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION

- 42.1.** “Confidential Information” means all information or data disclosed in written or machine recognizable form and is marked or identified at the time of disclosure as being confidential, proprietary, or its equivalent. Each of the Parties may disclose (a “Disclosing Party”) or permit the other Party (the “Receiving Party”) access to the Disclosing Party’s Confidential Information in accordance with the following terms. Except as specifically permitted in this Agreement or with the prior express written permission of the Disclosing Party, the Receiving Party shall not: (i) disclose, allow access to, transmit, transfer or otherwise make available any Confidential Information of the Disclosing Party to any third party other than its employees, subcontractors, agents and consultants that need to know such information to fulfil the purposes of this Agreement, and in the case of non-employees, with whom it has executed a non-disclosure or other agreement which limits the use, reproduction and disclosure of the Confidential Information on terms that afford at least as much protection to the Confidential Information as the provisions of this Agreement; or (ii) use or reproduce the Confidential Information of the Disclosing Party for any reason other than as reasonably necessary to fulfil the purposes of this Agreement. This Agreement does not transfer ownership of Confidential Information or grant a license thereto. The City will retain all right, title, and interest in its Confidential Information.
- 42.2.** The Contractor shall provide for the security of Confidential Information and information which may not be marked, but constitutes personally identifiable information, HIPAA, CJIS, or other federally or state regulated information (“Regulated Data”) in accordance with all applicable laws, rules, policies, publications, and guidelines. If the Contractor receives Regulated Data outside the scope of the Agreement, it shall promptly notify the City.
- 42.3.** Confidential Information that the Receiving Party can establish: (i) was lawfully in the Receiving Party’s possession before receipt from the Disclosing Party; or (ii) is or becomes a matter of public knowledge through no fault of the Receiving Party; or (iii) was independently developed or discovered by the Receiving Party; or (iv) was received from a third party that was not under an obligation of confidentiality, shall not be considered Confidential Information under this Agreement. The Receiving Party will inform necessary employees, officials, subcontractors, agents, and officers of the confidentiality obligations under this Agreement, and all requirements and obligations of the Receiving Party under this Agreement shall survive the expiration or earlier termination of this Agreement.
- 42.4.** Nothing in this Agreement shall in any way limit the ability of the City to comply with any laws or legal process concerning disclosures by public entities. The Parties understand that all materials exchanged under this Agreement, including Confidential Information, may be subject to the Colorado Open Records Act., §§ 24-72-201, *et seq.*, C.R.S., (the “Act”). In the event of a request to the City for disclosure of confidential materials, the City shall advise the Contractor of such request in order to give the Contractor the opportunity to object to the disclosure of any of its materials which it marked as, or otherwise asserts is, proprietary or confidential. If the Contractor objects to disclosure of any of its material, the Contractor shall identify to the City the legal basis under the Act for any right to withhold. In the event of any action or the filing of a lawsuit to compel disclosure, the Contractor agrees to intervene in such action or lawsuit to protect and assert its claims of privilege against disclosure of such material or waive the same. If the matter is not resolved, the City will tender all material to the court for judicial determination of the issue of disclosure. The Contractor further agrees to defend, indemnify and save and hold harmless the City, its officers, agents and employees, from any claim, damages, expense, loss or costs arising out of the Contractor’s intervention to protect and assert its claim of privilege against

disclosure under this Article, including but not limited to, prompt reimbursement to the City of all reasonable attorney fees, costs, and damages that the City may incur directly or may be ordered to pay.

43. PROTECTED INFORMATION AND DATA PROTECTION

- 43.1. Compliance with Data Protection Laws:** The Contractor shall comply with all applicable international, federal, state, local laws, rules, regulations, directives, and policies relating to data protection, use, collection, disclosures, processing, and privacy as they apply to the Contractor under this Agreement, including, without limitation, applicable industry standards or guidelines based on the data's classification relevant to the Contractor's performance hereunder and, when applicable, the most recent iterations of § 24-73-101, *et seq.*, C.R.S., IRS Publication 1075, the Health Information Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA), the U.S. Department of Justice, Federal Bureau of Investigation, Criminal Justice Information Services Security Policy for all Criminal Justice Information, the Colorado Consumer Protection Act, and the Payment Card Industry Data Security Standard (PCI-DSS), (collectively, "Data Protection Laws"). If the Contractor becomes aware that it cannot reasonably comply with the terms or conditions contained herein due to a conflicting law or policy, the Contractor shall promptly notify the City.
- 43.2. Safeguarding Protected Information:** "Protected Information" means data, regardless of form, that has been designated as private, proprietary, protected, or confidential by law, policy, or the City. Protected Information includes, but is not limited to, employment records, protected health information, student records, education records, criminal justice information, personal financial records, research data, trade secrets, classified government information, other regulated data, and personally identifiable information as defined by §§ 24-73-101(4)(b) and 6-1-716(1)(g)(I)(A), C.R.S., as amended. Protected Information shall not include public records that by law must be made available to the public pursuant to the Colorado Open Records Act, §§ 24-72-201, *et seq.*, C.R.S. To the extent there is any uncertainty as to whether data constitutes Protected Information, the data in question shall be treated as Protected Information until a determination is made by the City or an appropriate legal authority. Unless the City provides security protection for the information it discloses to the Contractor, the Contractor shall implement and maintain reasonable security procedures and practices that are both appropriate to the nature of the Protected Information disclosed and that are reasonably designed to help safeguard Protected Information from unauthorized access, use, modification, disclosure, or destruction. Disclosure of Protected Information does not include disclosure to a third party under circumstances where the City retains primary responsibility for implementing and maintaining reasonable security procedures and practices appropriate to the nature of the Protected Information, and the City implements and maintains technical controls reasonably designed to safeguard Protected Information from unauthorized access, modification, disclosure, or destruction or effectively eliminate the third party's ability to access Protected Information, notwithstanding the third party's physical possession of Protected Information. If the Contractor has been contracted to maintain, store, or process personal information on the City's behalf, the Contractor is a "Third-Party Service Provider" as defined by § 24-73-103(1)(i), C.R.S.
- 43.3. Data Access and Integrity:** The Contractor shall implement and maintain all appropriate administrative, physical, technical, and procedural safeguards necessary and appropriate to ensure compliance with the standards, guidelines, and Data Protection Laws applicable to the Contractor's performance hereunder to ensure the security and confidentiality of all data. The Contractor shall protect against threats or hazards to the security or integrity of data; protect against unauthorized disclosure, access to, or use of any data; restrict access to data as necessary; and ensure the proper use of data. The Contractor shall not engage in "data mining" except as specifically and expressly required by law or authorized in writing by the City. All data and

Protected Information shall be maintained and securely transferred in accordance with industry standards. Unless otherwise required by law, the City has exclusive ownership of all data it discloses under the Agreement, and the Contractor shall have no right, title, or interest in data obtained in connection with the services provided herein.

- 43.4. Data Retention, Transfer, Litigation Holds, and Destruction:** Using appropriate and reliable storage media, the Contractor shall regularly backup data used in connection with this Agreement and retain such backup copies consistent with the Contractor's data retention policies. Upon termination of the Agreement, the Contractor shall securely delete or securely transfer all data, including Protected Information, to the City in an industry standard format as directed by the City; however, this requirement shall not apply to the extent the Contractor is required by law to retain data, including Protected Information. Upon the City's request, the Contractor shall confirm the data disposed of, the date disposed of, and the method of disposal. With respect to any data in the Contractor's exclusive custody, the City may request that the Contractor preserve such data outside of its usual record retention policies. The City will promptly coordinate with the Contractor regarding the preservation and disposition of any data and records relevant to any current or anticipated litigation, and the Contractor shall continue to preserve the records until further notice by the City. Unless otherwise required by law or regulation, when paper or electronic documents are no longer needed, the Contractor shall destroy or arrange for the destruction of such documents within its custody or control that contain Protected Information by shredding, erasing, or otherwise modifying the Protected Information in the paper or electronic documents to make it unreadable or indecipherable.
- 43.5. Software and Computing Systems:** At its reasonable discretion, the City may prohibit the Contractor from the use of certain software programs, databases, and computing systems with known vulnerabilities to collect, use, process, store, or generate data and information, with Protected Information, received as a result of the Contractor's services under this Agreement. The Contractor shall fully comply with all requirements and conditions, if any, associated with the use of software programs, databases, and computing systems as reasonably directed by the City. The Contractor shall not use funds paid by the City for the acquisition, operation, or maintenance of software in violation of any copyright laws or licensing restrictions. The Contractor shall maintain commercially reasonable network security that, at a minimum, includes network firewalls, intrusion detection/prevention, enhancements, or updates consistent with evolving industry standards, and periodic penetration testing.
- 43.6. Background Checks:** The Contractor will ensure that, prior to being granted access to Protected Information, the Contractor's agents, employees, subcontractors, volunteers, or assigns who perform work under this Agreement have all undergone and passed all necessary criminal background screenings, have successfully completed annual instruction of a nature sufficient to enable them to effectively comply with all data protection provisions of this Agreement and Data Protection Laws, and possess all qualifications appropriate to the nature of the employees' duties and the sensitivity of the data.
- 43.7. Subcontractors and Employees:** If the Contractor engages a subcontractor under this Agreement, the Contractor shall impose data protection terms that provide at least the same level of data protection as in this Agreement and to the extent appropriate to the nature of the services provided. The Contractor shall monitor the compliance with such obligations and remain responsible for its subcontractor's compliance with the obligations of this Agreement and for any of its subcontractors acts or omissions that cause the Contractor to breach any of its obligations under this Agreement. Unless the Contractor provides its own security protection for the information it discloses to a third party, the Contractor shall require the third party to implement and maintain reasonable security procedures and practices that are appropriate to the nature of the

Protected Information disclosed and that are reasonably designed to protect it from unauthorized access, use, modification, disclosure, or destruction. Any term or condition within this Agreement relating to the protection and confidentiality of any disclosed data shall apply equally to both the Contractor and any of its subcontractors, agents, assigns, employees, or volunteers. Upon request, the Contractor shall provide the City copies of its record retention, data privacy, and information security policies.

43.8. Security Breach: If the Contractor becomes aware of an unauthorized acquisition or disclosure of unencrypted data, in any form, that compromises the security, access, confidentiality, or integrity of Protected Information or data maintained or provided by the City (“Security Breach”), the Contractor shall notify the City in the most expedient time and without unreasonable delay. The Contractor shall fully cooperate with the City regarding recovery, lawful notices, investigations, remediation, and the necessity to involve law enforcement, as determined by the City and Data Protection Laws. The Contractor shall preserve and provide all information relevant to the Security Breach to the City; provided, however, the Contractor shall not be obligated to disclose confidential business information or trade secrets. The Contractor shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the City for any and all claims, including reasonable attorneys’ fees, costs, and expenses incidental thereto, which may be suffered by, accrued against, charged to, or recoverable from the City in connection with a Security Breach or lawful notices.

43.9. Request for Additional Protections and Survival: In addition to the terms contained herein, the City may reasonably request that the Contractor protect the confidentiality of certain Protected Information or other data in specific ways to ensure compliance with Data Protection Laws and any changes thereto. Unless a request for additional protections is mandated by a change in law, the Contractor may reasonably decline the City’s request to provide additional protections. If such a request requires the Contractor to take steps beyond those contained herein, the Contractor shall notify the City with the anticipated cost of compliance, and the City may thereafter, in its sole discretion, direct the Contractor to comply with the request at the City’s expense; provided, however, that any increase in costs that would increase the Maximum Contract Amount must first be memorialized in a written amendment complying with City procedures. Obligations contained in this Agreement relating to the protection and confidentiality of any disclosed data shall survive termination of the Agreement, and the Contractor shall continue to safeguard all data for so long as the data remains confidential or protected and in the Contractor’s possession or control.

44. DATA PROTECTION: The Contractor shall comply with all applicable international, federal, state, local laws, rules, regulations, directives, and policies relating to data protection, use, collection, disclosures, processing, and privacy as they apply to the Contractor under this Agreement, including, without limitation, applicable industry standards or guidelines based on the data’s classification relevant to the Contractor’s performance hereunder. The Contractor shall maintain security procedures and practices consistent with §§ 24-73-101 *et seq.*, C.R.S., and shall ensure that all regulated or protected data, provided under this Agreement and in the possession of the Contractor or any subcontractor, is protected and safeguarded, in a manner and form acceptable to the City and in accordance with the terms of this Agreement, including, without limitation, the use of appropriate technology, security practices, encryption, intrusion detection, and audits.

45. PROTECTED HEALTH INFORMATION: The Contractor shall comply with all legislative and regulatory requirements of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (“HIPAA”); the Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act (“HITECH”); 42 CFR Part 2; the privacy standards adopted by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, as amended, 45 C.F.R. parts 160 and 164, subparts A and E; and the security standards adopted by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, as amended, 45 C.F.R. parts 160, 162 and 164,

subpart C (collectively, “HIPAA Rules”). The Contractor shall implement all necessary protective measures to comply with HIPAA Rules, and the Contractor hereby agrees to be bound by the terms of the Business Associate Agreement attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference as **Exhibit C**. The Contractor shall not use protected health information or substance use treatment records except as legally necessary to fulfill the purpose of this Agreement and shall hold the City harmless, to the extent permitted by law, for any breach of these regulations. This Section shall survive the expiration or earlier termination of this Agreement, and the Contractor shall ensure that the requirements of this Section are included in any relevant subcontracts.

- 46. TIME IS OF THE ESSENCE**: The Parties agree that in the performance of the terms, conditions, and requirements of this Agreement, time is of the essence.
- 47. PARAGRAPH HEADINGS**: The captions and headings set forth herein are for convenience of reference only and shall not be construed to define or limit the terms and provisions hereof.
- 48. CITY EXECUTION OF AGREEMENT**: The Agreement will not be effective or binding on the City until it has been fully executed by all required signatories of the City and County of Denver, and if required by Charter, approved by the City Council.
- 49. AGREEMENT AS COMPLETE INTEGRATION-AMENDMENTS**: The Agreement is the complete integration of all understandings between the Parties as to the subject matter of the Agreement. No prior, contemporaneous, or subsequent addition, deletion, or other modification has any force or effect, unless embodied in the Agreement in writing. No oral representation by any officer or employee of the City at variance with the terms of the Agreement or any written amendment to the Agreement will have any force or effect or bind the City.
- 50. USE, POSSESSION OR SALE OF ALCOHOL OR DRUGS**: The Contractor shall cooperate and comply with the provisions of Executive Order 94 and its Attachment A concerning the use, possession or sale of alcohol or drugs. Violation of these provisions or refusal to cooperate with implementation of the policy can result in contract personnel being barred from City facilities and from participating in City operations.
- 51. ELECTRONIC SIGNATURES AND ELECTRONIC RECORDS**: The Contractor consents to the use of electronic signatures by the City. The Agreement, and any other documents requiring a signature under the Agreement, may be signed electronically by the City in the manner specified by the City. The Parties agree not to deny the legal effect or enforceability of the Agreement solely because it is in electronic form or because an electronic record was used in its formation. The Parties agree not to object to the admissibility of the Agreement in the form of an electronic record, or a paper copy of an electronic document, or a paper copy of a document bearing an electronic signature, on the ground that it is an electronic record or electronic signature or that it is not in its original form or is not an original.
- 52. ATTACHED EXHIBITS INCORPORATED**: The following attached exhibits are hereby incorporated into and made a material part of this Agreement: **Exhibit A**, Scope of Work; **Exhibit B**, Certificate of Insurance; **Exhibit C**, HIPAA/HITECH BAA; and **Exhibit D**, Federal Provisions.

I. INTRODUCTION

Period of Performance Start and End Dates: 1/1/2023 – 12/31/2023

Project Description:

The purpose of this contract agreement is to provide a Department of Housing Stability (HOST) award for \$3,377,000.00. These funds will be provided to The Colorado Coalition for the Homeless (CCH) to be utilized for the Supportive Housing Pay for Performance (SHP4P) program.

II. SERVICES DESCRIPTION

A. Overview

Provider will use an appropriate level of care based on clinical assessment, integrated with a flexible array of housing options delivered through an evidence-based Housing First approach to provide housing and supportive services for the costliest members of the “Super Utilizers” population (“SU”) as described below.

B. Enrollment

After an individual has been deemed eligible for the Project by passing the felony screen, the individual may be served by the Project. The Provider will process the referrals in accordance with the following Client pathway:

1. Pre-Engagement Period. Upon receipt of a Referral, Provider will attempt to engage the referred individual to participate in the Project as a Client. The City will assist Provider in locating and contacting individuals who are the subject of a Referral as follows: (a) the OBHS referral coordinator will link the unique research IDs back to the individual identifiers (i.e., names and as much information as is available from the intake points) on the master eligibility list.

2. Screening. Providers will engage participants for a minimum of three months, [as described in the Evaluation Plan] before stepping down the engagement and requesting a new referral. After being located, individuals must also pass the housing screen tool [as described in the Evaluation Plan] (the “Housing Screen”) to confirm homelessness and continue engagement toward housing placement. While the Housing Screen will only screen out any individuals who are not considered homeless according to the Housing Screen requirements, it will also screen for chronic homelessness which will help determine the most appropriate housing subsidy for the individual.
3. Assignment to Case Management Treatment Team and Clinicians. Within no later than 60 days of initial contact with the Client, Provider will assign the Client to a case management team, and through such case managers and clinicians, will conduct a full mental health assessment of the Client, establish, and implement a Treatment Plan (as defined below) for the Client, identify barriers to housing for the Client, and address other pressing Client needs.
4. Provider will directly provide Services for at least two hundred and forty-five (245) Clients during the contract period of January 1, 2023, through December 31, 2023.
5. Provider will enroll all individuals engaged in any steps 2-4 in HMIS using standard HUD enrollment.

C. Housing Services

1. From initial contact with the Client, Provider will assess the Client’s appropriate housing needs, establish a housing stability plan, and work with the Client to access and maintain appropriate housing.
2. Provider's housing placement and support services will include housing search and location, landlord outreach, teaching housing skills, lease negotiation, establishing a housing stability plan, conflict mediation, subsidy administration and other key functions. In addition, Provider will assertively engage and offer services to tenants to maximize their tenure in housing including assistance with maintaining their household and finances, independently performing activities of daily living, developing community living skills, maximizing tenant safety and security, guarding against predatory guests and illegal activity in their unit, and generally upholding the terms of their lease. Providers will actively communicate with landlords and property managers to advocate on behalf of tenants, prevent avoidable evictions, and intervene and mitigate crisis situations.
3. Provider will enter housing move-in dates and housing exits into HMIS monthly.
4. Provider will administer the housing subsidies from the Project Budget to allow Clients to lease scattered site housing in the community.

5. Provider will ensure that all Clients served have access to housing units that are affordable on an ongoing basis. This is defined as meaning that the tenant household ideally pays no more than 30% of its household income toward rent and utilities, and never pays more than 50% of income toward such housing expenses.
6. Provider will assess Client status at minimum quarterly, and track Client benefit acquisition and income changes, and update HMIS quarterly using Update Assessments.

D. Supportive Services

All services will be voluntary and driven by individual choice. Recognizing that individuals may initially refuse assistance or services, Provider will assertively and creatively engage tenants, including engaging Clients multiple times and in multiple settings, to maximize participation in services. The delivery of all services will be guided by the principles of cultural competence, trauma informed care, recovery, and resiliency with an emphasis on building enrollee strengths and resources in the community, with family, and with their peer/social network.

1. Provider will offer and provide Clients with a variety of services as deemed clinically appropriate based on assessed needs. Services provided will be designed to help Clients (i) address barriers to housing stability, (ii) manage mental illness and other disabling conditions, (iii) reduce interaction with the criminal justice system (number of jail days), and (iv) improve health outcomes. At the outset of each Client's engagement in the Project, Provider will work collaboratively with the Client to develop a Treatment Plan.
2. Provider's Services will include, as appropriate for and desired by each Client's level of care needs, intensive case management, crisis intervention, substance use counseling, mental health treatment, peer support, skills building, connection to primary care, and various other services identified as necessary in each Client's Treatment Plan.
3. A treatment plan ("Treatment Plan") will be developed consistent with the principles of Client choice, wellness, and recovery.
 - a. Provider will work with the Client to develop individualized goals in relation to housing. Other goals may be related to health maintenance, medication management, peer relations, social activities, relapse prevention and/or other individualized needs based on clinical necessity.
 - b. The Client will be primarily responsible for establishing the specific goals that define his/her desired quality of life.
 - c. The Treatment Plan will specify clinical interventions that will be used to assist Client in meeting identified goals.
 - d. The Treatment Plan will define the roles and responsibilities of all parties involved in the development of the treatment plan.
 - e. The Treatment Plan may be used to help Clients identify, cultivate, and sustain relationships with peers, family members, neighbors, and others as clinically appropriate to create a network of support that will build the well-being of enrollees.

4. Commitment to Quality: The Contractor is required to commit to the provision of high-quality Supportive Housing, as described in the Corporation for Supportive Housing (“CSH”) Dimensions of Quality Supportive Housing Guidebook. The CSH Dimensions of Quality establish five key indicators of quality for Supportive Housing projects.
 - a. All successful Supportive Housing projects include the following dimensions and are:
 - i. Tenant-centered: Tenants play an active role in planning the Supportive Housing project, and all partners share a common commitment to helping tenants thrive
 - ii. Accessible: Housing is affordable, in a location that meets tenants’ needs, and accommodates persons with special needs
 - iii. Coordinated: Roles, responsibilities and communication strategies are clearly established among the Supportive Housing partners, codified in written agreements, and revisited regularly
 - iv. Integrated: The project meets or exceeds community standards, and the partners actively engage in community dialogue
 - v. Sustainable: The project has funding that is adequate for its ongoing operations and allows it to target its intended tenants

E. Case Management & Treatment Team

1. Individuals will likely come from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds, requiring that Case Management & Treatment staff practice "cultural competence" which emphasizes the acquisition of cultural knowledge and the proper application of that knowledge when working with individuals from a variety of cultures. This requires that Case Management & Treatment staff understand and implement the following practices:
 - a. "Cultural humility" emphasizes adopting the perspective that individuals and families are the best source of information concerning cultural issues that impact their care.
 - b. "Cultural sensitivity" encourages providers to begin with the assumption that cultural differences exist even when none are apparent and continuously apply themselves to understanding as much as possible about the cultural lens through which each individual and family views and experiences the outside world.
2. Clients will have access to the Case Management & Treatment Team or mobile crisis support 24 hours a day, 7 days per week as needed based on level of care needs.
3. Housing Counseling Services. Each Client will have access to Housing Counseling services, it being understood that the Housing Counseling services may be provided by a designated Housing Specialist or by a case manager or other staff person with housing expertise.

4. The Case Management & Treatment Team shall operate substantially in accordance with the Corporation for Supportive Housing's (CSH'S), Dimensions of Quality Supportive Housing as provided here:
https://www.csh.org/wp-content/uploads/2013/07/CSH_Dimensions_of_Quality_Supportive_Housing_guidebook.pdf
5. The Case Management & Treatment Team shall assist Clients in obtaining and maintaining permanent housing utilizing resources that are available through noncontract funded resources as applicable.
6. The Case Management & Treatment Team shall use clinical interventions such as motivational interviewing to assist the Client in engaging and linking with integrated health services, as deemed clinically appropriate.
7. The Case Management & Treatment Team shall assist each Client in obtaining supplemental income, health insurance and other federal, state, or local benefits for which he or she is eligible if Client is willing.
8. The Case Management & Treatment Team has final accountability for assuring that all services identified in the treatment plan are offered to all Clients, acknowledging that Client's ultimately have self-determination in regard to whether or not they engage in offered services.
9. The Case Management & Treatment Team shall deliver or collaborate with other community agencies to provide for the delivery of all services identified in the Treatment Plan.
10. Case management services will "meet Clients where they are" physically and figuratively. As a general rule, most case management services shall be provided in the field where Clients conduct their lives – in the Clients' home or in other community locations – allowing individuals to learn and practice skills in the actual environment where they will be using them, rather than in clinic or office settings.
11. The Case Management & Treatment Team, when appropriate and where in alignment with Client treatment plan, shall link enrollees with education services (e.g., general education programs, technical/ trade schools) and develop action steps in the Treatment Plan related to educational opportunities that will contribute to successful workforce participation.
12. The Case Management & Treatment Team shall take a Housing First approach to housing.
13. The Case Management & Treatment team shall work with enrollees to identify and access other medical and dental services.
14. The Case Management & Treatment Team shall provide or link Client with appropriate health promotion education.
15. If the Case Management & Treatment Team determines that an enrollee requires psychiatric inpatient care or other residential treatment, those services shall be provided through current agency processes. However, the Case Management & Treatment Team will provide continued contact with the enrollee and appropriate treatment staff.

F. Target Population: “Super Utilizers”

As described in the Evaluation Plan, the target population are adults who meet all of the following criteria (the “Super Utilizers” or “SU”):

1. Unsheltered homeless indicated by recent outreach contact with the Denver Street Outreach Collaborative (DSOC) or Strategic Outreach to Large Encampment (SOLE) programs at the time of referral: identified as transient (having no address or providing the address of a shelter).
2. Determined to be eligible based on the administered Housing Screen.
3. High utilizers of City criminal justice/jail services, indicated by at least eight (8) arrests over a period of three years.
4. High utilizers for purposes of this Project includes preventable, inappropriate, or recurring use of high-cost County services such as:
 - a. Frequent arrests and/or jail days.
 - b. Frequent emergency department visits.
 - c. Frequent use of ambulance services.
 - d. Frequent use of Emergency Psychiatric Services.
 - e. Frequent medical hospitalization at Denver Health and Hospital.
 - f. Frequent use of Emergency Detoxification Services.
5. Require case management, primary medical care, behavioral health services, and/or dental services, and will likely need specialized substance abuse, mental health, and medical services; and
6. Likely have one or more of the following characteristics:
 - a. A history of poor adherence to medication regimens, and/or difficulties participating in structured activities to the extent that it impairs the ability to live independently without supportive services.
 - b. Be eligible for Medicaid and/or Supplemental Security Income ("SSI").
 - c. Be currently uninsured.
 - d. Have either no income or annual total income of less than \$15,000; and
 - e. Lack family or other support networks.
 - f. One or more disabilities.

G. Staffing Requirement

Staffing will be determined based on assessment of level of care needed. If appropriate, due to treatment needs the Client will receive modified ACT services and available funding resources. Provider will maintain a target staff to Client ratio of 1 staff to every 10 clients and no less than one staff person to every 12 clients when appropriate for a modified ACT Team assignment will be based on assessed level of need.

H. Operating Committee and Semi-Annual Meetings

1. Provider shall cause the Team Leader or a qualified designee to attend, in person or by phone, monthly Operational Meetings and to deliver all data and program metrics to the City as required under the Contract, including all required Reports.

2. Provider shall cause the Team Leader to attend, in person or by phone, any semiannual meetings requested by the City at least three business days prior to the meeting, provided that notice may be provided on one business days' notice if an urgent matter is on the agenda.

III. ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES FOR BOTH PARTIES

A. Contractor will:

1. Work with City to host any city-designated sensitivity training on an annual basis.
2. Provide any online modular sensitivity training developed and provided by the City to all new direct-service staff within 15 days of hire date. Ensure direct-service staff complete training refresher on a biennial basis.
 - a. Sensitivity Training is available at https://denvergov.org/media/denvergov/housingstability/context_of_homelessness/story.html
 - b. Staff will need to complete and sign the “Statement of Completion of Required Training: Informed, Compassionate, and Positive Interactions with Persons Experiencing Homelessness” form

B. The City will:

1. Provide signage that includes information about the City and County of Denver’s Anti-Discrimination Office.

IV. EQUITY ACCESS AND OUTCOMES

The Department of Housing Stability, in alignment with the Mayor’s Office of Social Equity and Innovation, values racial equity and inclusiveness and seeks to reflect this value in our funding practices. Our commitment to producing racially equitable housing outcomes is paramount to HOST’s overall mission of Denver residents being healthy, housed and connected. HOST requires all programs it funds to report on the demographic characteristics of households served by the program throughout the duration of the contract in coordination with other required reporting. The contractor will also report on the demographics of staff working on this program throughout the duration of this contract. Specific information outlining the required data systems to be used and data to be collected are contained within the scope of work of this contract. This information will help HOST monitor demographic trends in who is served. The underlying objective of collecting and disaggregating data and outcomes by race is to understand who is currently served by HOST funded programs. This information will help inform future evaluation on any potential disparate impacts across HOST programs, as well as strategies to help address equity in access to and outcomes from programs where appropriate. Additionally, HOST program and contract staff will be reviewing data, and will discuss your program’s progress or challenges towards racially equitable services and outcomes at site visits and monitoring.

V. PROGRAM BUDGET AND SUCCESS PAYMENTS

A. 2023 Budget

Payments are to be made in advance of each quarter by the Provider submitting a quarterly invoice to the City. Any “reimbursements” due to the City may be taken out of future payments if future payments exist at that time or will be remitted to the City if no future payments are due. The 2023 budget shall be: \$3,377,000.00.

B. Enrollment Adjustments

If Provider fails to enroll or maintain the target enrollment number for each quarter as outlined in the enrollment table below, Provider will reimburse the City ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) for every number of participants the Provider is below the target enrollment amount.

1. For purposes of this section, “enrollment” will be defined for each quarter as (1) being newly physically engaged by a Provider staff member, and receiving services as defined under this contract, *or* (2) currently housed.
2. If the inability to meet enrollment targets is solely due to the unavailability of housing vouchers or an inability to refer enough individuals for the program, the Provider may ask the City for a one-month extension in meeting that quarter’s targets.
 - a. If enrollment targets are still not met after the one-month extension, ongoing funding for services and for success payment will be proportionally reduced by the number of individuals the program was unable to enroll, and the Provider will reimburse the City \$5,000 for every individual that the program was below the original quarter’s target enrollment.

C. Third Year Housing Stability Success Payments/Reimbursement Calculation and Payment

1. “Third Year Housing Stability Success Payments/Reimbursement” means the payments, if any, that will be made by the City to Provider, or reimbursements, if any, made by the Provider to the City in accordance with this Section (as defined below).

2. **“Stable Participants”** Counted in **“Third Year Housing Stability Rate”** means each Participant that is housed on January 1, 2021, and either (i) achieves a minimum of one thousand ninety-five (1095) Days in Stable Housing (as defined below), or (ii) experiences an Early Exit Event (as defined below) by December 31, 2023. For purposes of clarity, such one thousand ninety-five (1095) day period is not required to occur within one calendar year.
3. **“All Eligible Participants** Counted in **“Third Year Housing Stability Rate”** means each Participant that is housed on January 1, 2021. To the extent a Participant is absent from their housing for more than one hundred and twenty (120) consecutive days after January 1, 2021, for any reason except an Early Exit Event, and they subsequently re-enter housing, their housing will not be eligible to be counted toward the Third Year Housing Stability Rate and they will be counted as one participant.
4. **“Days in Stable Housing”** means, with respect to each Participant, the total number of days that such Participant maintains a lease, sublease, or occupancy agreement in such Participant’s name; provided, however, that if such Participant is absent from such premises for a period of more than one hundred and twenty (120) consecutive days after January 1, 2021 for any reason except an Early Exit Event, the Days in Stable Housing shall be reset to zero for such Participant. Only the participant’s housing stay that is ongoing on January 1, 2021, will be considered towards the Days in Stable Housing for the Third Year Housing Stability Rate.
5. An **“Early Exit Event”** means, with respect to each Participant, the occurrence of any of the following events, before they achieve a minimum of one thousand ninety five (1095) Days in Stable Housing and before December 31, 2023, as certified by the City and County of Denver staff evaluator: (i) a Participant ceases to receive Services and has relocated to other permanent housing where such Participant is named on a lease, sublease, or occupancy agreement or obtains a letter from the leaseholder or owner of a premises that such Participant may reside in such premises on a permanent basis; (ii) a Participant enters a residential treatment program for a period not exceeding one hundred twenty (120) days to address a physical or behavioral health issue; (iii) a Participant is incarcerated for actions entirely occurring prior to becoming a Participant; and (iv) the death of a Participant.
6. **“Third Year Housing Stability Percentage”** will be calculated by the City and County of Denver staff evaluator by: (1) subtracting **“Early Exit Events”** from **“Stable Participants”** and from **“All Eligible Participants”**; and (2) dividing the total number of **“Stable Participants”** by the total number of **“All Eligible Participants”** in the given time period (as defined below) and multiplying such number by one hundred (100). The percentage will then be rounded to the nearest whole number using standard rounding rules. Decimal places going out to 0.5 and higher will be rounded up, and those ending in less than 0.5 will be rounded down.

1. **Data Quality (timeliness)**” means at a minimum, Program Entry/Exit fields are to be entered within seven (7) calendar days (HMIS Data Quality report found in HMIS Canned Reports under HUD Reports tabs – item Q6 of the report). Quarterly status updates/ annual assessments are due within Thirty-Seven (37) calendar days of the client’s project start date or previous assessment. Update assessments are used to determine which clients are still actively enrolled and are due in HMIS immediately upon learning about a client’s updated housing situation. Data timeliness will be measured at the end of the year for the performance period of April 2023 – December 2023 and will be based on Enrollment, Annual, and Exit Assessments. The assessments will be weighted evenly to determine overall timeliness.

Note: Standards on data timeliness are set according to the [COHMIS Data Privacy, Security, & Data Quality Plan](#). The HMIS Data quality report does not record timeliness for annual assessments. This will be evaluated manually by HOST using HMIS data.

VII. Reporting

- A. Data collection is required and must be completed demonstrating eligibility and progress toward meeting the indicators contained in this Scope of Work. Disbursement of funds is contingent based on the ability to collect the required information.
- B. Contractor will submit reports via the online portal provided to the contractor (unless otherwise specified). Reports will be due on the last day of the month following the end of the reporting period unless otherwise specified.

- C. The portal provides the Contractor with an online form in which to enter data for the reporting period. Supplemental forms and information may be required by HOST. The online portal and any supplemental requirements provide HOST with the quantitative and qualitative information necessary to determine Contractor's progress towards meeting the indicators contained in this Scope of Work. Submitted forms will be reviewed by the designated Program Officer for completeness, clarity, and accuracy.
- D. Upon execution of this contract, HOST will provide a user guide for using the portal along with the required login information. Prior to the due date for the first required report, HOST shall provide training as needed or requested by the Contractor to support the online portal.
- E. Contractor may be required to submit a Contract Summary Report at the end of the contract period within 30 days after the Term End Date of this contract agreement.

2. Specific to this Scope of Work

a. Medicaid billing

At least twice annually, Provider will analyze and report to the City, the amount of services provided to Project participants that has been successfully billed to Medicaid and reimbursed to Provider. Target reporting dates are June 30 and December 15, 2023. The Provider will also report on ongoing conversations with the State's Medicaid agency and the local affiliates related to the Provider's ability to bill Medicaid for program related services.

- 1. With regard to services that are eligible for Medicaid reimbursement, the City of Denver is the payer of last resort. The Provider will make a good faith effort to maximize the number of services they are able to bill Medicaid under this contract.

2. To the extent Medicaid reimbursement increases by less than 30%, City funds shall be reallocated to current and future housing expenses. To the extent Medicaid reimbursement increases by 30% or more, the City and Provider shall renegotiate the project budget.
3. To the extent Medicaid reimbursement significantly decreases by fifteen percent or more, the City and Provider shall renegotiate the project budget related to services.

b. Housing Subsidy

Twice annually, Provider will analyze and report to the City the total amount of City funding that has been allocated to participant housing subsidies. Target reporting dates are June 30 and December 15, 2023.

c. SHP4P Housing Subsidy Assumptions

1. The Project Budget includes assumptions that participants will need the subsidy for the total number of months that they are enrolled, and that they will be making rental payments equivalent to 30% of their monthly income (budgeted based on average SSI benefit income).
2. In the interest of participants obtaining and maintaining permanent housing, it is beneficial for Provider to work with participants to increase their income, as well as to connect participants with an ongoing housing subsidy beyond the term of the Contract.
3. Housing subsidy savings created through connecting Clients with tenant-based vouchers or increases in Client income will be retained by Provider to house additional Participants or other Housing First Clients.

VIII. HOMELESS MANAGEMENT INFORMATION SYSTEM AND REPORTING

It is the Department of Housing Stability's policy, in alignment with adopted plans, to require the use of the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) and the Coordinated Entry System (OneHome) for all federally and locally funded programs addressing the needs of residents experiencing homelessness.

The Contractor agrees to fully comply with the rules and regulations required by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) which govern the HMIS¹.

The contractor, in addition to the HUD requirements, shall conform to the HMIS policies and procedures established and adopted by the Metro Denver Homeless Initiative (MDHI) Continuum of Care (CoC). These are outlined in the COHMIS Policies and Procedures², and the COHMIS Security, Privacy and Data Quality Plan³.

Metro Denver Homeless Initiative (MDHI) is the implementing organization for the (HMIS). The HMIS software is called Clarity.

Contractor's aggregate HMIS performance data for projects may be shared with the funder and the community to improve system performance and assist with monitoring. MDHI and/or HOST will monitor contractor compliance and performance on an annual basis through a site visit.

Technical assistance and training resources for HMIS are available to the Contractor via the COHMIS Helpdesk.⁴

HMIS data will be used to monitor performance under this contract in addition to quarterly program narratives. HMIS outcome reports may be sent to HOST directly from MDHI. Contractor will also have access to all outcome reports generated for this contract. Narrative reports will be due to HOST two weeks after each HMIS outcome report is generated and sent to HOST to allow the Contractor the opportunity to address any issues they observe in their outcomes report in that narrative. Outcomes measures and other required reporting as well as the data source for each reporting element are detailed below. HOST may request aggregate data from MDHI for City related reporting needs.

HMIS Outcomes and Objectives

Contractor must report all necessary data and information in the Homeless Management Information System ("HMIS"), managed by the Metro Denver Homeless Initiative ("MDHI") to accurately calculate the Measures required by this Agreement.

IX FINANCIAL ADMINISTRATION

A. Compensation and Methods of Payment

1. Disbursements shall be processed through the Department of Housing Stability (HOST) and the City and County of Denver's Department of Finance.
2. The method of payment to the Contractor by HOST shall be in accordance with established HOST procedures. Invoice requests for reimbursement of costs should be submitted on a regular and timely basis in accordance with HOST policies.
3. Contractor shall use HOST's preferred invoice template, if requested HOST Financial Services may require a Cost Allocation Plan and budget narrative for detailed estimated description and allocation of funds. This is dependent upon funding source and program requirements.

B. Invoicing Requirements

1. To meet Government requirements for current, auditable books at all times, it is required that all Invoices be submitted quarterly to HOST to be paid. Expenses cannot be reimbursed until the funds under this contract have been encumbered.
2. No more than four (4) Invoices may be submitted per contract per quarter, without prior approval from HOST.
3. All Invoices for all Agreements must be correctly submitted within thirty (30) days of the Agreement end date to allow for correct and prompt closeout.
4. City and County of Denver Forms shall be used in back-up documents whenever required in the Invoice Processing Policy.
5. For contracts subject to Federal Agreements, only allowable costs determined in accordance with 2 CFR Chapter I, Chapter II, Parts 200, 215, 220, 225 and 230, "Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards" (the "OMB Omni Circular") applicable to the organization incurring the cost will be reimbursed.
6. The reimbursement request, or draw request, for personnel and non-personnel expenses should be submitted to the City on a quarterly basis, no later than the 15th day of the following month for expenses incurred in the prior quarter. The request for reimbursement should include:
 - a. Amount of the request in total and by line item.
 - b. Period of services for current reimbursement.
 - c. Budget balance in total and by line item.

- d. Authorization for reimbursement by the contract signatory (i.e., executive director or assistant director).
7. If another person has been authorized by the Contractor to request reimbursement for services provided by this contract, then the authorization should be forwarded in writing to HOST prior to the draw request.
8. The standardized HOST “Expense Certification Form” should be included with each payment request to provide the summary and authorization required for reimbursement.

C. General Reimbursement Requirements

1. Invoices: All non-personnel expenses need dated and readable invoices. The invoices must be from a vendor separate from the Contractor and must state what goods or services were provided and the delivery address. Verification that the goods or services were received should also be submitted, this may take the form of a receiving document or packing slips, signed, and dated by the individual receiving the good or service. Copies of checks written by the Contractor, or documentation of payment such as an accounts payable ledger which includes the check number shall be submitted to verify that the goods or services are on a reimbursement basis.
2. Mileage: A detailed mileage log with destinations and starting and ending mileage must accompany mileage reimbursement. The total miles reimbursed and per mile rate must be stated. Documentation of mileage reimbursement to the respective employee must be included with the Invoice request.
3. Cell Phone: If the monthly usage charge is exceeded in any month, an approval from the Executive Director or designee will be required.
4. Administration and Overhead Cost: Other non-personnel line items, such as administration, or overhead need invoices, and an allocation to this program documented in the draw request. An indirect cost rate can be applied if the Contractor has an approved indirect cost allocation plan. The approved indirect cost rate must be submitted to and approved by HOST.
5. Service Period and Closeout: All reimbursed expenses must be incurred during the time period within the contract. The final payment request must be received by HOST within thirty (30) days after the end of the service period stated in the contract.

D. Financial Management Systems

The Contractor must maintain financial systems that meet the following standards:

1. Financial reporting must be accurate, current, and provide a complete disclosure of the financial results of financially assisted activities and be made in accordance with federal and/or city financial reporting requirements.
2. Accounting records must be maintained which adequately identify the source and application of the funds provided for financially assisted activities. The records must contain information pertaining to contracts and authorizations, obligations, unobligated balances, assets, liabilities, outlays or expenditures, and income. Accounting records shall provide accurate, separate, and complete disclosure of fund status.
3. Effective internal controls and accountability must be maintained for all contract cash, real and personal property, and other assets. Adequate safeguards must be provided on all property, and it must be assured that it is used solely for authorized purposes.
4. Actual expenditures or outlays must be compared with budgeted amounts and financial information must be related to performance or productivity data, including the development of cost information whenever appropriate or specifically required.
5. All HOST contracts will be subject to applicable OMB Omni Circular cost principles, agency program regulations, and the terms of the agreement will be followed in determining the reasonableness, allowability and allocability of costs.
6. Source documents such as cancelled checks, paid bills, payrolls, time and attendance records, contract documents, etc., shall be provided for all disbursements. The Contractor will maintain auditable records, i.e., records must be current and traceable to the source documentation of transactions.
7. For contracts subject to Federal Agreements, the Contractor shall maintain separate accountability for HOST funds as referenced in 24 C.F.R. 85.20 and the OMB Omni Circular.
8. The Contractor must properly report to Federal, State, and local taxing authorities for the collection, payment, and depositing of taxes withheld. At a minimum, this includes Federal and State withholding, State Unemployment, Worker's Compensation (staff only), City Occupational Privilege Tax, and FICA.
9. A proper filing of unemployment and worker's compensation (for staff only) insurance shall be made to appropriate organizational units.
10. The Contractor shall participate, when applicable, in HOST provided staff training sessions in the following financial areas including, but not limited to (1) Budgeting and Cost Allocation Plans; (2) Invoicing Process.
11. The Contractor will be responsible for all Disallowed Costs.

12. The Contractor may be required to engage an audit committee to determine the services to be performed, review the progress of the audit and the final audit findings, and intervene in any disputes between management and the independent auditors. The Contractor shall also institute policy and procedures for its sub recipients that comply with these audit provisions, if applicable.

E. Procurements

1. The Contractor shall follow the City Procurement Policy to the extent that it requires that at least three (3) documented quotations be secured for all purchases or services (including insurance) supplies, or other property that costs more than ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) in the aggregate.
2. The Contractor will maintain records sufficient to detail the significant history of procurement. These records will include but are not limited to the following: rationale for the method of procurement, selection of contract type, contractor selection or rejection, and the basis for the contract price.
3. For contracts subject to federal agreements, if there is a residual inventory of unused supplies exceeding five thousand dollars (\$5,000) in total aggregate upon termination or completion of award, and if the supplies are not needed for any other federally sponsored programs or projects the Contractor will compensate the awarding agency for its share.

F. Monitoring Requirements

1. Monitoring may be performed by the program area, contract administration and financial services throughout the term of the agreement. Contractor will be notified in writing 30 days prior to facilitation of contract monitoring.
2. Program or Managerial Monitoring: The quality of the services being provided and the effectiveness of those services addressing the needs of the program. This may also include reviewing the current spending to date for the contract.
3. Contract Monitoring: Review and analysis of current program information to determine the extent to which contractors are achieving established contractual goals. HOST will provide performance monitoring and reporting reviews. City staff will manage any performance issues and will develop interventions to resolve concerns.
4. Compliance Monitoring: Will ensure that the terms of the contract document are met, as well as Federal, State and City legal requirements, standards, and policies.

G. Records Retention

1. The Contractor must retain for three (3) years financial records pertaining to the contract award. The retention period for the records of each fund will start on the day the single or last expenditure report for the period, except as otherwise noted, was submitted to the awarding agency.

2. The awarding agency and the Comptroller General of the United States, or any of their authorized representatives, shall have the right of access, upon reasonable notice, to any pertinent books, documents, papers, or other records which are pertinent to the contract, to make audits, examinations, excerpts, and transcripts.

H. Contract Close-Out

1. All Contractors are responsible for submitting a final invoice marked “Final Invoice” and any required performance and outcome reports to HOST by the required due dates outlined in this Contract.
2. HOST will close out the Contract when it determines that all applicable administrative actions and all required work of the contract have been completed. If Contractor fails to perform in accordance with this Agreement, HOST reserves the right to unilaterally close out a contract, “unilaterally close” means that no additional money may be expended against the contract.

I. Collection of Amounts Due

1. Any funds paid to a Contractor in excess of the amount to which the Contractor is determined to be entitled under the terms of the award constitute a debt to the City and County of Denver, if not paid within a reasonable period after demand HOST may:
 - a. makes an administrative offset against other requests for reimbursements.
 - b. withholds advance payments otherwise due to the Contractor; or
 - c. other action permitted by law.
2. The Contractor shall participate, when applicable, in HOST provided staff training sessions in the following financial areas including, but not limited to Budgeting and Cost Allocation Plans, and Invoicing Process.

BUSINESS ASSOCIATE AGREEMENT
HIPAA/HITECH

1. GENERAL PROVISIONS AND RECITALS.

- 1.01 The parties agree that the terms used, but not otherwise defined below, shall have the same meaning given to such terms under the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, Public Law 104-191 ("HIPAA"), the Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act, Public Law 111-005 ("the HITECH Act"), and their implementing regulations at 45 CFR Parts 160 and 164 ("the HIPAA regulations") as they exist or may hereafter be amended.
- 1.02 The parties agree that a business associate relationship (as described in 45 CFR §160.103) under HIPAA, the HITECH Act, and the HIPAA regulations arises between the CONTRACTOR and the CITY to the extent that CONTRACTOR performs, or delegates to subcontractors to perform, functions or activities on behalf of CITY.
- 1.03 CITY wishes to disclose to CONTRACTOR certain information, some of which may constitute Protected Health Information ("PHI") as defined below, to be used or disclosed in the course of providing services and activities.
- 1.04 The parties intend to protect the privacy and provide for the security of PHI that may be created, received, maintained, transmitted, used, or disclosed pursuant to the Agreement in compliance with the applicable standards, implementation specifications, and requirements of HIPAA, the HITECH Act, and the HIPAA regulations as they exist or may hereafter be amended.
- 1.05 The parties understand and acknowledge that HIPAA, the HITECH Act, and the HIPAA regulations do not pre-empt any state statutes, rules, or regulations that impose more stringent requirements with respect to privacy of PHI.
- 1.06 The parties understand that the HIPAA Privacy and Security rules apply to the CONTRACTOR in the same manner as they apply to a covered entity. CONTRACTOR agrees to comply at all times with the terms of this Agreement and the applicable standards, implementation specifications, and requirements of the Privacy and the Security rules, as they exist or may hereafter be amended, with respect to PHI.

2. DEFINITIONS.

- 2.01 "Administrative Safeguards" are administrative actions, and policies and procedures, to manage the selection, development, implementation, and maintenance of security measures to protect electronic PHI and to manage the conduct of CONTRACTOR's workforce in relation to the protection of that information.
- 2.02 "Agreement" means the attached Agreement and its exhibits to which these additional terms are incorporated by reference.
- 2.03 "Breach" means the acquisition, access, use, or disclosure of PHI in a manner not permitted under the HIPAA Privacy Rule which compromises the security or privacy of the PHI.

2.03.1 Breach excludes:

1. Any unintentional acquisition, access, or use of PHI by a workforce member or person acting under the authority of CONTRACTOR or CITY, if such acquisition, access, or use was made in good faith and within the scope of authority and does not result in further use or disclosure in a manner not permitted under the Privacy Rule.
2. Any inadvertent disclosure by a person who is authorized to access PHI to another person authorized to access PHI, or organized health care arrangement in which CITY participates, and the information received as a result of such disclosure is not further used or disclosed in a manner disallowed under the HIPAA Privacy Rule.
3. A disclosure of PHI where CONTRACTOR or CITY has a good faith belief that an unauthorized person to whom the disclosure was made would not reasonably have been able to retain such information.

2.03.2 Except as provided in paragraph (a) of this definition, an acquisition, access, use, or disclosure of PHI in a manner not permitted under the HIPAA Privacy Rule is presumed to be a breach unless CONTRACTOR demonstrates that there is a low probability that the PHI has been compromised based on a risk assessment of at least the following factors:

1. The nature and extent of the PHI involved, including the types of identifiers and the likelihood of re-identification;
2. The unauthorized person who used the PHI or to whom the disclosure was made;
3. Whether the PHI was actually acquired or viewed; and
4. The extent to which the risk to the PHI has been mitigated.

2.04 "CONTRACTOR" shall have the same meaning as in the attached Agreement, to which these Business Associate terms are incorporated by reference.

2.05 "CITY" shall have the same meaning as in the attached Agreement, to which these Business Associate terms are incorporated by reference.

2.06 "Data Aggregation" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA Privacy Rule in 45 CFR §164.501.

2.07 "Designated Record Set" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA Privacy Rule in 45 CFR §164.501.

2.08 "Disclosure" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA regulations in 45 CFR §160.103.

2.09 "Health Care Operations" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA Privacy Rule in 45 CFR §164.501.

2.10 "Immediately" where used here shall mean within 24 hours of discovery.

- 2.11 "Individual" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA Privacy Rule in 45 CFR §160.103 and shall include a person who qualifies as a personal representative in accordance with 45 CFR §164.502(g).
- 2.12 "Parties" shall mean "CONTRACTOR" and "CITY", collectively.
- 2.13 "Physical Safeguards" are physical measures, policies, and procedures to protect CONTRACTOR's electronic information systems and related buildings and equipment, from natural and environmental hazards, and unauthorized intrusion.
- 2.14 "The HIPAA Privacy Rule" shall mean the Standards for Privacy of Individually Identifiable Health Information at 45 CFR Part 160 and Part 164, Subparts A and E.
- 2.15 "Protected Health Information" or "PHI" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA regulations at 45 CFR §160.103.
- 2.16 "Required by Law" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA Privacy Rule at 45 CFR §164.103.
- 2.17 "Secretary" shall mean the Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services or his or her designee.
- 2.18 "Security Incident" means attempted or successful unauthorized access, use, disclosure, modification, or destruction of information or interference with system operations in an information system. "Security incident" does not include trivial incidents that occur on a daily basis, such as scans, "pings", or unsuccessful attempts to penetrate computer networks or servers maintained by CONTRACTOR.
- 2.19 "The HIPAA Security Rule" shall mean the Security Standards for the Protection of electronic PHI at 45 CFR Part 160, Part 162, and Part 164, Subparts A and C.
- 2.20 "Subcontractor" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA regulations at 45 CFR §160.103.
- 2.21 "Technical safeguards" means the technology and the policy and procedures for its use that protect electronic PHI and control access to it.
- 2.22 "Unsecured PHI" or "PHI that is unsecured" means PHI that is not rendered unusable, unreadable, or indecipherable to unauthorized individuals through the use of a technology or methodology specified by the Secretary of Health and Human Services ("HHS") in the guidance issued on the HHS Web site.
- 2.23 "Use" shall have the meaning given to such term under the HIPAA regulations at 45 CFR §160.103.

3. OBLIGATIONS AND ACTIVITIES OF CONTRACTOR AS BUSINESS ASSOCIATE.

- 3.01 CONTRACTOR agrees not to use or further disclose PHI that CITY discloses to CONTRACTOR except as permitted or required by this Agreement or by law.

- 3.02 CONTRACTOR agrees to use appropriate safeguards, as provided for in this Agreement, to prevent use or disclosure of PHI that CITY discloses to CONTRACTOR or that CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits, on behalf of CITY, except as provided for by this Contract.
- 3.03 CONTRACTOR agrees to comply with the HIPAA Security Rule, at Subpart C of 45 CFR Part 164, with respect to electronic PHI that CITY discloses to CONTRACTOR or that CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits, on behalf of CITY.
- 3.04 CONTRACTOR agrees to mitigate, to the extent practicable, any harmful effect of a Use or Disclosure of PHI by CONTRACTOR in violation of the requirements of this Agreement that becomes known to CONTRACTOR.
- 3.05 CONTRACTOR agrees to immediately report to CITY any Use or Disclosure of PHI not provided for by this Agreement that CONTRACTOR becomes aware of. CONTRACTOR must report Breaches of Unsecured PHI in accordance with 45 CFR §164.410.
- 3.06 CONTRACTOR agrees to ensure that any of its subcontractors that create, receive, maintain, or transmit, PHI on behalf of CONTRACTOR agree to comply with the applicable requirements of Section 164 Part C by entering into a contract or other arrangement.
- 3.07 To comply with the requirements of 45 CFR §164.524, CONTRACTOR agrees to provide access to CITY, or to an individual as directed by CITY, to PHI in a Designated Record Set within fifteen (15) calendar days of receipt of a written request by CITY.
- 3.08 CONTRACTOR agrees to make amendment(s) to PHI in a Designated Record Set that CITY directs or agrees to, pursuant to 45 CFR §164.526, at the request of CITY or an Individual, within thirty (30) calendar days of receipt of the request by CITY. CONTRACTOR agrees to notify CITY in writing no later than ten (10) calendar days after the amendment is completed.
- 3.09 CONTRACTOR agrees to make internal practices, books, and records, including policies and procedures, relating to the use and disclosure of PHI received from, or created or received by CONTRACTOR on behalf of CITY, available to CITY and the Secretary in a time and manner as determined by CITY, or as designated by the Secretary, for purposes of the Secretary determining CITY'S compliance with the HIPAA Privacy Rule.
- 3.10 CONTRACTOR agrees to document any Disclosures of PHI that CITY discloses to CONTRACTOR or that CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of CITY, and to make information related to such Disclosures available as would be required for CITY to respond to a request by an Individual for an accounting of Disclosures of PHI in accordance with 45 CFR §164.528.
- 3.11 CONTRACTOR agrees to provide CITY information in a time and manner to be determined by CITY in order to permit CITY to respond to a request by an Individual for an accounting of Disclosures of PHI in accordance with 45 CFR §164.528.
- 3.12 CONTRACTOR agrees that, to the extent CONTRACTOR carries out CITY's obligation(s) under the HIPAA Privacy and/or Security rules, CONTRACTOR will comply with the requirements of 45 CFR Part 164 that apply to CITY in the performance of such obligation(s).

- 3.13 CONTRACTOR shall work with CITY upon notification by CONTRACTOR to CITY of a Breach to properly determine if any Breach exclusions exist as defined below.

4. SECURITY RULE.

- 4.01 CONTRACTOR shall comply with the requirements of 45 CFR § 164.306 and establish and maintain appropriate Administrative, Physical and Technical Safeguards in accordance with 45 CFR §164.308, §164.310, §164.312, §164.314 and §164.316 with respect to electronic PHI that CITY discloses to CONTRACTOR or that CONTRACTOR creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of CITY. CONTRACTOR shall follow generally accepted system security principles and the requirements of the HIPAA Security Rule pertaining to the security of electronic PHI.
- 4.02 CONTRACTOR shall ensure that any subcontractors that create, receive, maintain, or transmit electronic PHI on behalf of CONTRACTOR agree through a contract with CONTRACTOR to the same restrictions and requirements contained here.
- 4.03 CONTRACTOR shall immediately report to CITY any Security Incident of which it becomes aware. CONTRACTOR shall report Breaches of Unsecured PHI as described in 5. BREACH DISCOVERY AND NOTIFICATION below and as required by 45 CFR §164.410.

5. BREACH DISCOVERY AND NOTIFICATION.

- 5.01 Following the discovery of a Breach of Unsecured PHI, CONTRACTOR shall notify CITY of such Breach, however, both parties may agree to a delay in the notification if so advised by a law enforcement official pursuant to 45 CFR §164.412.
 - 5.01.1 A Breach shall be treated as discovered by CONTRACTOR as of the first day on which such Breach is known to CONTRACTOR or, by exercising reasonable diligence, would have been known to CONTRACTOR.
 - 5.01.2 CONTRACTOR shall be deemed to have knowledge of a Breach, if the Breach is known, or by exercising reasonable diligence would have been known, to any person who is an employee, officer, or other agent of CONTRACTOR, as determined by the federal common law of agency.
- 5.02 CONTRACTOR shall provide the notification of the Breach immediately to the CITY DEH Executive Director or other designee.
 - 5.02.1 CONTRACTOR'S initial notification may be oral, but shall be followed by written notification within 24 hours of the oral notification.
- 5.03 CONTRACTOR'S notification shall include, to the extent possible:
 - 5.03.1 The identification of each Individual whose Unsecured PHI has been, or is reasonably believed by CONTRACTOR to have been, accessed, acquired, used, or disclosed during the Breach;
 - 5.03.2 Any other information that CITY is required to include in the notification to each Individual under 45 CFR §164.404 (c) at the time CONTRACTOR is required to notify CITY, or

promptly thereafter as this information becomes available, even after the regulatory sixty (60) day period set forth in 45 CFR §164.410 (b) has elapsed, including:

1. A brief description of what happened, including the date of the Breach and the date of the discovery of the Breach, if known;
 2. A description of the types of Unsecured PHI that were involved in the Breach (such as whether full name, social security number, date of birth, home address, account number, diagnosis, disability code, or other types of information were involved);
 3. Any steps Individuals should take to protect themselves from potential harm resulting from the Breach;
 4. A brief description of what CONTRACTOR is doing to investigate the Breach, to mitigate harm to Individuals, and to protect against any future Breaches; and
 5. Contact procedures for Individuals to ask questions or learn additional information, which shall include a toll-free telephone number, an e-mail address, Web site, or postal address.
- 5.04 CITY may require CONTRACTOR to provide notice to the Individual as required in 45 CFR §164.404, if at the sole discretion of the CITY, it is reasonable to do so under the circumstances.
- 5.05 In the event that CONTRACTOR is responsible for a Breach of Unsecured PHI in violation of the HIPAA Privacy Rule, CONTRACTOR shall have the burden of demonstrating that CONTRACTOR made all required notifications to CITY, and as required by the Breach notification regulations, or, in the alternative, that the acquisition, access, use, or disclosure of PHI did not constitute a Breach.
- 5.06 CONTRACTOR shall maintain documentation of all required notifications of a Breach or its risk assessment under 45 CFR §164.402 to demonstrate that a Breach did not occur.
- 5.07 CONTRACTOR shall provide to CITY all specific and pertinent information about the Breach, including the information listed above, if not yet provided, to permit CITY to meet its notification obligations under Subpart D of 45 CFR Part 164 as soon as practicable, but in no event later than fifteen (15) calendar days after CONTRACTOR's initial report of the Breach to CITY.
- 5.08 CONTRACTOR shall continue to provide all additional pertinent information about the Breach to CITY as it becomes available, in reporting increments of five (5) business days after the prior report to CITY. CONTRACTOR shall also respond in good faith to all reasonable requests for further information, or follow-up information, after report to CITY, when such request is made by CITY.
- 5.09 In addition to the provisions in the body of the Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall also bear all expense or other costs associated with the Breach and shall reimburse CITY for all expenses CITY incurs in addressing the Breach and consequences thereof, including costs of investigation, notification, remediation, documentation or other costs or expenses associated with addressing the Breach.

6. PERMITTED USES AND DISCLOSURES BY CONTRACTOR.

- 6.01 CONTRACTOR may use or further disclose PHI that CITY discloses to CONTRACTOR as necessary to perform functions, activities, or services for, or on behalf of, CITY as specified in the Agreement, provided that such use or Disclosure would not violate the HIPAA Privacy Rule if done by CITY.
- 6.02 CONTRACTOR may use PHI that CITY discloses to CONTRACTOR, if necessary, for the proper management and administration of the Agreement.
- 6.03 CONTRACTOR may disclose PHI that CITY discloses to CONTRACTOR to carry out the legal responsibilities of CONTRACTOR, if:
 - 6.03.1 The Disclosure is required by law; or
 - 6.03.2 CONTRACTOR obtains reasonable assurances from the person or entity to whom/which the PHI is disclosed that it will be held confidentially and used or further disclosed only as required by law or for the purposes for which it was disclosed to the person or entity and the person or entity immediately notifies CONTRACTOR of any instance of which it is aware in which the confidentiality of the information has been breached.
- 6.04 CONTRACTOR may use or further disclose PHI that CITY discloses to CONTRACTOR to provide Data Aggregation services relating to the Health Care Operations of CONTRACTOR.
- 6.05 CONTRACTOR may use and disclose PHI that CITY discloses to CONTRACTOR consistent with the minimum necessary policies and procedures of CITY.

7. OBLIGATIONS OF CITY.

- 7.01 CITY shall notify CONTRACTOR of any limitation(s) in CITY'S notice of privacy practices in accordance with 45 CFR §164.520, to the extent that such limitation may affect CONTRACTOR'S Use or Disclosure of PHI.
- 7.02 CITY shall notify CONTRACTOR of any changes in, or revocation of, the permission by an Individual to use or disclose his or her PHI, to the extent that such changes may affect CONTRACTOR'S Use or Disclosure of PHI.
- 7.03 CITY shall notify CONTRACTOR of any restriction to the Use or Disclosure of PHI that CITY has agreed to in accordance with 45 CFR §164.522, to the extent that such restriction may affect CONTRACTOR'S use or disclosure of PHI.
- 7.04 CITY shall not request CONTRACTOR to use or disclose PHI in any manner that would not be permissible under the HIPAA Privacy Rule if done by CITY.

8. BUSINESS ASSOCIATE TERMINATION.

- 8.01 Upon CITY'S knowledge of a material breach or violation by CONTRACTOR of the requirements of this Contract, CITY shall:

8.01.1 Provide an opportunity for CONTRACTOR to cure the material breach or end the violation within thirty (30) business days; or

8.01.2 Immediately terminate the Agreement, if CONTRACTOR is unwilling or unable to cure the material breach or end the violation within (30) days, provided termination of the Agreement is feasible.

8.02 Upon termination of the Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall either destroy or return to CITY all PHI CONTRACTOR received from CITY and any and all PHI that CONTRACTOR created, maintained, or received on behalf of CITY in conformity with the HIPAA Privacy Rule.

8.02.1 This provision shall apply to all PHI that is in the possession of subcontractors or agents of CONTRACTOR.

8.02.2 CONTRACTOR shall retain no copies of the PHI.

8.02.3 In the event that CONTRACTOR determines that returning or destroying the PHI is not feasible, CONTRACTOR shall provide to CITY notification of the conditions that make return or destruction infeasible. Upon determination by CITY that return or destruction of PHI is infeasible, CONTRACTOR shall extend the protections of this Agreement to the PHI and limit further Uses and Disclosures of the PHI to those purposes that make the return or destruction infeasible, for as long as CONTRACTOR maintains the PHI.

8.03 The obligations of this Agreement shall survive the termination of the Agreement.

9. SUBSTANCE ABUSE (42 C.F.R., Part 2).

CONTRACTOR shall also comply with all provisions of 42 C.F.R., Part 2 relating to substance abuse treatment and records.

EXHIBIT D

FEDERAL PROVISIONS

1. APPLICABILITY OF PROVISIONS

- 1.1. The Agreement to which these Federal Provisions are attached has been funded, in whole or in part, with an Award of Federal funds. In the event of a conflict between the provisions of these Federal Provisions, the body of the Agreement, or any attachments or exhibits incorporated into and made a part of the Agreement, the provisions of these Federal Provisions shall control.

2. DEFINITIONS

- 2.1. For the purposes of these Federal Provisions, the following terms shall have the meanings ascribed to them below.

- 2.1.1. "Award" means an award of Federal financial assistance, and the Agreement setting forth the terms and conditions of that financial assistance, that a non-Federal Entity receives or administers.

- 2.1.1.1. Awards may be in the form of:

- 2.1.1.1.1. Grants;

- 2.1.1.1.2. Contracts;

- 2.1.1.1.3. Cooperative Contracts, which do not include cooperative research and development Contracts (CRDA) pursuant to the Federal Technology Transfer Act of 1986, as amended (15 U.S.C. 3710);

- 2.1.1.1.4. Loans;

- 2.1.1.1.5. Loan Guarantees;

- 2.1.1.1.6. Subsidies;

- 2.1.1.1.7. Insurance;

- 2.1.1.1.8. Food commodities;

- 2.1.1.1.9. Direct appropriations;

- 2.1.1.1.10. Assessed and voluntary contributions; and

- 2.1.1.1.11. Other financial assistance transactions that authorize the expenditure of Federal funds by non-Federal Entities.

- 2.1.1.1.12. Any other items specified by OMB in policy memoranda available at the OMB website or other source posted by the OMB.

- 2.1.1.2. Award *does not* include:

- 2.1.1.2.1. Technical assistance, which provides services in lieu of money;

- 2.1.1.2.2. A transfer of title to Federally-owned property provided in lieu of money; even if the award is called a grant;

- 2.1.1.2.3. Any award classified for security purposes; or

- 2.1.1.2.4. Any award funded in whole or in part with Recovery funds, as defined in section 1512 of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) of 2009 (Public Law 111-5).
- 2.1.2. “Agreement” means the Agreement to which these Federal Provisions are attached and includes all Award types in §2.1.1.1 of this Exhibit.
- 2.1.3. “Contractor” means the party or parties to an Agreement funded, in whole or in part, with Federal financial assistance, other than the Prime Recipient, and includes grantees, subgrantees, Subrecipients, and borrowers. For purposes of Transparency Act reporting, Contractor does not include Vendors.
- 2.1.4. “Data Universal Numbering System (DUNS) Number” means the nine-digit number established and assigned by Dun and Bradstreet, Inc. to uniquely identify a business entity. Dun and Bradstreet’s website may be found at: <http://fedgov.dnb.com/webform>.
- 2.1.5. “Entity” means all of the following as defined at 2 CFR part 25, subpart C;
 - 2.1.5.1. A governmental organization, which is a State, local government, or Indian Tribe;
 - 2.1.5.2. A foreign public entity;
 - 2.1.5.3. A domestic or foreign non-profit organization;
 - 2.1.5.4. A domestic or foreign for-profit organization; and
 - 2.1.5.5. A Federal agency, but only a Subrecipient under an Award or Subaward to a non-Federal entity.
- 2.1.6. “Executive” means an officer, managing partner or any other employee in a management position.
- 2.1.7. “Federal Award Identification Number (FAIN)” means an Award number assigned by a Federal agency to a Prime Recipient.
- 2.1.8. “Federal Awarding Agency” means a Federal agency providing a Federal Award to a Recipient as described in 2 CFR §200.37
- 2.1.9. “FFATA” means the Federal Funding Accountability and Transparency Act of 2006 (Public Law 109-282), as amended by §6202 of Public Law 110-252. FFATA, as amended, also is referred to as the “Transparency Act.”
- 2.1.10. “Federal Provisions” means these Federal Provisions subject to the Transparency Act and Uniform Guidance, as may be revised pursuant to ongoing guidance from the relevant Federal or City and County of Denver, Colorado agency.
- 2.1.11. “OMB” means the Executive Office of the President, Office of Management and Budget.
- 2.1.12. “Prime Recipient” means the City and County of Denver, Colorado, or an agency thereof, that receives an Award.
- 2.1.13. “Subaward” means an award by a Recipient to a Subrecipient funded in whole or in part by a Federal Award. The terms and conditions of the Federal Award flow down to the Award unless the terms and conditions of the Federal Award specifically indicate otherwise in accordance with 2 CFR §200.38. The term does not include payments to a contractor or payments to an individual that is a beneficiary of a Federal program.

- 2.1.14. “Subrecipient” means a non-Federal Entity (or a Federal agency under an Award or Subaward to a non-Federal Entity) receiving Federal funds through a Prime Recipient to support the performance of the Federal project or program for which the Federal funds were awarded. A Subrecipient is subject to the terms and conditions of the Federal Award to the Prime Recipient, including program compliance requirements. The term “Subrecipient” includes and may be referred to as Subgrantee. The term does not include an individual who is a beneficiary of a federal program.
- 2.1.15. “Subrecipient Parent DUNS Number” means the subrecipient parent organization’s 9-digit Data Universal Numbering System (DUNS) number that appears in the subrecipient’s System for Award Management (SAM) profile, if applicable.
- 2.1.16. “System for Award Management (SAM)” means the Federal repository into which an Entity must enter the information required under the Transparency Act, which may be found at <http://www.sam.gov>.
- 2.1.17. “Total Compensation” means the cash and noncash dollar value earned by an Executive during the Prime Recipient’s or Subrecipient’s preceding fiscal year and includes the following:
- 2.1.17.1. Salary and bonus;
 - 2.1.17.2. Awards of stock, stock options, and stock appreciation rights, using the dollar amount recognized for financial statement reporting purposes with respect to the fiscal year in accordance with the Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 123 (Revised 2005) (FAS 123R), Shared Based Payments;
 - 2.1.17.3. Earnings for services under non-equity incentive plans, not including group life, health, hospitalization or medical reimbursement plans that do not discriminate in favor of Executives and are available generally to all salaried employees;
 - 2.1.17.4. Change in present value of defined benefit and actuarial pension plans;
 - 2.1.17.5. Above-market earnings on deferred compensation which is not tax-qualified;
 - 2.1.17.6. Other compensation, if the aggregate value of all such other compensation (e.g. severance, termination payments, value of life insurance paid on behalf of the employee, perquisites or property) for the Executive exceeds \$10,000.
- 2.1.18. “Transparency Act” means the Federal Funding Accountability and Transparency Act of 2006 (Public Law 109-282), as amended by §6202 of Public Law 110-252. The Transparency Act also is referred to as FFATA.
- 2.1.19. “Uniform Guidance” means the Office of Management and Budget Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards, which supersedes requirements from OMB Circulars A-21, A-87, A-110, and A-122, OMB Circulars A-89, A-102, and A-133, and the guidance in Circular A-50 on Single Audit Act follow-up. The terms and conditions of the Uniform Guidance flow down to Awards to Subrecipients unless the Uniform Guidance or the terms and conditions of the Federal Award specifically indicate otherwise.
- 2.1.20. “Vendor” means a dealer, distributor, merchant or other seller providing property or services required for a project or program funded by an Award. A Vendor is not a Prime Recipient or a Subrecipient and is not subject to the terms and conditions of the Federal award. Program compliance requirements do not pass through to a Vendor.

3. COMPLIANCE

- 3.1. Contractor shall comply with all applicable provisions of the Transparency Act, all applicable provisions of the Uniform Guidance, and the regulations issued pursuant thereto, including but not limited to these Federal Provisions. Any revisions to such provisions or regulations shall automatically become a part of these Federal Provisions, without the necessity of either party executing any further instrument. The City and County of Denver, Colorado may provide written notification to Contractor of such revisions, but such notice shall not be a condition precedent to the effectiveness of such revisions.

4. SYSTEM FOR AWARD MANAGEMENT (SAM) AND DATA UNIVERSAL NUMBERING SYSTEM (DUNS) REQUIREMENTS

- 4.1. **SAM.** Contractor shall maintain the currency of its information in SAM until the Contractor submits the final financial report required under the Award or receives final payment, whichever is later. Contractor shall review and update SAM information at least annually after the initial registration, and more frequently if required by changes in its information.
- 4.2. **DUNS.** Contractor shall provide its DUNS number to its Prime Recipient, and shall update Contractor's information in Dun & Bradstreet, Inc. at least annually after the initial registration, and more frequently if required by changes in Contractor's information.

5. TOTAL COMPENSATION

- 5.1. Contractor shall include Total Compensation in SAM for each of its five most highly compensated Executives for the preceding fiscal year if:
 - 5.1.1. The total Federal funding authorized to date under the Award is \$25,000 or more; and
 - 5.1.2. In the preceding fiscal year, Contractor received:
 - 5.1.2.1. 80% or more of its annual gross revenues from Federal procurement contracts and subcontracts and/or Federal financial assistance Awards or Subawards subject to the Transparency Act; and
 - 5.1.2.2. \$25,000,000 or more in annual gross revenues from Federal procurement contracts and subcontracts and/or Federal financial assistance Awards or Subawards subject to the Transparency Act; and
 - 5.1.3. The public does not have access to information about the compensation of such Executives through periodic reports filed under section 13(a) or 15(d) of the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 (15 U.S.C. 78m(a), 78o(d) or § 6104 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986.

6. REPORTING

- 6.1. Contractor shall report data elements to SAM and to the Prime Recipient as required in this Exhibit if Contractor is a Subrecipient for the Award pursuant to the Transparency Act. No direct payment shall be made to Contractor for providing any reports required under these Federal Provisions and the cost of producing such reports shall be included in the Contract price. The reporting requirements in this Exhibit are based on guidance from the US Office of Management and Budget (OMB), and as such are subject to change at any time by OMB. Any such changes shall be automatically incorporated into this Agreement and shall become part of Contractor's obligations under this Agreement.

7. EFFECTIVE DATE AND DOLLAR THRESHOLD FOR REPORTING

- 7.1. Reporting requirements in §8 below apply to new Awards as of October 1, 2010, if the initial award is \$25,000 or more. If the initial Award is below \$25,000 but subsequent Award modifications result in a total Award of \$25,000 or more, the Award is subject to the reporting requirements as of the date the Award exceeds \$25,000. If the initial Award is \$25,000 or more, but funding is subsequently de-obligated such that the total award amount falls below \$25,000, the Award shall continue to be subject to the reporting requirements.
- 7.2. The procurement standards in §9 below are applicable to new Awards made by Prime Recipient as of December 26, 2015. The standards set forth in §11 below are applicable to audits of fiscal years beginning on or after December 26, 2014.

8. SUBRECIPIENT REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

- 8.1. If Contractor is a Subrecipient, Contractor shall report as set forth below.
- 8.1.1. **To SAM.** A Subrecipient shall register in SAM and report the following data elements in SAM *for each* Federal Award Identification Number no later than the end of the month following the month in which the Subaward was made:
- 8.1.1.1. Subrecipient DUNS Number;
- 8.1.1.2. Subrecipient DUNS Number + 4 if more than one electronic funds transfer (EFT) account;
- 8.1.1.3. Subrecipient Parent DUNS Number;
- 8.1.1.4. Subrecipient's address, including: Street Address, City, State, Country, Zip + 4, and Congressional District;
- 8.1.1.5. Subrecipient's top 5 most highly compensated Executives if the criteria in §4 above are met; and
- 8.1.1.6. Subrecipient's Total Compensation of top 5 most highly compensated Executives if criteria in §4 above met.
- 8.1.2. **To Prime Recipient.** A Subrecipient shall report to its Prime Recipient, upon the effective date of the Contract, the following data elements:
- 8.1.2.1. Subrecipient's DUNS Number as registered in SAM.
- 8.1.2.2. Primary Place of Performance Information, including: Street Address, City, State, Country, Zip code + 4, and Congressional District.

9. PROCUREMENT STANDARDS

- 9.1. **Procurement Procedures.** A Subrecipient shall use its own documented procurement procedures which reflect applicable State, local, and Tribal laws and regulations, provided that the procurements conform to applicable Federal law and the standards identified in the Uniform Guidance, including without limitation, §§200.318 through 200.326 thereof.

- 9.2. **Procurement of Recovered Materials.** If a Subrecipient is a State Agency or an agency of a political subdivision of the State, its contractors must comply with section 6002 of the Solid Waste Disposal Act, as amended by the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act. The requirements of Section 6002 include procuring only items designated in guidelines of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) at 40 CFR part 247 that contain the highest percentage of recovered materials practicable, consistent with maintaining a satisfactory level of competition, where the purchase price of the item exceeds \$10,000 or the value of the quantity acquired during the preceding fiscal year exceeded \$10,000; procuring solid waste management services in a manner that maximizes energy and resource recovery; and establishing an affirmative procurement program for procurement of recovered materials identified in the EPA guidelines.

10. ACCESS TO RECORDS

- 10.1. A Subrecipient shall permit Recipient and auditors to have access to Subrecipient's records and financial statements as necessary for Recipient to meet the requirements of §200.331 (Requirements for pass-through entities), §§200.300 (Statutory and national policy requirements) through 200.309 (Period of performance), and Subpart F-Audit Requirements of the Uniform Guidance. 2 CFR §200.331(a)(5).

11. SINGLE AUDIT REQUIREMENTS

- 11.1. If a Subrecipient expends \$750,000 or more in Federal Awards during the Subrecipient's fiscal year, the Subrecipient shall procure or arrange for a single or program-specific audit conducted for that year in accordance with the provisions of Subpart F-Audit Requirements of the Uniform Guidance, issued pursuant to the Single Audit Act Amendments of 1996, (31 U.S.C. 7501-7507). 2 CFR §200.501.
- 11.1.1. **Election.** A Subrecipient shall have a single audit conducted in accordance with Uniform Guidance §200.514 (Scope of audit), except when it elects to have a program-specific audit conducted in accordance with §200.507 (Program-specific audits). The Subrecipient may elect to have a program-specific audit if Subrecipient expends Federal Awards under only one Federal program (excluding research and development) and the Federal program's statutes, regulations, or the terms and conditions of the Federal award do not require a financial statement audit of Prime Recipient. A program-specific audit may not be elected for research and development unless all of the Federal Awards expended were received from Recipient and Recipient approves in advance a program-specific audit.
- 11.1.2. **Exemption.** If a Subrecipient expends less than \$750,000 in Federal Awards during its fiscal year, the Subrecipient shall be exempt from Federal audit requirements for that year, except as noted in 2 CFR §200.503 (Relation to other audit requirements), but records shall be available for review or audit by appropriate officials of the Federal agency, the City and County of Denver, Colorado, and the Government Accountability Office.
- 11.1.3. **Subrecipient Compliance Responsibility.** A Subrecipient shall procure or otherwise arrange for the audit required by Part F of the Uniform Guidance and ensure it is properly performed and submitted when due in accordance with the Uniform Guidance. Subrecipient shall prepare appropriate financial statements, including the schedule of expenditures of Federal awards in accordance with Uniform Guidance §200.510 (Financial statements) and provide the auditor with access to personnel, accounts, books, records, supporting documentation, and other information as needed for the auditor to perform the audit required by Uniform Guidance Part F-Audit Requirements.

12. CONTRACT PROVISIONS FOR SUBRECIPIENT CONTRACTS

12.1. If Contractor is a Subrecipient, then it shall comply with and shall include all of the following applicable provisions in all subcontracts entered into by it pursuant to this Agreement.

12.1.1. **Equal Employment Opportunity.** Except as otherwise provided under 41 CFR Part 60, all contracts that meet the definition of “federally assisted construction contract” in 41 CFR Part 60-1.3 shall include the equal opportunity clause provided under 41 CFR 60-1.4(b), in accordance with Executive Order 11246, “Equal Employment Opportunity” (30 FR 12319, 12935, 3 CFR Part, 1964-1965 Comp., p. 339), as amended by Executive Order 11375, “Amending Executive Order 11246 Relating to Equal Employment Opportunity,” and implementing regulations at 41 CFR part 60, “Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs, Equal Employment Opportunity, Department of Labor.

12.1.1.1. During the performance of this Agreement, the Contractor agrees as follows:

12.1.1.1.1. Contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin. The Contractor will take affirmative action to ensure that applicants are employed, and that employees are treated during employment, without regard to their race, color, religion, sex, or national origin. Such action shall include, but not be limited to the following: Employment, upgrading, demotion, or transfer, recruitment or recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training, including apprenticeship. The Contractor agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices to be provided by the contracting officer setting forth the provisions of this nondiscrimination clause.

12.1.1.1.2. Contractor will, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the Contractor, state that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, color, religion, sex, or national origin.

12.1.1.1.3. Contractor will send to each labor union or representative of workers with which Contractor has a collective bargaining contract or other contract or understanding, a notice to be provided by the agency contracting officer, advising the labor union or workers' representative of the Contractor's commitments under section 202 of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment.

12.1.1.1.4. Contractor will comply with all provisions of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and of the rules, regulations, and relevant orders of the Secretary of Labor.

12.1.1.1.5. Contractor will furnish all information and reports required by Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and by the rules, regulations, and orders of the Secretary of Labor, or pursuant thereto, and will permit access to Contractor's books, records, and accounts by the contracting agency and the Secretary of Labor for purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with such rules, regulations, and orders.

- 12.1.1.1.6. In the event of Contractor's non-compliance with the nondiscrimination clauses of this Agreement or with any of such rules, regulations, or orders, this Agreement may be canceled, terminated or suspended in whole or in part and the Contractor may be declared ineligible for further Government contracts in accordance with procedures authorized in Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and such other sanctions may be imposed and remedies invoked as provided in Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, or by rule, regulation, or order of the Secretary of Labor, or as otherwise provided by law.
- 12.1.1.1.7. Contractor will include the provisions of paragraphs (1) through (7) in every subcontract or purchase order unless exempted by rules, regulations, or orders of the Secretary of Labor issued pursuant to section 204 of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, so that such provisions will be binding upon each subcontractor or vendor. The Contractor will take such action with respect to any subcontract or purchase order as may be directed by the Secretary of Labor as a means of enforcing such provisions including sanctions for noncompliance: Provided, however, that in the event Contractor becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a subcontractor or vendor as a result of such direction, the Contractor may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the United States.”
- 12.1.2. **Davis-Bacon Act.** Davis-Bacon Act, as amended (40 U.S.C. 3141-3148). When required by Federal program legislation, all prime construction contracts in excess of \$2,000 awarded by non-Federal entities must include a provision for compliance with the Davis-Bacon Act (40 U.S.C. 3141-3144, and 3146-3148) as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 CFR Part 5, “Labor Standards Provisions Applicable to Contracts Covering Federally Financed and Assisted Construction”). In accordance with the statute, contractors must be required to pay wages to laborers and mechanics at a rate not less than the prevailing wages specified in a wage determination made by the Secretary of Labor. In addition, contractors must be required to pay wages not less than once a week. The non-Federal entity must place a copy of the current prevailing wage determination issued by the Department of Labor in each solicitation. The decision to award a contract or subcontract must be conditioned upon the acceptance of the wage determination. The non-Federal entity must report all suspected or reported violations to the Federal awarding agency. The contracts must also include a provision for compliance with the Copeland “Anti-Kickback” Act (40 U.S.C. 3145), as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 CFR Part 3, “Contractors and Subcontractors on Public Building or Public Work Financed in Whole or in Part by Loans or Grants from the United States”). The Act provides that each contractor or Subrecipient must be prohibited from inducing, by any means, any person employed in the construction, completion, or repair of public work, to give up any part of the compensation to which he or she is otherwise entitled. The non-Federal entity must report all suspected or reported violations to the Federal awarding agency.
- 12.1.3. **Rights to Inventions Made Under a Contract or Contract.** If the Federal Award meets the definition of “funding Contract” under 37 CFR §401.2 (a) and Subrecipient wishes to enter into a contract with a small business firm or nonprofit organization regarding the substitution of parties, assignment or performance of experimental, developmental, or research work under that “funding Contract,” Subrecipient must comply with the requirements of 37 CFR Part 401, “Rights to Inventions Made by Nonprofit Organizations and Small Business Firms Under Government Grants, Contracts and Cooperative Contracts,” and any implementing regulations issued by the awarding agency.

- 12.1.4. **Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. 7401-7671q.) and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (33 U.S.C. 1251-1387), as amended.** Contracts and subgrants of amounts in excess of \$150,000 must contain a provision that requires the non-Federal award to agree to comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. 7401-7671q) and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act as amended (33 U.S.C. 1251-1387). Violations must be reported to the Federal awarding agency and the Regional Office of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).
- 12.1.5. **Debarment and Suspension (Executive Orders 12549 and 12689).** A contract award (see 2 CFR 180.220) must not be made to parties listed on the government wide exclusions in the System for Award Management (SAM), in accordance with 31 CFR 19 and the OMB guidelines at 2 CFR 180 that implement Executive Orders 12549 (3 CFR part 1986 Comp., p. 189) and 12689 (3 CFR part 1989 Comp., p. 235), "Debarment and Suspension." SAM Exclusions contains the names of parties debarred, suspended, or otherwise excluded by agencies, as well as parties declared ineligible under statutory or regulatory authority other than Executive Order 12549.
- 12.1.6. **Byrd Anti-Lobbying Amendment (31 U.S.C. 1352).** Contractors that apply or bid for an award exceeding \$100,000 must file the required certification. Each tier certifies to the tier above that it will not and has not used Federal appropriated funds to pay any person or organization for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a member of Congress, officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a member of Congress in connection with obtaining any Federal contract, grant or any other award covered by 31 U.S.C. 1352. Each tier must also disclose any lobbying with non-Federal funds that takes place in connection with obtaining any Federal award. Such disclosures are forwarded from tier to tier up to the non-Federal award.
- 12.1.7. **Drug-Free Workplace Act (42 U.S.C. 701).** Contractors agree to comply with the provisions of Section 5151-5160 of the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1988 (Pub. L. 100-690, Title V, Subtitle D; 41 U.S.C. 701). By accepting this award, the Contractor certifies that it will provide a Drug-Free Workplace by implementing all necessary provisions and requirements.

13. CERTIFICATIONS

- 13.1. Unless prohibited by Federal statutes or regulations, the City and County of Denver as Prime Recipient may require Subrecipient to submit certifications and representations required by Federal statutes or regulations on an annual basis. 2 CFR §200.208. Submission may be required more frequently if Subrecipient fails to meet a requirement of the Federal award. Subrecipient shall certify in writing to the City and County of Denver at the end of the Award that the project or activity was completed, or the level of effort was expended. 2 CFR §200.201(3). If the required level of activity or effort was not carried out, the amount of the Award must be adjusted.

14. EXEMPTIONS

- 14.1. These Federal Provisions do not apply to an individual who receives an Award as a natural person, unrelated to any business or non-profit organization he or she may own or operate in his or her name.
- 14.2. A Contractor with gross income from all sources of less than \$300,000 in the previous tax year is exempt from the requirements to report Subawards and the Total Compensation of its most highly compensated Executives.

14.3. There are no Transparency Act reporting requirements for Vendors.

15. EVENT OF DEFAULT

15.1. Failure to comply with these Federal Provisions shall constitute an event of default under the Agreement and the City and County of Denver, Colorado may terminate the Agreement upon thirty (30) days prior written notice if the default remains uncured five (5) calendar days following the termination of the thirty (30) day notice period. This remedy will be in addition to any other remedy available to the City and County of Denver, Colorado under the Agreement, at law or in equity.

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
