



SHELTER USAGE


The following slides account for shelter occupancy between May and Sept 2016.

- Unit of measure is nightly total, and monthly average.
- Reflects shelter occupancy at Catholic Charities and Delores Project for women, Den Rescue Mission (including Peoria) and Salvation Army Crossroads for men. Does not include Urban Peak, or program beds at Samaritan House, etc.
- This does NOT reflect the total <u>capacity</u> of the shelter network, but rather its <u>usage</u>.



SHELTER USAGE SINGLE MEN


Men's Nightly Shelter Usage, May-Sept 2016






SHELTER USAGE SINGLE WOMEN

Women's Nightly Shelter Usage, May-Sept 2016






SHELTER USAGE MONTHLY AVERAGES*

TRANSPORTATION TO SHELTER


Charter bus transportation is a critical element to overflow shelter programming.

- Charter bus transportation is provided to single adults who are going to shelter (currently, Peoria Shelter).
- Taxi or RTD vouchers are provided to families to arrive to motel accommodations. Urban Peak provides RTD bus transportation to shelter.
- Other shelters operate via pedestrian access.



TRANSPORTATION TO SHELTER

Denver's Road Home currently contracts with BusCo for three busses; each completes three transports. Total # of A to B transports is 9.





TRANSPORTATION TO SHELTER

Single Women

- Single Women stage at Catholic Charities--Samaritan House
 - Evening meals are provided at Samaritan House
 - 3 bus trips transport up to 150 women
 - Women are returned to St.
 Francis Center in the morning
 - Women must store belongings at Samaritan House


Single Men

- Single Men stage at Lawrence St. Community Center
 - Evening and Morning meals are provided at Lawrence St. Community Center
 - Six bus trips transport up to 300 men


Transportation in fall of 2017......


Unduplicated Contacts: Jan. 2009-Sep 2016








Sheltered: Jan. 2009-Oct. 2015




Current Capacity

- Total 18 FTE Outreach workers at St. Francis
 Center, CCH, and Urban Peak
- 4 DPD officers
- 2 Behavioral Health Navigators
- Expansion in 2017
 - Two FTE (and portion supervisor) at Salvation
 Army for night Search and Rescue.
 - This extends outreach capacity to 1:00a.




TRANSITIONAL HOUSING, LONG-TERM SHELTER & SUPPORTIVE SERVICES

- DRH partners with programs to provide a wide range of supportive housing and services – to address root causes of homelessness, and promote stability.



CAHPS

- Coordinated Assessment & Housing
 Placement System—Two parts
- Common Assessment Tool, Outreach and Prioritization
- Housing Placement, Navigation and Case
 Conferencing, Matching



METRO DENVER CAHPS STRONG REGIONAL BASE



- Regional community partners come togethe OneHome Together, bringing people home weekly/monthly to develop this CAHPS system to prioritize the most vulnerable chronically homeless individuals for supportive housing.
- Currently 50+ agencies refer into the system
- Housing providers enter vacancies into and receive referrals from the CAHPS system
- We have a functional By-Name list of veterans who are homeless in the region and veteran providers meet regularly to track our data

CURRENT PRIORITIES

- Housing homeless families and youth through CAHPS, more regional agency participation (in progress)
 - Youth Pilot started October 2016
 - Family Planning underway; pilot scheduled January 2017
- System and data improvements
 - HMIS vendor change, system to include Coordinated Entry/Assessment
 - Exploration of mobile device usage
 - Consideration of regional data warehouse
 - Reporting
- Expand CAHPS infrastructure
- Housing placement support
- Marketing and branding of CAHPS



IBM-Smarter Cities Challenge

- Denver & MMC collaborative, one of 16 global 2015 grant winners—built on CAHPS
- Challenge—Design integrated system to coordinate service delivery in metro area
- Task Force in place to evaluate IBM proposal
- Make recommendations and assess if social, political capital exists
