

Services Provided

- The **Bridge to Home Program** will primarily serve households referred through OneHome and outreach to encampments but may also serve individuals and families staying at an emergency shelter or safe-haven, or fleeing, or attempting to flee domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, and/or other dangerous or life-threatening conditions related to violence.
- The Bridge Housing Program may serve individuals exiting homelessness from an institution such as a Colorado State institution, a hospital, jail or prison, a halfway house, child welfare or another institution, at risk of institutionalization, at risk of becoming homeless or for formally homeless individuals.
- Bridge Housing staff will work collaboratively with existing CCH service teams to assist in the completion of OneHome assessments, applications for Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH), outreach to landlords, housing search/navigation, and accessing needed medical, behavioral health, substance, and other clinical treatment.
- Once Bridge Housing participants transition into their permanent supportive housing, clients will be provided ongoing case management, clinical counseling, and other supports to help them maintain housing stability.

 - telephone access,
 - clothing bank,
 - shower facilities.
- SFC shall provide limited supportive services, such as:
 - client support,
 - transportation assistance,
 - life skill development,
 - substance misuse referral and education, and
 - referrals to benefit enrollment and medical treatment.

• SFC will assign and program **200 individually locked containers** for use by persons experiencing homelessness.



- SFC will be responsible for managing access to the lockers, overseeing locker usage, and conducting the day-to-day operations of the facility.
- The storage facility shall be open the following hours:
 - Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday: 8:00 a.m. 11:30 a.m. & 12:30 p.m. 3:45 p.m.
 - Wednesday: 8:00 a.m. 11:30 a.m. & 12:30 p.m. 1:00 p.m.

Services Overview



- **Emergency Shelter:** A confidential and safe 34-bed Emergency Shelter Program operates 24-hours per day, 365 days per year.
- A **24-Hour Crisis & Information Line** provides callers with intervention services, support and informed resource referrals.
- Case Management & Supportive Services: Advocates will work with survivors to address barriers to self-sufficiency by gaining knowledge of, and access to, community resources, such as affordable housing, legal services, employment, public benefits and childcare.
- Individual Counseling: Advocates will work with survivors to address the impact of domestic violence by providing support, domestic violence education and safety planning. Domestic violence education helps survivors learn how to recognize abusive behaviors and identify risk-factors specific to their situation.
- Group Counseling: Group sessions to socialize survivors to more supportive networks and provide opportunities for personal growth and education.
- **Family Program:** Family Advocates will work with clients to address the goals and challenges of the entire family, including a monthly parent child group, to promote discussion among family members and improve the parent-child bond.
