"A dog breeding operation in which the health of the dogs is disregarded in order to maintain a low overhead and maximize profits."

Avenson v. Zegart, 577 F. Supp. 958, 960 (United States District Court, D. Minnesota, Sixth Division January 17, 1984)


The Problem With Mill Bred Puppies, Kittens & Rabbits

- Breeding methods are inherently cruel.
- Inbreeding frequently results in costly future medical expenses.
- Pet stores may use predatory lending schemes to finance animals.
- Public health issues zoonotic diseases (from animals to humans).

Pet Stores Say They Source Only From USDA Licensed Facilities, but...



- 45% of the USDA licensed dog dealers during 2024 never had a USDA compliance inspection.
- One out of every five USDA inspections uncovered failures, often with no corrective action taken.
- 30% of violations are for veterinary issues: sick, injured or even dead animals having never been seen by a veterinarian or given medical care.




"We saw several dogs with missing limbs, or parts of limbs, likely due to the mat strangling and cutting off circulation and then limbs falling off."

Puppies Can Be Expensive

Puppies can be a major purchase, often requiring financing through a lender affiliated with the pet shop. In Colorado lenders can charge up to 36%.


A \$6,000 puppy financed for 36 months at 36% would cost the owner \$9,893.62.

Like any finance deal, if you fail to make payments the "property" may be repossessed.

Cute Puppies Can Age Out

As puppies get older, they may be less desirable to customers, so pet stores often mark down prices in an effort to move inventory.

Puppies that don't sell may be dumped on shelters or sent to a mill to become breeding stock for even more puppies.

Health & Financial Concerns

- In-breeding of animals often results in health and genetic problems that may not be apparent for months, or even years after the animal is brought home.
- These problems can cost owners hundreds, or even thousands of dollars.
- When owners cannot afford medical care and otherwise "curable" animal may be euthanized, or the animal may be surrendered to a shelter, thus creating an extra burden on shelter resources.

Pet store puppies linked to outbreak of infections in humans, CDC says

Multi-drug-resistant infections reported across 13 U.S. states have been linked to contact with puppies, particularly puppies at pet stores, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) said Tuesday. The infections are caused by a bacteria known as Campylobacter that can cause diarrhea, fever and abdominal cramps.

The CDC said 15 out of 24 people who were interviewed reported having contact with a puppy at a pet store, and 80 percent of those people reported a link to **Petland**, a pet store chain.

Proactive Measure

- ✓ There are currently no pet stores in the City and County of Denver selling puppies and kittens. None of the Denver pet stores checked sell rabbits.
- ✓ Passing an ordinance would not result in lost revenues or jobs, but it would prevent the possibility of a puppy, kitten or bunny mill from marketing in Denver.

Prohibitions Increase as More States and Cities Learn About the Problems Mills Create

✓ Eight states* and 500 cities and townships nationwide, including 24 in Colorado, have banned the sale of mill bred dogs and cats in pet stores.

This Ordinance Will Not:

- Prohibit or impact responsible, local breeders who only sell directly to the public so they can screen potential buyers.
- Prevent pet stores from having "adoption" events in coordination with local shelters or rescues.
- Close the Denver market to the majority of pet stores that focus on pet products and services—a \$152 billion dollar industry."

Denver Animal Shelter

Denver's Open Admission Animal Shelter

- 44% increase in animal intake compared to 2019 pre-pandemic numbers.
- Owner surrendered animals increased by 175% in 2024 compared to 2019.
- Increase continues into first six months of 2025: owner surrendered animals increased by 200% compared to 2019.
