9	WHEREAS, in 1948, Mayor Quigg Newton created the Mayor's Committee on Human Relations;					
10	WHEREAS, the Agency for Human Rights and Community Relations was established by					
11	ordinance in 1984 ("Agency");					
12	WHEREAS, in 2004, Mayor Hickenlooper created the Denver Office of Strategic Partnerships					
13	("Office");					
14	WHEREAS, the Agency and the Office believe a number of opportunities exist for collaboration					
15	within the community and amongst the Agency's commissions and the Denver Office of Strategic					
16	Partnerships Commission and that there is potential for additional collaboration;					
17	WHEREAS, Council finds that opportunities for collaboration exist and that there is potential for					
18	additional collaboration; and					
19	WHEREAS, Council finds that combining the Agency and the Office would facilitate collaboration.					
20	BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY AND COUNTY OF DENVER:					
21	ARTICLE II AGENCY FOR HUMAN RIGHTS AND COMMUNITY					
22	RELATIONS PARTNERSHIPS					
23	Sec. 28-16 Created.					
24	There is hereby created the agency for human rights and community relationspartnerships as a staff					
25	agency under the mayor. The agency shall consist of the executive director and appropriate staff.					
26	Sec. 28-17 Powers and duties.					
27	The powers and duties of the agency are:					
28	(1) At the request of the mayor, or of the council acting by resolution, to investigate incidents or					
29	patterns of discrimination by city agencies based on age, race, ethnicity, religion, disability, sexual					
30	orientation, gender or gender variance, and to report such findings within a reasonable time to the					
31	mayor and council. (1) To develop and conduct programs to be used by community groups,					

(2) Upon request of a city agency or the mayor, to conduct programs for city employees that will improve their understanding of the issues and opportunities of youth older adults, racial, ethnic, and

transgender persons, and people with disabilities.

Denver employers, and local agencies specifically to address issues and opportunities of nonprofits,

older adults, youth, racial, ethnic, and religious minorities, women, gay, lesbian, bisexual,

- religious minorities, women, gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender persons, and people with disabilities, and nonprofits working with or on behalf of any of these populations.
 - (3) In the event of widespread civil disturbance, natural disaster or other emergency, and at the request of the mayor, to provide for dissemination of reliable <u>and accessible</u> information to citizens in coordination with the office of emergency preparedness or <u>and</u> other appropriate agencies. <u>Accessible information may include, without limitation, sign language interpretation, computer aided real-time transcription, Braille, and other accommodations based on a disability.</u>
 - (4) For limited periods of time, aAssist community groups which seek improved city services or improved communications with the city and to report to the mayor and the council on these activities in a timely manner.
 - (5) To maintain a referral database of community services available to make available to Denver residents, neighborhood organizations and groups, nonprofits, older adults, racial, ethnic, and religious minorities, gay, lesbian, bisexual or transgender persons, women, and people with disabilities information regarding community services for these populations.
 - (6) To act as liaison of the city to the Denver Sister Cities International organization.
 - (7) To exercise powers provided to the agency under article IV of this chapter.
- 17 (8) To promote compliance with and implementation of the Americans with Disabilities Act among 18 city departments and properties and act as a resource for external entities.
 - (9) To engage and integrate new and developing communities in civic participation and community involvement.
- 21 (10) To develop and execute training and capacity building programs that build relationships, 22 knowledge, and skills for City agencies, nonprofits, and the community to work together.
- 23 (11) To develop and execute initiatives that create an enhanced environment of support for 24 nonprofits and community members working with the City and County of Denver.
- 25 (12) To leverage, coordinate, or distribute resources to enhance nonprofit and community access to funding opportunities to better meet community needs.
- 27 **Sec. 28-18. Mission.**

- The Agency for Human Rights and Community Partnership's mission and purpose of the agency is to serve as a communication link between the city and its residents in the agency's advocacy for human rights and community relations. The agency shall advocate on the issues and opportunities of its constituent groups and for the rights of all people consistent with the Charter and authority granted under article II is to proactively protect human rights, build capacities, and strengthen connections that result in stronger relationships in the community through collaboration, communication, and advocacy. Its mission is to be construed and executed consistent with the Charter and authority granted in this article II.
- 35 Sec. 28-19. Membership in outside organizations.
- Staff members shall not participate as members in outside organizations on city time, without prior written approval from the executive director.

- 1 Sec. 28-20. Commissions—Created.
- 2 The following commissions are hereby created: a Commission for People with Disabilities, Commission
- on Aging, Denver Women's Commission, Denver Gay Lesbian Bisexual Transgender Commission,
- 4 Denver Latino Commission, Denver African American Commission, Denver Asian Pacific American
- 5 Commission, and Denver American Indian Commission, and Denver Office for Strategic Partnerships
- 6 Commission.
- 7 Sec. 28-21. Same—Appointments, removal, terms.
- 8 (a) Each commission must consist of no less than seven (7) commission members and no more than
- 9 twenty-one (21) commission members. All members of each commission shall be appointed by the mayor
- and confirmed by council acting by resolution.
- 11 (b) Commission members shall serve without compensation, except that commission members may be
- reimbursed for expenses incurred in connection with the work of the commission in accordance with the
- charter and code, executive orders, fiscal rules, and city policies and as approved by the executive
- 14 director.
- 15 (c) All members will serve in accordance with section 2.2.6 of the Charter.
- (d) The terms of the members shall be two (2) years; the terms shall be staggered so that one-half (1/2)
- of the members are appointed each year. In the event of the death or resignation of any member, his/her
- successor shall be appointed in the manner provided for original appointment, to serve for the unexpired
- 19 portion of the term for which such member has been appointed.
- 20 (e) Subject to the executive director's confirmation, chairpersons will be elected by the respective
- 21 commissions in accordance with its bylaws.
- 22 (f) The term of each chairperson is one (1) year. No commission member may serve as chairperson for
- more than two (2) consecutive one-year terms.
- 24 Sec. 28-22. Same—Membership.
- 25 (a) The membership of the commission shall make a good faith effort to represent the ethnic, gender,
- racial, age distribution, sexual orientation, geographic demographics area, and political viewpoints and
- 27 affiliations of their constituency population.
- 28 (b) Qualifications for commission membership must be set forth in the respective commissions' by-laws.
- 29 Sec. 28-23. Same—Powers and duties.
- The powers and duties of each of the commissions are to:
- 31 (1) Advise the executive director and the mayor on the special issues and opportunities of its respective constituent groups.
- 33 (2) Recommend necessary procedures, programs, legislation or administrative action and to
- promote equal rights and opportunity for the people of the city to the executive director.

 35 (3) Develop and present goals and objectives of the commissions to the executive director and the
- advisory board annually.
- 37 (4) Elect one (1) individual as its delegate to the advisory board and one (1) individual as its

- alternate delegate to the advisory board. If the primary delegate cannot attend a scheduled meeting or perform their duties, the alternate delegate shall attend scheduled meetings and perform duties at the primary delegate's request.
- 4 (5) Develop and adopt bylaws concerning internal affairs, including, without limitation, membership qualifications, governance, and operation of the commission. All bylaws, including any amendments thereto, are subject to the executive director's approval.
- 7 (6) Provide, as requested by the Agency, input to office directors regarding annual goals, priorities, and objectives.
- 9 Sec. 28-24. Advisory board—Created.
- The human rights and community relations partnerships advisory board is hereby created.
- 11 Sec. 28-25. Same—Appointments, removal, terms.
- 12 (a) The advisory board shall consist of one representative from each agency commission and five (5)
- 13 community representatives. The community representatives shall be appointed by the mayor and
- confirmed by council acting by resolution. All members shall serve in accordance with section 2.2.6 of the
- 15 Charter.
- 16 (b) The members shall serve without compensation, except that advisory board members may be
- 17 reimbursed for expenses incurred in connection with the work of the advisory board in accordance with
- the charter and code, executive orders, fiscal rules, and city policies and as approved by the executive
- 19 director.
- 20 (c) The terms of the advisory board <u>members</u> shall be two (2) years.
- 21 (d) The terms shall be staggered so that one-half (1/2) of the members are appointed each year. In the
- 22 event of the death or resignation of any member, a successor shall be appointed in the manner provided
- for original appointment, to serve for the unexpired portion of the term for which such member has been
- 24 appointed.
- 25 (e) The advisory board shall nominate a member to serve as chairperson, shall be nominated by the
- 26 advisory board and appointed by the mayor who upon acceptance of the nomination, confirmation by the
- 27 Executive Director, and subject to the Charter, article II of this chapter, and the advisory board's bylaws,
- shall serve as chair for a period of one (1) year. The chairperson shall serve for a period of one (1) year.
- 29 No advisory board member elected chairperson may serve more than two (2) consecutive terms as
- 30 chairperson. The Executive Director has the right to remove the chairperson from this position for cause.
- 31 Sec. 28-26. Same—Membership.
- 32 The advisory board will consist of a representative from each commission and five (5) community
- 33 representatives. Community representatives may not concurrently serve on any of the agency's
- 34 commissions and the advisory board.
- 35 Sec. 28-27. Same—Powers and duties.
- The powers and duties of the advisory board shall be to:
- 37 (a) Advise the executive director on special or emerging issues or opportunities that may affect

1 constituent groups.

- (b) Provide input to the executive director regarding en annual agency goals, priorities, and objectives, such as analysis of the annual plans of the advisory commissions.
 - (c) Receive reports from commission delegates regarding the work of the delegates respective commission as it relates to the advisory board's agenda.
 - (d) Create sub-committees, as needed, to research an emerging issue or situation for a time period determined by the advisory board and recommend necessary procedures, programs, legislation or administrative action in a final report submitted to the executive director.
 - (e) The advisory board shall meet at least six (6) times a year and may hold special meetings as the chairperson deems necessary.
- (f) Develop and adopt bylaws concerning governance and operation of the board. All bylaws, including amendments thereto, are subject to the executive director's approval.
 - (g) The advisory board shall conduct a review every five years to assess the viability and effectiveness of each commission and to evaluate the need to eliminate existing or establish new commissions. The advisory board shall report its findings and make recommendations to the executive director in writing or orally or both as requested by the executive director or mayor.
