### **DCCC** Responsibilities

- Determines selection criteria and makes funding decisions for Tier III organizations.
- DCCC presents funding plan annually to Denver City Council Committee.

 DCCC submits an annual plan to the SCFD Board of Directors for the distribution of Tier III revenues collected within the geographic boundaries of the City and County of Denver.

# Denver County Grant Overview FUNDS WILL BE DISTRIBUTED IN TWO POOLS: General Operating Support & Discretionary Grants

- General Operating Support (GOS)
  - March application deadline → October funding distribution
  - Recipients must be committed to benefitting the broad diversity of Denver tax-paying residents
  - Requests are limited to up to 15% or \$85,000, whichever is lower
  - Organizations must hold a majority of their activities in Denver
  - DCCC has option for modifying funding schema
  - DCCC evaluates organizations through Values document

### • Equity, Diversity & Inclusion Advancement Grants

Grants designed to address the organization's need to plan and execute actions that further equity, diversity, and inclusion for BIPOC and other historically excluded communities including LGBTQIA+ and people with disabilities.

Nov. Application deadline  $\rightarrow$  Dec. funding distribution

### **GOS Granting Timeline**

- March: Applications are due to SCFD (SCFD screens for eligibility and performs financial analysis)
- April-June: Evaluation of applications
- June: DCCC makes funding determination
- July-August: Denver City Council presentation and submission to SCFD
- September: SCFD Board funding approval
- October: Funding distribution

### **GOS Granting Guidelines for 2022:**

- In an effort to make allocation of surplus funds more equitable across organizations, Council decided to do so based on score.
- Organizations that scored above 80 (based on their weighted score) were granted more funds than those that scored below.
- This provides organizations an incentive to strive towards improving their internal practices in relation to the DCCC Values document.
- Council agreed to revisit the maximum amount an organization can request.
