








Amache Ochinee Prowers

- Ameohtse'e (Amache/Walking Woman) was the daughter of O'kenehe (Ochinee/One-Eye), a prominent Cheyenne Chief who was murdered during the Sand Creek Massacre in 1864
- Known as an activist, a mediator, and a bridge between cultures
- Married John Prowers in 1861, moved to Bent's Fort and opened a trading store in Boggsville
- Testified in Congress regarding reparations related to the Sand Creek Massacre
- Received land grants along Arkansas River to establish one of the largest ranches in the area
- Maintained Cheyenne traditions, including language, and culinary and medicinal recipes
- Inducted into Colorado Women's Hall of Fame in 2018



Amache Prowers Memorial Park

- Would be the FIRST park in the City and County of Denver to carry an Indigenous or American Indian name
- Trennie Burch of the Denver American Indian Commission suggested naming the park in memory of Amache Prowers
- Naming the park in memory of Amache Prowers would be a tribute to her efforts in bridging cultural divides, along with her leadership in her family's business and advocacy for Native American rights and symbolizes the resilience and unity that parks often represent
- In addition, "a park bearing her name would be a tribute to her dedication to cultural understanding, community leadership, and her role in shaping the American West"
