

115.12K (66.27%)



Evaluation Timeline

• Subcommittees will set their own cadence: Likely to require a two-hour, weekly meeting for 4 to 5 weeks

Meetings start: Week of April 14

Meetings end: Week of May 16



Evaluation Process

- Subcommittee members will receive summaries of each project in their committee at the first group meeting (week of April 14)
- During the weekly meetings, subcommittees will evaluate projects and prioritize them into tiers
- Subject Matter Experts from city agencies will serve on each subcommittee to provide technical expertise
- Project tiers from all subcommittees go to the Executive Committee for further refinement



Evaluation Criteria

- Project evaluations will include:
 - Community Needs and Benefit How does this project change or improve the lives of the people in the community?
 - Community Equity Does this address historic deficits in services and investment? How will this project impact the community holistically? Do the long-term benefits from the project outweigh the negative impacts from project implementation?
 - Economic Impacts Does this project promote economic activity? Does this project create growth? Does this project require long term O&M investment?
 - Health, Safety, and Environmental impacts Does this project address health and safety concerns? Does it increase or decrease environmental impacts?
 - Project Readiness Can this project be completed in 6 years?



Follow Ups from March Update

- How is this process set up to help drive equitable outcomes?
 - 1. Technical Review Committee has answered OSEI's equity questions for each project (questions shown on next slide)
 - 2. Subcommittees will be asked to evaluate Projects with equity in mind, including historic service and spending deficits, project impacts, and long-term project benefits against the impacts from project implementation
 - 3. Staffing coordination with OSEI throughout the subcommittee process
 - 4. Dr. Sanders membership on Executive Committee



Equity Questions at Technical Review Committee Stage

- Does the program impacted by this request most directly serve internal customers (e.g., other City Departments/Employees) or external customers (e.g., Denver Residents/Businesses)?
- Was feedback from the community/stakeholders used to inform the program that would be impacted (directly or indirectly) by this request?
- Does the program impacted by this request increase or decrease access to city services/opportunities for:
 - Historically marginalized racial and ethnic communities
 - Other structurally marginalized groups (e.g., older adults, people with disabilities, individuals with limited English proficiency, people experiencing homelessness, LGBTQ community, or individuals living below federal poverty levels)
 - City employees who are members of the historically and structurally marginalized communities
 - Specific Denver neighborhoods/communities (e.g., <u>NEST neighborhoods</u>, inverted L)



Follow Ups from March Update

- Request for "mill levy 101" and more information on property tax impacts:
 - Mill Levy 101 presented to FinGov on April 8
- Property tax impacts added to Bond website:
 - This General Obligation (GO) bond measure will not increase residents' property tax rates. It will use an existing property tax that is dedicated to pay back bonds and can only be used for this purpose. Taxpayers already pay this property tax. The city uses bonds to help meet its capital requirements. As older bonds are paid down, Denver voters can elect to have the city replace those with new bonds without increasing property taxes.

Bonds are typically paid back over a long time horizon, which keeps the annual costs low for taxpayers. If voters choose not to approve new bonds, existing taxes could go toward paying down current bonds faster.
