

All in Mile High Outcomes 2023-2025


- Largest multi-year reduction in unsheltered homelessness on record
- Lowest unsheltered count among major cities in 2025
- 26% reduction in deaths among people experiencing homelessness in 2024


Deaths Among People Experiencing Homelessness (PEH) by Year; Denver Medical Examiner Cases






Denver Significantly Reduced Its Number of Large Homeless Encampments from July 2023 to January 2025



AIMH Sites & Services Over Time

- One-time Federal funds were leveraged in 2023 and 2024 to produce a historic reduction in unsheltered homelessness.
- Recurring Costs stabilized in 2025 and will decrease in 2026.



2025 Plan is based on amounts in contract and annualized actuals as of June/July 2025

AIMH Expenditures are on track to stabilize as planned in 2025

GS	Maintenance, Repairs, Security	\$4.1M
HOST	Operations and Supportive Services at AIMH sites	\$17.2M

Impact:

- 1485 people moved to shelter from January 1, 2025 to June 30, 2025
- 743 people moved to housing from January 1, 2025 to June 30, 2025
- Unsheltered homelessness decreased by 45% from January 2023 to January 2025

*Radisson closed in March of 2025 and Comfort Inn will close in March of 2026



Addressing Homelessness in 2026



2026 efforts will focus on utilization of the entire homelessness response as one integrated system (including congregate shelters and all of HOST's programs)



Street engagement activities that work to connect people to appropriate services every day across the entire system of care



Expanded access to treatment and behavioral health services for high acuity individuals
