# **House 1000 Estimated Costs and Funding in 2023**

#### **COVID SRF Transfer**

Allows the city to transfer the remaining cash balance of this fund to the Department of Housing Stability's General Fund appropriation to support the city's 2023 goal to shelter 1,000 people. This amount is estimated to be approximately \$8M but may be adjusted as transactions are finalized.

#### **ARPA Interest Earnings**

Allows the city to use \$4.7M in unallocated interest to support the city's 2023 goal to shelter 1,000 people.

#### **Rescind & Appropriate**

Rescinds \$2M of unused capital improvement funds and appropriates \$2M into the Capital Program HY002 – Micro Communities Implementation.
