

## ON-CALL AGREEMENT FOR PROFESSIONAL SERVICES

**THIS AGREEMENT FOR PROFESSIONAL SERVICES** (“**Agreement**”) is made and entered into as of the date stated on the City’s signature page below (the “**Effective Date**”) by and between the **CITY AND COUNTY OF DENVER**, a municipal corporation of the State of Colorado acting on behalf of its Department of Aviation (the “**City**”), and **LOGISTICAL PLANNERS, LLC**, a Colorado limited liability company authorized to do business in the State of Colorado (“**Consultant**”) (collectively the “**Parties**”).

### WITNESSETH:

**WHEREAS**, the City owns, operates, and maintains Denver International Airport (“**DEN**”); and

**WHEREAS**, the City desires to obtain professional design, consulting, and operation and maintenance (O&M) technical support services related to the DEN Baggage Handling System (BHS) and Individual Carrier System (ICS) on an on-call/as needed basis; and

**WHEREAS**, the City has undertaken a competitive process to solicit and receive proposals for such services, and has selected the proposal submitted by Consultant; and

**WHEREAS**, Consultant’s proposal was selected for award of the DEN Baggage Handling System (BHS) and Individual Carrier System (ICS) On-Call Agreement (the “**Project**”); and

**WHEREAS**, Consultant is qualified, willing, and able to perform the services, as set forth in this Agreement in a timely, efficient, and economical manner; and

**NOW, THEREFORE**, for and in consideration of the premises and other good and valuable consideration, the Parties agree as follows:

#### 1. LINE OF AUTHORITY:

The Chief Executive Officer of the Department of Aviation or their designee or successor in function (the “**CEO**”), authorizes and directs all work performed under this Agreement. Until otherwise notified in writing by the CEO, the CEO has delegated the authority granted herein to the SVP of Airport Operations. The relevant Senior Vice President (the “**SVP**”), or their designee (the “**Director**”), will designate a BHS Administrator to coordinate professional services under this Agreement. Reports, memoranda, correspondence, and other submittals required of Consultant hereunder shall be processed in accordance with the BHS Administrator’s directions.

#### 2. SCOPE OF WORK AND CONSULTANT RESPONSIBILITIES:

**A. Scope of Services.** Consultant shall provide professional services and deliverables for the City as designated by the CEO, from time to time and as described in the attached *Exhibit A* (“**Scope of Work**”) and in accordance with Task Orders, schedules and budgets set by the City. Without requiring an amendment to this Agreement, the City may, through a Task Order or similar form issued by the CEO and signed by the Consultant, make minor changes, additions, or deletions

to the Scope of Work without change to the Maximum Contract Amount.

**B. Task Orders.** The BHS Administrator or Designee will issue task orders for work to be completed under this Agreement (“**Task Orders**”). The terms of each Task Order must include but are not limited to information regarding schedule, staffing, and pricing. The Director may reduce or increase the scope of work and/or staffing required by a Task Order and the time and cost of performance shall be adjusted to reflect the time and cost resulting from the reduction or increase. In the City’s sole discretion, the BHS Administrator may elect to directly solicit or competitively procure the work under each Task Order.

**C. Standard of Performance.**

i. Consultant shall faithfully perform the work required under this Agreement in accordance with the standard of care, skill, efficiency, knowledge, training, and judgment provided by highly competent professionals who perform work of a similar nature to the work described in this Agreement.

ii. Consultant shall be liable to the City for all acts and omissions of Consultant and its employees, subcontractors, agents and any other party with whom Consultant contracts to perform any portion of the work under this Agreement, including any design elements of any authorized Task Order.

**D. Time is of the Essence.** Consultant acknowledges that time is of the essence in its performance of all work and obligations under this Agreement. Consultant shall perform all work under this Agreement in a timely and diligent manner.

**E. Subcontractors.**

i. In order to retain, hire, and/or contract with an outside subcontractor that is not identified in this Agreement for work under this Agreement, Consultant must obtain the prior written consent of the CEO. Consultant shall request the CEO’s approval in writing and shall include a description of the nature and extent of the services to be provided; the name, address and professional experience of the proposed subcontractor; and any other information requested by the City.

ii. The CEO shall have the right to reject any proposed outside subcontractor deemed by the CEO to be unqualified or unsuitable for any reason to perform the proposed services. The CEO shall have the right to limit the number of outside subcontractors and/or to limit the percentage of work to be performed by them.

iii. Any final agreement or contract with an approved subcontractor must contain a valid and binding provision whereby the subcontractor waives any and all rights to make any claim of payment against the City or to file or claim any lien or encumbrance against any City property arising out of the performance or non-performance of this Agreement and/or the subcontract.

iv. Consultant is subject to Denver Revised Municipal Code (“**D.R.M.C.**”) § 20-112, wherein Consultant shall pay its subcontractors in a timely fashion. A payment is

timely if it is mailed to the subcontractor no later than seven (7) days after receipt of any payment from the City. Any late payments are subject to a late payment penalty as provided in the Denver Prompt Payment Ordinance (D.R.M.C. §§ 20-107 through 20-118).

v. This Section, or any other provision of this Agreement, shall not create any contractual relationship between the City and any subcontractor. The City's approval of a subcontractor shall not create in that subcontractor a right to any subcontract. The City's approval of a subcontractor does not relieve Consultant of its responsibilities under this Agreement, including the work to be performed by the subcontractor.

#### **F. Personnel Assignments.**

i. Consultant or its subcontractor(s) shall assign all key personnel identified in this Agreement, including Task Order(s), to perform work under this Agreement ("Key Personnel"). Key Personnel shall perform work under this Agreement, unless otherwise approved in writing by the SVP. or their authorized representative. In the event that replacement of Key Personnel is necessary, the City in its sole discretion shall approve or reject the replacement, if any, or shall determine that no replacement is necessary.

ii. It is the intent of the Parties that all Key Personnel perform their specialty for all such services required by this Agreement. Consultant and its subcontractor(s) shall retain Key Personnel for the entire Term of this Agreement to the extent practicable and to the extent that such services maximize the quality of work performed.

iii. If, during the Term of this Agreement, the BHS Administrator determines that the performance of any Key Personnel or other personnel, whether of Consultant or its subcontractor(s), is not acceptable or that any such personnel is no longer needed for performance of any work under this Agreement or Task Order(s), the BHS Administrator shall notify Consultant and may give Consultant notice of the period of time which the BHS Administrator considers reasonable to correct such performance or remove the personnel, as applicable.

iv. If Consultant fails to correct such performance, then the City may revoke its approval of the Key Personnel or other personnel in question and notify Consultant that such Key Personnel or other personnel will not be retained on this Project. Within thirty (30) days of receiving this notice, Consultant shall use its best efforts to obtain adequate substitute personnel who must be approved in writing by the BHS Administrator. Consultant's failure to obtain the BHS Administrator's approval shall be grounds for Termination for Cause in accordance with this Agreement.

### **3. OWNERSHIP AND DELIVERABLES:**

Upon payment to Consultant, all records, data, deliverables, and any other work product prepared by Consultant or any custom development work performed by Consultant for the purpose of performing this Agreement on or before the day of the payment, whether periodic or final payment, shall become the sole property of the City. Upon request by the City, or based on any schedule agreed to by Consultant and the City, Consultant shall provide the City with copies of the data/files that have been uploaded to any database maintained by or on behalf of Consultant or

otherwise saved or maintained by Consultant as part of the services provided to the City under this Agreement. All such data/files shall be provided to the City electronically in a format agreed to by the Parties. Consultant also agrees to allow the City to review any of the procedures Consultant uses in performing any work or other obligations under this Agreement, and to make available for inspection any and all notes, documents, materials, and devices used in the preparation for or performance of any of the scope of work, for up to three (3) years after termination of this Agreement. Upon written request from the City, Consultant shall deliver any information requested pursuant to this Section within ten (10) business days in the event a schedule or otherwise agreed-upon timeframe does not exist.

#### **4. TERM AND TERMINATION:**

**A. Term.** The Term of this Agreement shall commence on January 6, 2023, and shall expire on January 5, 2026, unless terminated in accordance with the terms stated herein (the “**Expiration Date**”, and collectively the “**Term**”). The Term of this Agreement may be extended for two additional one-year periods, on the same terms and conditions, by written notice from the CEO to Consultant. However, no extension of the Term shall increase the Maximum Contract Amount stated below.

**B.** If the Term expires prior to Consultant completing the work under this Agreement, subject to the prior written approval of the CEO, this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect until the completion of any services commenced prior to the Expiration Date. Consultant has no right to compensation for services performed after the Expiration Date without such express approval from the CEO.

#### **C. Suspension and Termination.**

i. Suspension. The City may suspend performance of this Agreement at any time with or without cause. Upon receipt of notice from the SVP, Consultant shall, as directed in the notice, stop work and submit an invoice for any work performed but not yet billed. Any milestones or other deadlines shall be extended by the period of suspension unless otherwise agreed to by the City and Consultant. The Expiration Date shall not be extended as a result of a suspension.

ii. Termination for Convenience. The City may terminate this Agreement at any time without cause upon written notice to Consultant.

iii. Termination for Cause. In the event Consultant fails to perform any provision of this Agreement, the City may either:

a. Terminate this Agreement for cause with ten (10) days prior written notice to Consultant; or

b. Provide Consultant with written notice of the breach and allow Consultant an Opportunity to Cure.

iv. Opportunity to Cure. Upon receiving the City’s notice of breach pursuant to Section 4(C)(iii)(b), Consultant shall have five (5) days to commence remedying its

defective performance. If Consultant diligently cures its defective performance to the City's satisfaction within a reasonable time as determined by the City, then this Agreement shall not terminate and shall remain in full force and effect. If Consultant fails to cure the breach to the City's satisfaction, then the City may terminate this Agreement pursuant to Section 4(C)(iii)(a).

v. Compensation for Services Performed Prior to Suspension or Termination Notice. If this Agreement is suspended or terminated, the City shall pay Consultant the reasonable cost of only those services performed to the satisfaction of the CEO prior to the notice of suspension or termination. Consultant shall submit a final invoice for these costs within thirty (30) days of the date of the notice. Consultant has no right to compensation for services performed after the notice unless directed to perform those services by the City as part of the suspension or termination process or as provided in Section 4(C)(vi) below.

vi. Reimbursement for Cost of Orderly Termination. In the event of Termination for Convenience of this Agreement pursuant to Section 4(C)(ii), Consultant may request reimbursement from the City of the reasonable costs of orderly termination associated with the Termination for Convenience as part of its submittal of costs pursuant to Section 4(C)(v). In no event shall the total sums paid by the City pursuant to this Agreement, including Sections 4(C)(v) and (C)(vi), exceed the Maximum Contract Amount.

vii. No Claims. Upon termination of this Agreement, Consultant shall have no claim of any kind against the City by reason of such termination or by reason of any act incidental thereto. Consultant shall not be entitled to loss of anticipated profits or any other consequential damages as a result of termination.

**D. Remedies.** In the event Consultant breaches this Agreement, Consultant shall be liable to the City for all costs of correcting the work without additional compensation, including but not limited to additional costs incurred by the City, its tenants, or its other contractors arising out of Consultant's defective work. These remedies are in addition to, and do not limit, the remedies available to the City in law or in equity. These remedies do not amend or limit the requirements of Section 8 and Section 9 otherwise provided for in this Agreement.

## 5. COMPENSATION AND PAYMENT:

**A. Maximum Contract Amount.** Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, the City shall not be liable under any theory for payment for services rendered and expenses incurred by Consultant under the terms of this Agreement for any amount in excess of the sum of **Twenty-Three Million Dollars and Zero Cents (\$23,000,000.00)** ("**Maximum Contract Amount**"). Consultant shall perform the services and be paid for those services as provided for in this Agreement, including in any Task Order(s), up to the Maximum Contract Amount.

**B. Limited Obligation of City.** The obligations of the City under this Agreement shall extend only to monies appropriated and encumbered for the purposes of this Agreement. Consultant acknowledges and understands the City does not by this Agreement irrevocably pledge

present cash reserves for payments in future fiscal years, and this Agreement is not intended to create a multiple-fiscal year direct or indirect debt or financial obligation of the City. The City is not under any obligation to make any future encumbrances or appropriations for this Agreement nor is the City under any obligation to amend this Agreement to increase the Maximum Contract Amount above.

**C. Payment Source.** For payments required under this Agreement, the City shall make payments to Consultant solely from funds of the Airport System Fund and from no other fund or source. The City has no obligation to make payments from any other source.

**D. Basis for Consultant's Fee.** Consultant's fee is based on the time required by its professionals to complete the services under this Agreement. Individual hourly rates are set forth in *Exhibit B* ("Rates") and vary according to the experience and skill required.

**E. Payment Schedule.** Subject to the Maximum Contract Amount, for payments required under this Agreement, the City shall pay Consultant's fees and expenses in accordance with this Agreement. Unless otherwise agreed to in writing, Consultant shall invoice the City on a regular basis in arrears and the City shall pay each invoice in accordance with Denver's Prompt Payment Ordinance, D.R.M.C. § 20-107, *et seq.*, subject to the Maximum Contract Amount.

**F. Invoices.** Unless otherwise provided in a Task Order, Consultant shall submit to the City a monthly progress invoice containing reimbursable costs and receipts from the previous month for professional services rendered under this Agreement to be audited and approved by the City ("**Invoice**"). Each Invoice shall provide the basis for payments to Consultant under this Agreement. In submitting an Invoice, Consultant shall comply with all requirements of this Agreement and:

- i. Include an executive summary and status report(s) that describe the progress of the services and summarize the work performed during the period covered by the Invoice;
- ii. Include a statement of recorded hours that are billed at an hourly rate;
- iii. Include the relevant purchase order ("**PO**") number related to the Invoice;
- iv. Ensure that amounts shown on the Invoices comply with and clearly reference the relevant services, indicate the hourly rate and multiplier where applicable, and identify the allowable reimbursable expenses;
- v. For only those reimbursable costs incurred in the previous month, submit itemized business expense logs and, where billing is based upon receipts, include copies of receipts for all allowable reimbursable expenses;
- vi. Include the signature of an authorized officer of Consultant, along with such officer's certification they have examined the Invoice and found it to be correct; and
- vii. Submit each Invoice via email to [ContractAdminInvoices@flydenver.com](mailto:ContractAdminInvoices@flydenver.com).

viii. Late Fees. Consultant understands and agrees interest and late fees shall be payable by the City only to the extent authorized and provided for in the City's Prompt Payment Ordinance.

ix. Travel Expenses. Travel and any other expenses are not reimbursable unless such expenses are related to and in furtherance of the purposes of Consultant's engagement, are in accordance with this Agreement, and Consultant receives prior written approval of the SVP or their authorized representative.

**G. Timesheets.** Consultant shall maintain all timesheets kept or created in relation to the services performed under this Agreement. The City may examine such timesheets and any other related documents upon the City's request.

**H. Disputed Invoices.** The City reserves the right to reject and not pay any Invoice or part thereof, including any final Invoice resulting from a Termination of this Agreement or any Task Order, where the SVP or their authorized representative determines the amount invoiced exceeds the amount owed based upon the work satisfactorily performed. The City shall pay any undisputed items contained in an Invoice. Disputes concerning payments under this provision shall be resolved in accordance with procedures set forth in Section 9.

**I. Carry Over.** If Consultant's total fees for any of the services provided under this Agreement are less than the amount budgeted for, the amount remaining in the budget may be used for additional and related services rendered by Consultant if the CEO determines such fees are reasonable and appropriate and provides written approval of the expenditure.

## **6. MWBE, WAGES AND PROMPT PAYMENT:**

### **A. Minority/Women Business Enterprise.**

i. This Agreement is subject to Article V of Chapter 28, Denver Revised Municipal Code ("D.R.M.C."), designated as §§ 28-117 to 28-199 (the "Goods and Services Ordinance"); and any Rules and Regulations promulgated pursuant thereto. The contract goal for MWBE participation established for this Agreement by the Division of Small Business Opportunity ("DSBO") is 7%. The Consultant shall comply the Equity, Diversity and Inclusion Plan attached as *Exhibit D* ("**EDI Plan**") and as it may be modified in the future by the Division of Small Business Opportunity ("DSBO"). The EDI Plan shall constitute the Utilization Plan required by D.R.M.C. § 28-129.

ii. Under § 28-132, D.R.M.C., the Consultant has an ongoing, affirmative obligation to maintain for the duration of this Agreement, at a minimum, compliance with the MWBE participation upon which this Agreement was awarded, unless there is a change in the work by the City under § 28-133, D.R.M.C. The Consultant acknowledges that:

a. It must maintain records and submit regular reports, as required under the Goods and Services Ordinance and as directed by DSBO, which will allow the City to assess progress in complying with the MWBE participation goal.

b. If contract modifications are issued under the Agreement, whether

by amendment or otherwise, the Consultant shall have a continuing obligation to promptly inform DSBO in writing of any agreed upon increase or decrease in the scope of work of such contract under § 28-133, D.R.M.C., regardless of whether such increase or decrease in scope of work has been reduced to writing at the time of notification of the change to the City.

c. If there are changes in the work that include an increase in scope of work under this Agreement, whether by amendment or otherwise, which increases the dollar value of the contract, whether or not such change is within the scope of work designated for performance by an MWBE at the time of contract award, such change or modification shall be immediately submitted to DSBO for notification purposes.

d. Those amendments or other modifications that involve a changed scope of work that cannot be performed by existing subcontractors shall be subject to the original goal on the contract. The Consultant shall satisfy such goal with respect to the changed scope of work by soliciting new MWBEs in accordance with §§ 28-133, D.R.M.C. The Consultant must also satisfy the requirements under §§ 28-128 and 28-136, D.R.M.C., with regard to changes in MWBE scope or participation. The Consultant shall supply to DSBO all required documentation under §§ 28-128, 28-133, and 28-136, D.R.M.C., with respect to the modified dollar value or work under the contract.

e. If applicable, for contracts of one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) and over, the Consultant is required to comply with § 28-135, D.R.M.C., regarding prompt payment to MWBEs. Payment to MWBE subcontractors shall be made by no later than thirty-five (35) days after receipt of the MWBE subcontractor's invoice.

f. Termination or substitution of an MWBE subcontractor requires compliance with § 28-136, D.R.M.C.

g. Failure to comply with these provisions may subject the Consultant to sanctions set forth in § 28-139 of the Goods and Services Ordinance.

h. Should any questions arise regarding DSBO requirements, the Consultant should consult the Goods and Services Ordinance or may contact the designated DSBO representative at (720) 913-1999.

**B. Prevailing Wage.** To the extent required by law, Consultant shall comply with, and agrees to be bound by, all requirements, conditions and City determinations regarding the Payment of Prevailing Wages Ordinance, D.R.M.C. §§ 20-76 through 20-79, including, but not limited to, the requirement that every covered worker working on a City owned or leased building or on City-owned land shall be paid no less than the prevailing wages and fringe benefits in effect on the Effective Date of this Agreement.

i. Prevailing wage and fringe rates will adjust on, and only on, the anniversary of the Effective Date of this Agreement. Unless expressly provided for in this Agreement,



Consultant will receive no additional compensation for increases in prevailing wages or fringe benefits.

ii. Consultant shall provide the Auditor with a list of all subcontractors providing any services under the Agreement.

iii. Consultant shall provide the Auditor with electronically-certified payroll records for all covered workers employed under this Agreement.

iv. Consultant shall prominently post at the work site the current prevailing wage and fringe benefit rates. The posting must inform workers that any complaints regarding the payment of prevailing wages or fringe benefits may be submitted to the Denver Auditor by calling 720-913-5000 or emailing auditor@denvergov.org.

v. If Consultant fails to pay workers as required by the Prevailing Wage Ordinance, Consultant will not be paid until documentation of payment satisfactory to the Auditor has been provided. The City may, by written notice, suspend or terminate work if Consultant fails to pay required wages and fringe benefits.

**C. City Minimum Wage.** To the extent required by law, Consultant shall comply with and agrees to be bound by all requirements, conditions, and the City determinations regarding the City's Minimum Wage Ordinance, D.R.M.C. §§ 20-82 through 20-84, including, but not limited to, the requirement that every covered worker shall be paid no less than the City Minimum Wage in accordance with the City's Minimum Wage Ordinance. By executing this Agreement, Consultant expressly acknowledges that Consultant is aware of the requirements of the City's Minimum Wage Ordinance and that any failure by Consultant, or any other individual or entity acting subject to this Agreement, to strictly comply with the foregoing D.R.M.C. Sections shall result in the penalties and other remedies authorized therein.

**D. City Prompt Pay.**

i. The City will make monthly progress payments to Consultant for all services performed under this Agreement based upon Consultant's monthly invoices or shall make payments as otherwise provided in this Agreement. The City's Prompt Payment Ordinance, D.R.M.C. §§ 20-107 to 20-118 applies to invoicing and payment under this Agreement.

ii. Final Payment to Consultant shall not be made until after the Project is accepted, and all certificates of completion, record drawings and reproducible copies are delivered to the City, and the Agreement is otherwise fully performed by Consultant. The City may, at the discretion of the Director, withhold reasonable amounts from billing and the entirety of the final payment until all such requirements are performed to the satisfaction of the Director.

**7. INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS:**

**A.** Consultant shall obtain and keep in force all of the minimum insurance coverage forms and amounts set forth in *Exhibit C* ("Insurance Requirements") during the entire Term of

this Agreement, including any extensions of the Agreement or other extended period stipulations stated in *Exhibit C*. All certificates of insurance must be received and accepted by the City before any airport access or work commences.

**B.** Consultant shall ensure and document that all subcontractors performing services or providing goods hereunder procure and maintain insurance coverage that is appropriate to the primary business risks for their respective scopes of performance. At minimum, such insurance must conform to all applicable requirements of DEN Rules and Regulations Part 230 and all other applicable laws and regulations.

**C.** The City in no way warrants or represents the minimum limits contained herein are sufficient to protect Consultant from liabilities arising out of the performance of the terms and conditions of this Agreement by Consultant, its agents, representatives, employees, or subcontractors. Consultant shall assess its own risks and maintain higher limits and/or broader coverage as it deems appropriate and/or prudent. Consultant is not relieved of any liability or other obligations assumed or undertaken pursuant to this Agreement by reason of its failure to obtain or maintain insurance in sufficient amounts, duration, or types.

**D.** In no event shall the City be liable for any of the following: (i) business interruption or other consequential damages sustained by Consultant; (ii) damage, theft, or destruction of Consultant's inventory, or property of any kind; or (iii) damage, theft, or destruction of an automobile, whether or not insured.

**E.** The Parties understand and agree that the City, its elected and appointed officials, employees, agents and volunteers are relying on, and do not waive or intend to waive by any provisions of this Agreement, the monetary limitations and any other rights, immunities and protections provided by the Colorado Governmental Immunity Act, C.R.S. §§ 24-10-101 to 120, or otherwise available to the City, its elected and appointed officials, employees, agents and volunteers.

## **8. DEFENSE AND INDEMNIFICATION:**

**A.** Consultant hereby agrees to defend, indemnify, reimburse and hold harmless the City, its appointed and elected officials, agents and employees for, from and against all liabilities, claims, judgments, suits or demands for damages to persons or property arising out of, resulting from, or relating to the work performed under this Agreement (“**Claims**”), unless such Claims have been specifically determined by the trier of fact to be the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the City. This indemnity shall be interpreted in the broadest possible manner to indemnify the City for any acts or omissions of Consultant or its subcontractors either passive or active, irrespective of fault, including City’s concurrent negligence whether active or passive, except for the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the City.

**B.** Consultant’s duty to defend and indemnify the City shall arise at the time written notice of the Claim is first provided to the City regardless of whether Claimant has filed suit on the Claim. Consultant’s duty to defend and indemnify the City shall arise even if the City is the only party sued by claimant and/or claimant alleges that the City’s negligence or willful misconduct was the sole cause of claimant’s damages.

C. Consultant will defend any and all Claims which may be brought or threatened against the City and will pay on behalf of the City any expenses incurred by reason of such Claims including, but not limited to, court costs and attorney fees incurred in defending and investigating such Claims or seeking to enforce this indemnity obligation, including but not limited to time expended by the City Attorney Staff, whose costs shall be computed at the rate of two hundred dollars and no cents (\$200.00) per hour of City Attorney time. Such payments on behalf of the City shall be in addition to any other legal remedies available to the City and shall not be considered the City's exclusive remedy.

D. Insurance coverage requirements specified in this Agreement shall in no way lessen or limit the liability of Consultant under the terms of this indemnification obligation. Consultant shall obtain, at its own expense, any additional insurance that it deems necessary for the City's protection.

E. This defense and indemnification obligation shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.

## 9. DISPUTES:

All disputes arising under or related to this Agreement shall be resolved by administrative hearing under the procedures described in D.R.M.C. § 5-17 and all related rules and procedures. The determination resulting from said administrative hearing shall be final, subject only to the right to appeal the determination under Colorado Rule of Civil Procedure, Rule 106.

## 10. GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS:

A. **Status of Consultant.** Parties agree that the status of Consultant shall be an independent contractor retained on a contractual basis to perform professional or technical services for limited periods of time as described in §9.1.1(E)(x) of the Charter of the City and County of Denver (the "**City Charter**"). It is not intended, nor shall it be construed, that Consultant or its personnel are employees or officers of the City under D.R.M.C. Chapter 18 for any purpose whatsoever.

B. **Assignment.** Consultant shall not assign, pledge or transfer its duties, obligations, and rights under this Agreement, in whole or in part, without first obtaining the written consent of the CEO. Any attempt by Consultant to assign or transfer its rights hereunder without such prior written consent shall, at the option of the CEO, automatically terminate this Agreement and all rights of Consultant hereunder.

C. **Compliance with all Laws and Regulations.** Consultant and its subcontractor(s) shall perform all work under this Agreement in compliance with all existing and future applicable laws, rules, regulations, and codes of the United States, and the State of Colorado and with the City Charter, ordinances, Executive Orders and rules and regulations of the City.

### D. **Compliance with Patent, Trademark and Copyright Laws.**

i. Consultant agrees that all work performed under this Agreement shall comply with all applicable patent, trademark and copyright laws, rules, regulations and

codes of the United States, as they may be amended from time to time. Consultant will not utilize any protected patent, trademark or copyright in performance of its work unless it has obtained proper permission, all releases, and other necessary documents. If Consultant prepares any documents which specify any material, equipment, process or procedure which is protected, Consultant shall disclose such patents, trademarks and copyrights in such documents.

ii. Pursuant to Section 8, Consultant shall indemnify and defend the City from any and all claims, damages, suits, costs, expenses, liabilities, actions or proceedings resulting from, or arising out of, directly or indirectly, the performance of work under this Agreement which infringes upon any patent, trademark or copyright protected by law.

**E. Notices.**

i. Notices of Termination. Notices concerning termination of this Agreement shall be made as follows:

ii. Delivery of Formal Notices. Formal notices of the termination of this Agreement shall be delivered personally during normal business hours to the appropriate office above or by prepaid U.S. certified mail, return receipt requested ; express mail (Fed Ex, UPS, or similar service) or package shipping or courier service; or by electronic delivery directed to the person identified above and copied to the BHS Administrator through the electronic or software system used at the City's direction for Task Order-related and other official communications and document transmittals. Mailed notices shall be deemed effective upon deposit with the U.S. Postal Service and electronically transmitted notices by pressing "send" or the equivalent on the email or other transmittal method sufficient to irretrievably transmit the document. Either party may from time to time designate substitute addresses or persons where and to whom such notices are to be mailed, delivered or emailed, but such substitutions shall not be effective until actual receipt of written or electronic notification thereof through the method contained in Subsection (E)(ii).

iii. Other Correspondence. Other notices and day-to-day correspondence

between the Parties may be done via email directed to the BHS Administrator or through the electronic or software system used at the City's direction in writing for Task Order-related communications and transmittals at the City's direction.

**F. Rights and Remedies Not Waived.** In no event shall any payment by the City hereunder constitute or be construed to be a waiver by the City of any breach of covenant or default which may then exist on the part of Consultant. The City making any such payment when any breach or default exists shall not impair or prejudice any right or remedy available to the City with respect to such breach or default. The City's assent, expressed or implied, to any breach of any one or more covenants, provisions or conditions of this Agreement shall not be deemed or taken to be a waiver of any other breach.

**G. No Third-Party Beneficiaries.** The Parties agree that enforcement of the terms and conditions of this Agreement and all rights of action relating to such enforcement shall be strictly reserved to the City and Consultant, and nothing contained in this Agreement shall give or allow any such claim or right of action by any third party. It is the express intention of the Parties that any person or entity other than the City or Consultant receiving services or benefits under this Agreement shall be deemed an incidental beneficiary and shall not have any interest or rights under this Agreement.

**H. Governing Law.** This Agreement is made under and shall be governed by the laws of the State of Colorado. Each and every term, provision and condition herein is subject to the provisions of Colorado law, the City Charter, and the ordinances and regulations enacted pursuant thereto, as may be amended from time to time.

**I. Bond Ordinances.** This Agreement is in all respects subject and subordinate to any and all the City bond ordinances applicable to the Airport System and to any other bond ordinances which amend, supplement, or replace such bond ordinances.

**J. Venue.** Venue for any action arising hereunder shall be in the City and County of Denver, Colorado.

**K. Cooperation with Other Contractors.**

i. The City may award other contracts for additional work, and Consultant shall fully cooperate with such other contractors. The City, in its sole discretion, may direct Consultant to coordinate its work under this Agreement with one or more such contractors.

ii. Consultant shall have no claim against the City for additional payment due to delays or other conditions created by the operation of other contractors. The City will decide the respective rights of the various contractors in order to secure the completion of the work.

**L. Inurement.** The rights and obligations of the Parties herein set forth shall inure to the benefit of and be binding upon the Parties hereto and their respective successors and assigns permitted under this Agreement.

**M. Force Majeure.** The Parties shall not be liable for any failure to perform any of its

obligations hereunder due to or caused by, in whole or in part, fire, strikes, lockouts, unusual delay by common carriers, unavoidable casualties, war, riots, acts of terrorism, acts of civil or military authority, acts of God, judicial action, or any other causes beyond the control of the Parties. The Parties shall have the duty to take reasonable actions to mitigate or prevent further delays or losses resulting from such causes.

**N. Coordination and Liaison.** Consultant agrees that during the term of this Agreement it shall fully coordinate all services that it has been directed to proceed upon and shall make every reasonable effort to fully coordinate all such services as directed by the Director or their authorized representative, along with any City agency, or any person or firm under contract with the City doing work which affects Consultant's work.

**O. No Authority to Bind City to Contracts.** Consultant has no authority to bind the City on any contractual matters. Final approval of all contractual matters which obligate the City must be by the City as required by the City Charter and ordinances.

**P. Information Furnished by the City.** The City will furnish to Consultant information concerning matters that may be necessary or useful in connection with the work to be performed by Consultant under this Agreement. The Parties shall make good faith efforts to ensure the accuracy of information provided to the other Party; however, Consultant understands and acknowledges that the information provided by the City to Consultant may contain unintended inaccuracies. Consultant shall be responsible for the verification of the information provided to Consultant.

**Q. Severability.** In case any one or more of the provisions contained in the Agreement shall for any reason be held to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable in any respect, such invalidity, illegality or unenforceability shall not affect any other provision hereof, and this Agreement shall be construed as if such invalid, illegal or unenforceable provision had never been contained herein.

**R. Taxes and Costs.** Consultant shall promptly pay, when due, all taxes, bills, debts and obligations it incurs performing work under this Agreement and shall allow no lien, mortgage, judgment or execution to be filed against land, facilities or improvements owned by the City.

**S. Environmental Requirements.** Consultant, in conducting its activities under this Agreement, shall comply with all existing and future applicable local, state and federal environmental rules, regulations, statutes, laws and orders (collectively "**Environmental Requirements**"), including but not limited to Environmental Requirements regarding the storage, use and disposal of Hazardous or Special Materials and Wastes, Clean Water Act legislation, Centralized Waste Treatment Regulations, and DEN Rules and Regulations.

i. For purposes of this Agreement the terms "Hazardous Materials" shall refer to those materials, including without limitation asbestos and asbestos-containing materials, polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs), per – and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS), oil or any other petroleum products, natural gas, source material, pesticide, and any hazardous waste, toxic substance or related material, including any substance defined or treated as a "hazardous substance," "hazardous waste" or "toxic substance" (or comparable term) in the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act (42 U.S.C. Sec.

9601 *et seq.* (1990)), the Toxic Substances Control Act (15 U.S.C. Sec. 2601 *et seq.* (1990)), and any rules and regulations promulgated pursuant to such statutes or any other applicable federal or state statute.

ii. Consultant shall acquire all necessary federal, state and local environmental permits and comply with all applicable federal, state and local environmental permit requirements.

iii. Consultant agrees to ensure that its activities under this Agreement are conducted in a manner that minimizes environmental impact through appropriate preventive measures. Consultant agrees to evaluate methods to reduce the generation and disposal of waste materials.

iv. In the case of a release, spill or leak as a result of Consultant's activities under this Agreement, Consultant shall immediately control and remediate the contaminated media to applicable federal, state and local standards. Consultant shall reimburse the City for any penalties and all costs and expenses, including without limitation attorney's fees, incurred by the City as a result of the release or disposal by Consultant of any pollutant or hazardous material.

**T. Non-Exclusive Rights.** This Agreement does not create an exclusive right for Consultant to provide the services described herein at DEN. The City may, at any time, award other agreements to other contractors or consultants for the same or similar services to those described herein. In the event of a dispute between Consultant and any other party at DEN, including DEN itself, as to the privileges of the parties under their respective agreements, CEO shall determine the privileges of each party and Consultant agrees to be bound by CEO's decision.

## **11. RECORD RETENTION AND OTHER STANDARD CITY PROVISIONS:**

**A. Diversity and Inclusiveness.** The City encourages the use of qualified small businesses doing business within the metropolitan area that are owned and controlled by economically or socially disadvantaged individuals. Consultant is encouraged, with respect to the goods or services to be provided under this Agreement, to use a process that includes small businesses when considering and selecting any subcontractors or suppliers.

**B. No Discrimination in Employment.** In connection with the performance of work under the Agreement, the Consultant may not refuse to hire, discharge, promote, demote, or discriminate in matters of compensation against any person otherwise qualified, solely because of race, color, religion, national origin, ethnicity, citizenship, immigration status, gender, age, sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, marital status, source of income, military status, protective hairstyle, or disability. The Consultant shall insert the foregoing provision in all subcontracts.

**C. Advertising and Public Disclosures.** Consultant shall not include any reference to this Agreement or to work performed hereunder in any of its advertising or public relations materials without first obtaining the written approval of the SVP or their authorized representative. Any oral presentation or written materials related to DEN shall include only presentation materials, work product, and technical data which have been accepted by the City, and designs and

renderings, if any, which have been accepted by the City. Consultant shall notify the SVP in advance of the date and time of any such presentations. Nothing herein, however, shall preclude Consultant's transmittal of any information to officials of the City, including without limitation, the Mayor, the CEO, any member or members of Denver City Council, and the Auditor.

**D. Colorado Open Records Act.**

i. Consultant acknowledges that the City is subject to the provisions of the Colorado Open Records Act (“**CORA**”), C.R.S. §§ 24-72-201 *et seq.*, and Consultant agrees that it will fully cooperate with the City in the event of a request or lawsuit arising under such act for the disclosure of any materials or information which Consultant asserts is confidential or otherwise exempt from disclosure. Any other provision of this Agreement notwithstanding, all materials, records, and information provided by Consultant to the City shall be considered confidential by the City only to the extent provided in CORA, and Consultant agrees that any disclosure of information by the City consistent with the provisions of CORA shall result in no liability of the City.

ii. In the event of a request to the City for disclosure of such information, time and circumstances permitting, the City will make a good faith effort to advise Consultant of such request in order to give Consultant the opportunity to object to the disclosure of any material Consultant may consider confidential, proprietary, or otherwise exempt from disclosure. In the event Consultant objects to disclosure, the City, in its sole and absolute discretion, may file an application to the Denver District Court for a determination of whether disclosure is required or exempted. In the event a lawsuit to compel disclosure is filed, the City may tender all such material to the court for judicial determination of the issue of disclosure. In both situations, Consultant agrees it will either waive any claim of privilege or confidentiality or intervene in such legal process to protect materials Consultant does not wish disclosed. Consultant agrees to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the City, its officers, agents, and employees from any claim, damages, expense, loss, or costs arising out of Consultant’s objection to disclosure, including prompt reimbursement to the City of all reasonable attorney’s fees, costs, and damages the City may incur directly or may be ordered to pay by such court, including but not limited to time expended by the City Attorney Staff, whose costs shall be computed at the rate of two hundred dollars and no cents (\$200.00) per hour of City Attorney time.

**E. Examination of Records and Audits.**

i. Any authorized agent of the City, including the City Auditor or his or her representative, has the right to access, and the right to examine, copy and retain copies, at City’s election in paper or electronic form, any pertinent books, documents, papers and records related to Consultant’s performance pursuant to this Agreement, provision of any goods or services to the City, and any other transactions related to this Agreement. Consultant shall cooperate with City representatives and City representatives shall be granted access to the foregoing documents and information during reasonable business hours and until the latter of three (3) years after the final payment under the Agreement or expiration of the applicable statute of limitations. When conducting an audit of this Agreement, the City Auditor shall be subject to government auditing standards issued by



the United States Government Accountability Office by the Comptroller General of the United States, including with respect to disclosure of information acquired during the course of an audit. No examination of records and audits pursuant to this paragraph shall require Consultant to make disclosures in violation of state or federal privacy laws. Consultant shall at all times comply with D.R.M.C. §20-276.

ii. Additionally, Consultant agrees until the expiration of three (3) years after the final payment under the Agreement, any duly authorized representative of the City, including the CEO, shall have the right to examine any pertinent books, documents, papers and records of Consultant related to Consultant's performance of this Agreement, including communications or correspondence related to Consultant's performance, without regard to whether the work was paid for in whole or in part with federal funds or was otherwise related to a federal grant program.

iii. In the event the City receives federal funds to be used toward the services performed under this Agreement, the Federal Aviation Administration ("FAA"), the Comptroller General of the United States and any other duly authorized representatives shall have access to any books, documents, papers and records of Consultant which are directly pertinent to a specific grant program for the purpose of making audit, examination, excerpts and transcriptions. Consultant further agrees that such records will contain information concerning the hours and specific services performed along with the applicable federal project number.

**F. Use, Possession or Sale of Alcohol or Drugs.** Consultant shall cooperate and comply with the provisions of Denver Executive Order 94 and Attachment A thereto concerning the use, possession or sale of alcohol or drugs. Violation of these provisions or refusal to cooperate with implementation of the policy can result in the City barring Consultant from City facilities or participating in City operations.

**G. City Smoking Policy.** Consultant and its officers, agents and employees shall cooperate and comply with the provisions of Denver Executive Order No. 99 and the Colorado Indoor Clean Air Act, prohibiting smoking in all City buildings and facilities.

**H. Conflict of Interest.**

i. Consultant and its subsidiaries, affiliates, subcontractors, principals, or employees shall not engage in any transaction, work, activity or conduct which would result in a conflict of interest. A conflict of interest occurs when, for example, because of the relationship between two individuals, organizations or one organization (including its subsidiaries or related organizations) performing or proposing for multiple scopes of work for the City, there is or could be in the future a lack of impartiality, impaired objectivity, an unfair advantage over one or more firms competing for the work, or a financial or other interest in other scopes of work.

ii. Consultant represents that, in its Response or Proposal, as applicable, it disclosed any and all current or potential conflicts of interest of which it is aware, including transactions, work, activities, or conduct that might affect the judgment, actions, or work

of Consultant or which might give Consultant an unfair advantage in this or a future procurement. If the Parties identified a conflict of interest and agreed to a plan to mitigate such conflict, Consultant agrees it will comply with that mitigation plan.

iii. The City, in its sole discretion, shall determine the existence of a conflict of interest and may terminate this Agreement if such a conflict exists, after it has given Consultant written notice which describes such conflict. If, during the course of the Agreement, the City determines that a potential conflict of interest exists or may exist, Consultant shall have thirty (30) days after the notice is received in which to eliminate or cure the conflict of interest in a manner which is acceptable to the City.

iv. Consultant has a continuing duty to disclose, in writing, any actual or potential conflicts of interest including work Consultant is performing or anticipates performing for other entities on the same or interrelated project or tasks. Consultant must disclose, in writing, any corporate transactions involving other companies that Consultant knows or should know also are performing or anticipate performing work at DEN on the same or interrelated projects or tasks. In the event that Consultant fails to disclose in writing actual or potential conflicts, the CEO in their sole discretion, may terminate the Task Order, if applicable, or City may terminate the Agreement for cause or for its convenience.

**I. No Employment of A Worker Without Authorization to Perform Work Under The Agreement.**

i. This Agreement is subject to Division 5 of Article IV of Chapter 20 of the Denver Revised Municipal Code, and any amendments (the “Certification Ordinance”).

ii. The Consultant certifies that:

a. At the time of its execution of this Agreement, it does not knowingly employ or contract with a worker without authorization who will perform work under this Agreement, nor will it knowingly employ or contract with a worker without authorization to perform work under this Agreement in the future.

b. It will participate in the E-Verify Program, as defined in § 8-17.5-101(3.7), C.R.S., and confirm the employment eligibility of all employees who are newly hired for employment to perform work under this Agreement.

c. It will not enter into a contract with a subconsultant or subcontractor that fails to certify to the Consultant that it shall not knowingly employ or contract with a worker without authorization to perform work under this Agreement.

d. It is prohibited from using the E-Verify Program procedures to undertake pre-employment screening of job applicants while performing its obligations under this Agreement, and it is required to comply with any and all federal requirements related to use of the E-Verify Program including, by way of example, all program requirements related to employee notification and preservation of employee rights.

e. If it obtains actual knowledge that a subconsultant or subcontractor performing work under this Agreement knowingly employs or contracts with a worker without authorization, it will notify such subconsultant or subcontractor and the City within three (3) days. The Consultant shall also terminate such subconsultant or subcontractor if within three (3) days after such notice the subconsultant or subcontractor does not stop employing or contracting with the worker without authorization, unless during the three-day period the subconsultant or subcontractor provides information to establish that the subconsultant or subcontractor has not knowingly employed or contracted with a worker without authorization.

f. It will comply with a reasonable request made in the course of an investigation by the Colorado Department of Labor and Employment under authority of § 8-17.5-102(5), C.R.S., or the City Auditor, under authority of D.R.M.C. 20-90.3.

iii. The Consultant is liable for any violations as provided in the Certification Ordinance. If the Consultant violates any provision of this section or the Certification Ordinance, the City may terminate this Agreement for a breach of the Agreement. If this Agreement is so terminated, the Consultant shall be liable for actual and consequential damages to the City. Any termination of a contract due to a violation of this section or the Certification Ordinance may also, at the discretion of the City, constitute grounds for disqualifying the Consultant from submitting bids or proposals for future contracts with the City.

**12. SENSITIVE SECURITY INFORMATION:**

Consultant acknowledges that, in the course of performing its work under this Agreement, Consultant may be given access to Sensitive Security Information (“SSI”), as material is described in the Code of Federal Regulations, 49 C.F.R. Part 1520. Consultant specifically agrees to comply with all requirements of the applicable federal regulations, including but not limited to, 49 C.F.R. Parts 15 and 1520. Consultant understands any questions it may have regarding its obligations with respect to SSI must be referred to DEN’s Security Office.

**13. DEN SECURITY:**

A. Consultant, its officers, authorized officials, employees, agents, subcontractors, and those under its control, shall comply with safety, operational, or security measures required of Consultant or the City by the FAA or TSA. If Consultant, its officers, authorized officials, employees, agents, subcontractors or those under its control, fail or refuse to comply with said measures and such non-compliance results in a monetary penalty being assessed against the City, then, in addition to any other remedies available to the City, Consultant shall fully reimburse the City any fines or penalties levied against the City, and any attorney fees or related costs paid by the City as a result of any such violation. Consultant must pay this amount within fifteen (15) days from the date of the invoice or written notice. Any fines and fees assessed by the FAA or TSA against the City due to the actions of Consultant and/or its agents will be deducted directly from the invoice for that billing period.

**B.** Consultant is responsible for compliance with Airport Security regulations and 49 C.F.R. Parts 1542 (Airport Security) and 14 C.F.R. Parts 139 (Airport Certification and Operations). Any and all violations pertaining to Parts 1542 and 139 resulting in a fine will be passed on to and borne by Consultant. The fee/fine will be deducted from the invoice at time of billing.

#### **14. FEDERAL RIGHTS:**

This Agreement is subject and subordinate to the terms, reservations, restrictions and conditions of any existing or future agreements between the City and the United States, the execution of which has been or may be required as a condition precedent to the transfer of federal rights or property to the City for airport purposes and the expenditure of federal funds for the extension, expansion or development of the Airport System. As applicable, Consultant shall comply with the Standard Federal Assurances identified in Appendix.

#### **15. CONTRACT DOCUMENTS; ORDER OF PRECEDENCE**

**B. #### **16. CITY EXECUTION OF AGREEMENT**

**B. Electronic Signatures and Electronic Records.** The Agreement, and any other documents requiring a signature hereunder, may be signed electronically by the City and/or

Consultant in the manner specified by the City. The Parties agree not to deny the legal effect or enforceability of the Agreement solely because it is in electronic form or because an electronic record was used in its formation. The Parties agree not to object to the admissibility of the Agreement in the form of an electronic record, or a paper copy of an electronic document, or a paper copy of a document bearing an electronic signature, on the ground that it is an electronic record or electronic signature or that it is not in its original form or is not an original.

**APPENDIX 1**  
**STANDARD FEDERAL CONTRACT PROVISIONS AND ASSURANCES –**  
**PROFESSIONAL SERVICES**

**NOTE:** As used below, the term "Contractor" shall include "Consultant" as defined in the Agreement, and the term "sponsor" shall mean and include the City.

During the term of this Agreement, Consultant for itself, its assignees, and successors in interest, shall comply with the following federal provisions:

**A1 ACCESS TO RECORDS AND REPORTS**

The Contractor must maintain an acceptable cost accounting system. The Contractor agrees to provide the Owner, the Federal Aviation Administration and the Comptroller General of the United States or any of their duly authorized representatives access to any books, documents, papers and records of the Contractor which are directly pertinent to the specific contract for the purpose of making audit, examination, excerpts and transcriptions. The Contractor agrees to maintain all books, records and reports required under this contract for a period of not less than three years after final payment is made and all pending matters are closed.

**A2 AFFIRMATIVE ACTION REQUIREMENT**

4. As used in this notice and in the contract resulting from this solicitation, the "covered area" is City and County of Denver, Colorado.

### **A3 BREACH OF CONTRACT TERMS**

Any violation or breach of terms of this contract on the part of the Consultant or its subcontractors may result in the suspension or termination of this contract or such other action that may be necessary to enforce the rights of the parties of this agreement.

Owner will provide Consultant written notice that describes the nature of the breach and corrective actions the Consultant must undertake in order to avoid termination of the contract. Owner reserves the right to withhold payments to Contractor until such time the Contractor corrects the breach or the Owner elects to terminate the contract. The Owner's notice will identify a specific date by which the Consultant must correct the breach. Owner may proceed with termination of the contract if the Consultant fails to correct the breach by the deadline indicated in the Owner's notice.

The duties and obligations imposed by the Contract Documents and the rights and remedies available thereunder are in addition to, and not a limitation of, any duties, obligations, rights and remedies otherwise imposed or available by law.

### **A4 BUY AMERICAN PREFERENCE**

The Contractor agrees to comply with 49 USC § 50101, which provides that Federal funds may not be obligated unless all steel and manufactured goods used in AIP funded projects are produced in the United States, unless the Federal Aviation Administration has issued a waiver for the product; the product is listed as an Excepted Article, Material Or Supply in Federal Acquisition Regulation subpart 25.108; or is included in the FAA Nationwide Buy American Waivers Issued list.

A bidder or offeror must complete and submit the Buy America certification included herein with their bid or offer. The Owner will reject as nonresponsive any bid or offer that does not include a completed Certificate of Buy American Compliance.

**A5 CIVIL RIGHTS – GENERAL  
GENERAL CIVIL RIGHTS PROVISIONS**

immediately upon discovery. The Owner assumes responsibility for notifying the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the Federal Aviation Administration.  
Contractor must include this requirement in all subcontracts that exceeds \$150,000.

## **A8 CONTRACT WORKHOURS AND SAFETY STANDARDS ACT REQUIREMENTS**

### **1. Overtime Requirements.**

No contractor or subcontractor contracting for any part of the contract work which may require or involve the employment of laborers or mechanics shall require or permit any such laborer or mechanic, including watchmen and guards, in any workweek in which he or she is employed on such work to work in excess of forty hours in such workweek unless such laborer or mechanic receives compensation at a rate not less than one and one-half times the basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of forty hours in such workweek.

### **2. Violation; Liability for Unpaid Wages; Liquidated Damages.**

In the event of any violation of the clause set forth in paragraph (1) of this clause, the Contractor and any subcontractor responsible therefor shall be liable for the unpaid wages. In addition, such contractor and subcontractor shall be liable to the United States (in the case of work done under contract for the District of Columbia or a territory, to such District or to such territory), for liquidated damages. Such liquidated damages shall be computed with respect to each individual laborer or mechanic, including watchmen and guards, employed in violation of the clause set forth in paragraph (1) of this clause, in the sum of \$10 for each calendar day on which such individual was required or permitted to work in excess of the standard workweek of forty hours without payment of the overtime wages required by the clause set forth in paragraph (1) of this clause.

### **3. Withholding for Unpaid Wages and Liquidated Damages.**

The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) or the Owner shall upon its own action or upon written request of an authorized representative of the Department of Labor withhold or cause to be withheld, from any moneys payable on account of work performed by the contractor or subcontractor under any such contract or any other Federal contract with the same prime contractor, or any other federally assisted contract subject to the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act, which is held by the same prime contractor, such sums as may be determined to be necessary to satisfy any liabilities of such contractor or subcontractor for unpaid wages and liquidated damages as provided in the clause set forth in paragraph (2) of this clause.

### **4. Subcontractors.**

The Contractor or subcontractor shall insert in any subcontracts the clauses set forth in paragraphs (1) through (4) and also a clause requiring the subcontractor to include these clauses in any lower tier subcontracts. The prime contractor shall be responsible for compliance by any subcontractor or lower tier subcontractor with the clauses set forth in paragraphs (1) through (4) of this clause.

## **A9 COPELAND “ANTI-KICKBACK” ACT**

Contractor must comply with the requirements of the Copeland “Anti-Kickback” Act (18 USC 874 and 40 USC 3145), as supplemented by Department of Labor regulation 29 CFR part 3. Contractor and subcontractors are prohibited from inducing, by any means, any person employed on the project to give up any part of the compensation to which the employee is entitled. The Contractor and each Subcontractor must submit to the Owner, a weekly statement on the wages paid to each employee performing on covered work during the prior week. Owner must report any violations of the Act to the Federal Aviation Administration.

## **A10 DAVIS-BACON REQUIREMENTS**

### **1. Minimum Wages.**

(i) All laborers and mechanics employed or working upon the site of the work will be paid unconditionally and not less often than once a week, and without subsequent deduction or rebate on any account (except such payroll deductions as are permitted by the Secretary of Labor under the Copeland Act (29 CFR Part 3)), the full amount of wages and bona fide fringe benefits (or cash equivalent thereof) due at time of payment computed at rates not less than those contained in the wage determination of the Secretary of Labor which is attached hereto and made a part hereof, regardless of any contractual relationship which may be alleged to exist between the Contractor and such laborers and mechanics.

Contributions made or costs reasonably anticipated for bona fide fringe benefits under section 1(b)(2) of the Davis-Bacon Act on behalf of laborers or mechanics are considered wages paid to such laborers or mechanics, subject to the provisions of paragraph (1)(iv) of this section; also, regular contributions made or costs incurred for more than a weekly period (but not less often than quarterly) under plans, funds, or programs which cover the particular weekly period, are deemed to be constructively made or incurred during such weekly period. Such laborers and mechanics shall be paid the appropriate wage rate and fringe benefits on the wage determination for the classification of work actually performed, without regard to skill, except as provided in 29 CFR Part 5.5(a)(4). Laborers or mechanics performing work in more than one classification may be compensated at the rate specified for each classification for the time actually worked therein: *Provided* that the employer’s payroll records accurately set forth the time spent in each classification in which work is performed. The wage determination (including any additional classification and wage rates conformed under (1)(ii) of this section) and the Davis-Bacon poster (WH-1321) shall be posted at all times by the Contractor and its subcontractors at the site of the work in a prominent and accessible place where it can easily be seen by the workers.

(ii)(A) The contracting officer shall require that any class of laborers or mechanics, including helpers, which is not listed in the wage determination and which is to be employed under the contract shall be classified in conformance with the wage determination. The contracting officer shall approve an additional classification and wage rate and fringe benefits therefore only when the following criteria have been met:

(1) The work to be performed by the classification requested is not performed by a classification in the wage determination;

- (2) The classification is utilized in the area by the construction industry; and
- (3) The proposed wage rate, including any bona fide fringe benefits, bears a reasonable relationship to the wage rates contained in the wage determination.

(B) If the Contractor and the laborers and mechanics to be employed in the classification (if known), or their representatives, and the contracting officer agree on the classification and wage rate (including the amount designated for fringe benefits where appropriate), a report of the action taken shall be sent by the contracting officer to the Administrator of the Wage and Hour Division, Employment Standards Administration, U.S. Department of Labor, Washington, DC 20210. The Administrator, or an authorized representative, will approve, modify, or disapprove every additional classification action within 30 days of receipt and so advise the contracting officer or will notify the contracting officer within the 30-day period that additional time is necessary.

(C) In the event the Contractor, the laborers, or mechanics to be employed in the classification, or their representatives, and the contracting officer do not agree on the proposed classification and wage rate (including the amount designated for fringe benefits where appropriate), the contracting officer shall refer the questions, including the views of all interested parties and the recommendation of the contracting officer, to the Administrator for determination. The Administrator, or an authorized representative, will issue a determination within 30 days of receipt and so advise the contracting officer or will notify the contracting officer within the 30-day period that additional time is necessary.

(D) The wage rate (including fringe benefits where appropriate) determined pursuant to subparagraphs (1)(ii) (B) or (C) of this paragraph, shall be paid to all workers performing work in the classification under this contract from the first day on which work is performed in the classification.

(iii) Whenever the minimum wage rate prescribed in the contract for a class of laborers or mechanics includes a fringe benefit which is not expressed as an hourly rate, the contractor shall either pay the benefit as stated in the wage determination or shall pay another bona fide fringe benefit or an hourly cash equivalent thereof.

(iv) If the Contractor does not make payments to a trustee or other third person, the Contractor may consider as part of the wages of any laborer or mechanic the amount of any costs reasonably anticipated in providing bona fide fringe benefits under a plan or program: *Provided* that the Secretary of Labor has found, upon the written request of the Contractor, that the applicable standards of the Davis-Bacon Act have been met. The Secretary of Labor may require the Contractor to set aside in a separate account assets for the meeting of obligations under the plan or program.

## 2. Withholding.

The Federal Aviation Administration or the sponsor shall upon its own action or upon written request of an authorized representative of the Department of Labor withhold or cause to be withheld from the Contractor under this contract or any other Federal contract with the same prime contractor, or any other federally-assisted contract subject to Davis-Bacon prevailing wage requirements, which is held by the same prime contractor, so much of the accrued payments or advances as may be considered necessary to pay laborers and mechanics, including apprentices, trainees, and helpers, employed by the Contractor or any subcontractor the full amount of wages required by the contract. In the event of failure to pay any laborer or mechanic, including any

apprentice, trainee, or helper, employed or working on the site of work, all or part of the wages required by the contract, the Federal Aviation Administration may, after written notice to the Contractor, Sponsor, Applicant, or Owner, take such action as may be necessary to cause the suspension of any further payment, advance, or guarantee of funds until such violations have ceased.

### 3. Payrolls and Basic Records.

(i) Payrolls and basic records relating thereto shall be maintained by the Contractor during the course of the work and preserved for a period of three years thereafter for all laborers and mechanics working at the site of the work. Such records shall contain the name, address, and social security number of each such worker; his or her correct classification; hourly rates of wages paid (including rates of contributions or costs anticipated for bona fide fringe benefits or cash equivalents thereof of the types described in 1(b)(2)(B) of the Davis-Bacon Act); daily and weekly number of hours worked; deductions made; and actual wages paid. Whenever the Secretary of Labor has found under 29 CFR 5.5(a)(1)(iv) that the wages of any laborer or mechanic include the amount of any costs reasonably anticipated in providing benefits under a plan or program described in section 1(b)(2)(B) of the Davis-Bacon Act, the Contractor shall maintain records that show that the commitment to provide such benefits is enforceable, that the plan or program is financially responsible, and that the plan or program has been communicated in writing to the laborers or mechanics affected, and that show the costs anticipated or the actual costs incurred in providing such benefits. Contractors employing apprentices or trainees under approved programs shall maintain written evidence of the registration of apprenticeship programs and certification of trainee programs, the registration of the apprentices and trainees, and the ratios and wage rates prescribed in the applicable programs.

(ii)(A) The Contractor shall submit weekly for each week in which any contract work is performed a copy of all payrolls to the Federal Aviation Administration if the agency is a party to the contract, but if the agency is not such a party, the Contractor will submit the payrolls to the applicant, Sponsor, or Owner, as the case may be, for transmission to the Federal Aviation Administration. The payrolls submitted shall set out accurately and completely all of the information required to be maintained under 29 CFR 5.5(a)(3)(i), except that full social security numbers and home addresses shall not be included on weekly transmittals. Instead the payrolls shall only need to include an individually identifying number for each employee (*e.g.* the last four digits of the employee's social security number). The required weekly payroll information may be submitted in any form desired. Optional Form WH-347 is available for this purpose from the Wage and Hour Division Web site at [www.dol.gov/whd/forms/wh347instr.htm](http://www.dol.gov/whd/forms/wh347instr.htm) or its successor site. The prime contractor is responsible for the submission of copies of payrolls by all subcontractors. Contractors and subcontractors shall maintain the full social security number and current address of each covered worker and shall provide them upon request to the Federal Aviation Administration if the agency is a party to the contract, but if the agency is not such a party, the Contractor will submit them to the applicant, sponsor, or Owner, as the case may be, for transmission to the Federal Aviation Administration, the Contractor, or the Wage and Hour Division of the Department of Labor for purposes of an investigation or audit of compliance with prevailing wage requirements. It is not a violation of this section for a prime contractor to require a subcontractor to provide addresses and

social security numbers to the prime contractor for its own records, without weekly submission to the sponsoring government agency (or the applicant, Sponsor, or Owner).

(B) Each payroll submitted shall be accompanied by a "Statement of Compliance," signed by the Contractor or subcontractor or his or her agent who pays or supervises the payment of the persons employed under the contract and shall certify the following:

(1) The payroll for the payroll period contains the information required to be provided under 29 CFR § 5.5(a)(3)(ii), the appropriate information is being maintained under 29 CFR § 5.5 (a)(3)(i), and that such information is correct and complete;

(2) Each laborer and mechanic (including each helper, apprentice, and trainee) employed on the contract during the payroll period has been paid the full weekly wages earned, without rebate, either directly or indirectly, and that no deductions have been made either directly or indirectly from the full wages earned, other than permissible deductions as set forth in Regulations 29 CFR Part 3;

(3) Each laborer or mechanic has been paid not less than the applicable wage rates and fringe benefits or cash equivalents for the classification of work performed, as specified in the applicable wage determination incorporated into the contract.

(C) The weekly submission of a properly executed certification set forth on the reverse side of Optional Form WH-347 shall satisfy the requirement for submission of the "Statement of Compliance" required by paragraph (3)(ii)(B) of this section.

(D) The falsification of any of the above certifications may subject the Contractor or subcontractor to civil or criminal prosecution under Section 1001 of Title 18 and Section 231 of Title 31 of the United States Code.

(iii) The Contractor or subcontractor shall make the records required under paragraph (3)(i) of this section available for inspection, copying, or transcription by authorized representatives of the sponsor, the Federal Aviation Administration, or the Department of Labor and shall permit such representatives to interview employees during working hours on the job. If the Contractor or subcontractor fails to submit the required records or to make them available, the Federal agency may, after written notice to the Contractor, Sponsor, applicant, or Owner, take such action as may be necessary to cause the suspension of any further payment, advance, or guarantee of funds. Furthermore, failure to submit the required records upon request or to make such records available may be grounds for debarment action pursuant to 29 CFR 5.12.

#### 4. Apprentices and Trainees.

(i) Apprentices. Apprentices will be permitted to work at less than the predetermined rate for the work they performed when they are employed pursuant to and individually registered in a bona fide apprenticeship program registered with the U.S. Department of Labor, Employment and Training Administration, Bureau of Apprenticeship and Training, or with a State Apprenticeship Agency recognized by the Bureau, or if a person is employed in his or her first 90 days of probationary employment as an apprentice in such an apprenticeship program, who is not individually registered in the program, but who has been certified by the Bureau of Apprenticeship and Training or a State Apprenticeship Agency (where appropriate) to be eligible for probationary employment as an apprentice. The allowable ratio of apprentices to journeymen on the job site in any craft classification

shall not be greater than the ratio permitted to the contractor as to the entire work force under the registered program. Any worker listed on a payroll at an apprentice wage rate, who is not registered or otherwise employed as stated above, shall be paid not less than the applicable wage rate on the wage determination for the classification of work actually performed. In addition, any apprentice performing work on the job site in excess of the ratio permitted under the registered program shall be paid not less than the applicable wage rate on the wage determination for the work actually performed. Where a contractor is performing construction on a project in a locality other than that in which its program is registered, the ratios and wage rates (expressed in percentages of the journeyman's hourly rate) specified in the Contractor's or subcontractor's registered program shall be observed. Every apprentice must be paid at not less than the rate specified in the registered program for the apprentice's level of progress, expressed as a percentage of the journeymen hourly rate specified in the applicable wage determination. Apprentices shall be paid fringe benefits in accordance with the provisions of the apprenticeship program. If the apprenticeship program does not specify fringe benefits, apprentices must be paid the full amount of fringe benefits listed on the wage determination for the applicable classification. If the Administrator determines that a different practice prevails for the applicable apprentice classification, fringes shall be paid in accordance with that determination. In the event the Bureau of Apprenticeship and Training, or a State Apprenticeship Agency recognized by the Bureau, withdraws approval of an apprenticeship program, the Contractor will no longer be permitted to utilize apprentices at less than the applicable predetermined rate for the work performed until an acceptable program is approved.

(ii) Trainees. Except as provided in 29 CFR 5.16, trainees will not be permitted to work at less than the predetermined rate for the work performed unless they are employed pursuant to and individually registered in a program which has received prior approval, evidenced by formal certification by the U.S. Department of Labor, Employment and Training Administration. The ratio of trainees to journeymen on the job site shall not be greater than permitted under the plan approved by the Employment and Training Administration. Every trainee must be paid at not less than the rate specified in the approved program for the trainee's level of progress, expressed as a percentage of the journeyman hourly rate specified in the applicable wage determination. Trainees shall be paid fringe benefits in accordance with the provisions of the trainee program. If the trainee program does not mention fringe benefits, trainees shall be paid the full amount of fringe benefits listed on the wage determination unless the Administrator of the Wage and Hour Division determines that there is an apprenticeship program associated with the corresponding journeyman wage rate on the wage determination that provides for less than full fringe benefits for apprentices. Any employee listed on the payroll at a trainee rate that is not registered and participating in a training plan approved by the Employment and Training Administration shall be paid not less than the applicable wage rate on the wage determination for the classification of work actually performed. In addition, any trainee performing work on the job site in excess of the ratio permitted under the registered program shall be paid not less than the applicable wage rate on the wage determination for the work actually performed. In the event the Employment and Training Administration withdraws approval of a training program, the Contractor will no longer be permitted to utilize trainees at less than the applicable predetermined rate for the work performed until an acceptable program is approved.

(iii) Equal Employment Opportunity. The utilization of apprentices, trainees, and journeymen under this part shall be in conformity with the equal employment opportunity requirements of Executive Order 11246, as amended, and 29 CFR Part 30.

5. Compliance with Copeland Act Requirements.

The Contractor shall comply with the requirements of 29 CFR Part 3, which are incorporated by reference in this contract.

6. Subcontracts.

The Contractor or subcontractor shall insert in any subcontracts the clauses contained in 29 CFR Part 5.5(a)(1) through (10) and such other clauses as the Federal Aviation Administration may by appropriate instructions require, and also a clause requiring the subcontractors to include these clauses in any lower tier subcontracts. The prime contractor shall be responsible for the compliance by any subcontractor or lower tier subcontractor with all the contract clauses in 29 CFR Part 5.5.

7. Contract Termination: Debarment.

A breach of the contract clauses in paragraph 1 through 10 of this section may be grounds for termination of the contract, and for debarment as a contractor and a subcontractor as provided in 29 CFR 5.12.

8. Compliance with Davis-Bacon and Related Act Requirements.

All rulings and interpretations of the Davis-Bacon and Related Acts contained in 29 CFR Parts 1, 3, and 5 are herein incorporated by reference in this contract.

9. Disputes Concerning Labor Standards.

Disputes arising out of the labor standards provisions of this contract shall not be subject to the general disputes clause of this contract. Such disputes shall be resolved in accordance with the procedures of the Department of Labor set forth in 29 CFR Parts 5, 6, and 7. Disputes within the meaning of this clause include disputes between the Contractor (or any of its subcontractors) and the contracting agency, the U.S. Department of Labor, or the employees or their representatives.

10. Certification of Eligibility.

(i) By entering into this contract, the Contractor certifies that neither it (nor he or she) nor any person or firm who has an interest in the Contractor's firm is a person or firm ineligible to be awarded Government contracts by virtue of section 3(a) of the Davis-Bacon Act or 29 CFR 5.12(a)(1).

(ii) No part of this contract shall be subcontracted to any person or firm ineligible for award of a Government contract by virtue of section 3(a) of the Davis-Bacon Act or 29 CFR 5.12(a)(1).

(iii) The penalty for making false statements is prescribed in the U.S. Criminal Code, 18 USC 1001.

**A11 DEBARMENT AND SUSPENSION  
CERTIFICATION OF OFFERER/BIDDER REGARDING DEBARMENT**

By submitting a bid/proposal under this solicitation, the bidder or offeror certifies that neither it nor its principals are presently debarred or suspended by any Federal department or agency from participation in this transaction.

**CERTIFICATION OF LOWER TIER CONTRACTORS REGARDING DEBARMENT**

The successful bidder, by administering each lower tier subcontract that exceeds \$25,000 as a “covered transaction”, must verify each lower tier participant of a “covered transaction” under the project is not presently debarred or otherwise disqualified from participation in this federally assisted project. The successful bidder will accomplish this by:

Contractor and Subcontractor agree to comply with mandatory standards and policies relating to energy efficiency as contained in the state energy conservation plan issued in compliance with the Energy Policy and Conservation Act (42 USC 6201 *et seq.*).

### **A16 EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY (EEO)**

During the performance of this contract, the Contractor agrees as follows:

(1) The Contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin. The Contractor will take affirmative action to ensure that applicants are employed, and that employees are treated during employment, without regard to their race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identify, or national origin. Such action shall include, but not be limited to, the following: employment, upgrading, demotion, or transfer; recruitment or recruitment advertising; layoff, or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training, including apprenticeship. The Contractor agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices to be provided setting forth the provisions of this nondiscrimination clause.

(2) The Contractor will, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the Contractor, state that all qualified applicants will receive considerations for employment without regard to race, color, religion, sex, or national origin.

(3) The Contractor will send to each labor union or representative of workers with which it has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding, a notice to be provided advising the said labor union or workers’ representatives of the Contractor’s commitments under this section and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment.

(4) The Contractor will comply with all provisions of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and of the rules, regulations, and relevant orders of the Secretary of Labor.

(5) The Contractor will furnish all information and reports required by Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and by rules, regulations, and orders of the Secretary of Labor, or pursuant thereto, and will permit access to his books, records, and accounts by the administering agency and the Secretary of Labor for purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with such rules, regulations, and orders.

(6) In the event of the Contractor's noncompliance with the nondiscrimination clauses of this contract or with any of the said rules, regulations, or orders, this contract may be canceled, terminated, or suspended in whole or in part and the Contractor may be declared ineligible for further Government contracts or federally assisted construction contracts in accordance with procedures authorized in Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and such other sanctions may be imposed and remedies invoked as provided in Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, or by rule, regulation, or order of the Secretary of Labor, or as otherwise provided by law.

(7) The Contractor will include the portion of the sentence immediately preceding paragraph (1) and the provisions of paragraphs (1) through (7) in every subcontract or purchase order unless exempted by rules, regulations, or orders of the Secretary of Labor issued pursuant to section 204 of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, so that such provisions will be binding upon each subcontractor or vendor. The Contractor will take such action with respect to any subcontract or purchase order as the administering agency may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions, including sanctions for noncompliance: Provided, however, that in the event a contractor becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a subcontractor or vendor as a result of such direction by the administering agency the Contractor may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the United States.

  - a. "Covered area" means the geographical area described in the solicitation from which this contract resulted;
  - b. "Director" means Director, Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs (OFCCP), U.S. Department of Labor, or any person to whom the Director delegates authority;
  - c. "Employer identification number" means the Federal social security number used on the Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return, U.S. Treasury Department Form 941;
  - d. "Minority" includes:
    - (1) Black (all persons having origins in any of the Black African racial groups not of Hispanic origin);
    - (2) Hispanic (all persons of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Central or South American, or other Spanish culture or origin regardless of race);

- (3) Asian and Pacific Islander (all persons having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, the Indian Subcontinent, or the Pacific Islands); and
- (4) American Indian or Alaskan native (all persons having origins in any of the original peoples of North America and maintaining identifiable tribal affiliations through membership and participation or community identification).

2. Whenever the Contractor, or any subcontractor at any tier, subcontracts a portion of the work involving any construction trade, it shall physically include in each subcontract in excess of \$10,000 the provisions of these specifications and the Notice which contains the applicable goals for minority and female participation and which is set forth in the solicitations from which this contract resulted.

3. If the Contractor is participating (pursuant to 41 CFR part 60-4.5) in a Hometown Plan approved by the U.S. Department of Labor in the covered area either individually or through an association, its affirmative action obligations on all work in the Plan area (including goals and timetables) shall be in accordance with that Plan for those trades which have unions participating in the Plan. Contractors shall be able to demonstrate their participation in and compliance with the provisions of any such Hometown Plan. Each contractor or subcontractor participating in an approved plan is individually required to comply with its obligations under the EEO clause and to make a good faith effort to achieve each goal under the Plan in each trade in which it has employees. The overall good faith performance by other contractors or subcontractors toward a goal in an approved Plan does not excuse any covered contractor's or subcontractor's failure to take good faith efforts to achieve the Plan goals and timetables.

4. The Contractor shall implement the specific affirmative action standards provided in paragraphs 7a through 7p of these specifications. The goals set forth in the solicitation from which this contract resulted are expressed as percentages of the total hours of employment and training of minority and female utilization the Contractor should reasonably be able to achieve in each construction trade in which it has employees in the covered area. Covered construction contractors performing construction work in a geographical area where they do not have a Federal or federally assisted construction contract shall apply the minority and female goals established for the geographical area where the work is being performed. Goals are published periodically in the Federal Register in notice form, and such notices may be obtained from any Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs office or from Federal procurement contracting officers. The Contractor is expected to make substantially uniform progress in meeting its goals in each craft during the period specified.

5. Neither the provisions of any collective bargaining agreement nor the failure by a union with whom the Contractor has a collective bargaining agreement to refer either minorities or women shall excuse the Contractor's obligations under these specifications, Executive Order 11246, or the regulations promulgated pursuant thereto.

6. In order for the non-working training hours of apprentices and trainees to be counted in meeting the goals, such apprentices and trainees shall be employed by the Contractor during the training period and the Contractor shall have made a commitment to employ the apprentices and trainees at the completion of their training, subject to the availability of employment opportunities. Trainees shall be trained pursuant to training programs approved by the U.S. Department of Labor.

7. The Contractor shall take specific affirmative actions to ensure equal employment opportunity. The evaluation of the Contractor's compliance with these specifications shall be based upon its effort to achieve maximum results from its actions. The Contractor shall document these efforts fully and shall implement affirmative action steps at least as extensive as the following:

- a. Ensure and maintain a working environment free of harassment, intimidation, and coercion at all sites, and in all facilities at which the Contractor's employees are assigned to work. The Contractor, where possible, will assign two or more women to each construction project. The Contractor shall specifically ensure that all foremen, superintendents, and other onsite supervisory personnel are aware of and carry out the Contractor's obligation to maintain such a working environment, with specific attention to minority or female individuals working at such sites or in such facilities.
- b. Establish and maintain a current list of minority and female recruitment sources, provide written notification to minority and female recruitment sources and to community organizations when the Contractor or its unions have employment opportunities available, and maintain a record of the organizations' responses.
- c. Maintain a current file of the names, addresses, and telephone numbers of each minority and female off-the-street applicant and minority or female referral from a union, a recruitment source, or community organization and of what action was taken with respect to each such individual. If such individual was sent to the union hiring hall for referral and was not referred back to the Contractor by the union or, if referred, not employed by the Contractor, this shall be documented in the file with the reason therefore along with whatever additional actions the Contractor may have taken.
- d. Develop on-the-job training opportunities and/or participate in training programs for the area which expressly include minorities and women, including upgrading programs and apprenticeship and trainee programs relevant to the Contractor's employment needs, especially those programs funded or approved by the Department of Labor. The Contractor shall provide notice of these programs to the sources compiled under 7b above.
- f. Disseminate the Contractor's EEO policy by providing notice of the policy to unions and training programs and requesting their cooperation in assisting the Contractor in meeting its EEO obligations; by including it in any policy manual and collective bargaining agreement; by publicizing it in the company newspaper, annual report, etc.; by specific review of the policy with all management personnel and with all minority and female employees at least once a year; and by posting the company EEO policy on bulletin boards accessible to all employees at each location where construction work is performed.
- g. Review, at least annually, the company's EEO policy and affirmative action obligations under these specifications with all employees having any responsibility for hiring,

assignment, layoff, termination, or other employment decisions, including specific review of these items, with onsite supervisory personnel such as superintendents, general foremen, etc., prior to the initiation of construction work at any job site. A written record shall be made and maintained identifying the time and place of these meetings, persons attending, subject matter discussed, and disposition of the subject matter.

- h. Disseminate the Contractor's EEO policy externally by including it in any advertising in the news media, specifically including minority and female news media, and providing written notification to and discussing the Contractor's EEO policy with other contractors and subcontractors with whom the Contractor does or anticipates doing business.
  - i. Direct its recruitment efforts, both oral and written, to minority, female, and community organizations, to schools with minority and female students; and to minority and female recruitment and training organizations serving the Contractor's recruitment area and employment needs. Not later than one month prior to the date for the acceptance of applications for apprenticeship or other training by any recruitment source, the Contractor shall send written notification to organizations, such as the above, describing the openings, screening procedures, and tests to be used in the selection process.
  - j. Encourage present minority and female employees to recruit other minority persons and women and, where reasonable, provide after school, summer, and vacation employment to minority and female youth both on the site and in other areas of a contractor's workforce.
  - k. Validate all tests and other selection requirements where there is an obligation to do so under 41 CFR part 60-3.
  - l. Conduct, at least annually, an inventory and evaluation at least of all minority and female personnel, for promotional opportunities and encourage these employees to seek or to prepare for, through appropriate training, etc., such opportunities.
  - m. Ensure that seniority practices, job classifications, work assignments, and other personnel practices do not have a discriminatory effect by continually monitoring all personnel and employment related activities to ensure that the EEO policy and the Contractor's obligations under these specifications are being carried out.
  - n. Ensure that all facilities and company activities are non-segregated except that separate or single user toilet and necessary changing facilities shall be provided to assure privacy between the sexes.
  - o. Document and maintain a record of all solicitations of offers for subcontracts from minority and female construction contractors and suppliers, including circulation of solicitations to minority and female contractor associations and other business associations.
  - p. Conduct a review, at least annually, of all supervisor's adherence to and performance under the Contractor's EEO policies and affirmative action obligations.
8. Contractors are encouraged to participate in voluntary associations, which assist in fulfilling one or more of their affirmative action obligations (7a through 7p). The efforts of a

contractor association, joint contractor union, contractor community, or other similar groups of which the Contractor is a member and participant may be asserted as fulfilling any one or more of its obligations under 7a through 7p of these specifications provided that the Contractor actively participates in the group, makes every effort to assure that the group has a positive impact on the employment of minorities and women in the industry, ensures that the concrete benefits of the program are reflected in the Contractor's minority and female workforce participation, makes a good faith effort to meet its individual goals and timetables, and can provide access to documentation which demonstrates the effectiveness of actions taken on behalf of the Contractor. The obligation to comply, however, is the Contractor's and failure of such a group to fulfill an obligation shall not be a defense for the Contractor's noncompliance.

9. A single goal for minorities and a separate single goal for women have been established. The Contractor, however, is required to provide equal employment opportunity and to take affirmative action for all minority groups, both male and female, and all women, both minority and non-minority. Consequently, if the particular group is employed in a substantially disparate manner (for example, even though the Contractor has achieved its goals for women generally), the Contractor may be in violation of the Executive Order if a specific minority group of women is underutilized.

10. The Contractor shall not use the goals and timetables or affirmative action standards to discriminate against any person because of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin.

11. The Contractor shall not enter into any subcontract with any person or firm debarred from Government contracts pursuant to Executive Order 11246.

12. The Contractor shall carry out such sanctions and penalties for violation of these specifications and of the Equal Opportunity Clause, including suspension, termination, and cancellation of existing subcontracts as may be imposed or ordered pursuant to Executive Order 11246, as amended, and its implementing regulations, by the Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs. Any contractor who fails to carry out such sanctions and penalties shall be in violation of these specifications and Executive Order 11246, as amended.

13. The Contractor, in fulfilling its obligations under these specifications, shall implement specific affirmative action steps, at least as extensive as those standards prescribed in paragraph 7 of these specifications, so as to achieve maximum results from its efforts to ensure equal employment opportunity. If the Contractor fails to comply with the requirements of the Executive Order, the implementing regulations, or these specifications, the Director shall proceed in accordance with 41 CFR part 60-4.8.

14. The Contractor shall designate a responsible official to monitor all employment related activity to ensure that the company EEO policy is being carried out, to submit reports relating to the provisions hereof as may be required by the Government, and to keep records. Records shall at least include for each employee, the name, address, telephone number, construction trade, union affiliation if any, employee identification number when assigned, social security number, race, sex, status (e.g., mechanic, apprentice, trainee, helper, or laborer), dates of changes in status, hours worked per week in the indicated trade, rate of pay, and locations at which the work was performed. Records shall be maintained in an easily understandable and retrievable form; however, to the degree that existing records satisfy this requirement, contractors shall not be required to maintain separate records.

15. Nothing herein provided shall be construed as a limitation upon the application of other laws which establish different standards of compliance or upon the application of requirements for the hiring of local or other area residents (e.g. those under the Public Works Employment Act of 1977 and the Community Development Block Grant Program).

### **A17 FEDERAL FAIR LABOR STANDARDS ACT (FEDERAL MINIMUM WAGE)**

All contracts and subcontracts that result from this solicitation incorporate by reference the provisions of 29 CFR part 201, the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA), with the same force and effect as if given in full text. The FLSA sets minimum wage, overtime pay, recordkeeping, and child labor standards for full and part-time workers.

The Consultant has full responsibility to monitor compliance to the referenced statute or regulation. The Consultant must address any claims or disputes that arise from this requirement directly with the U.S. Department of Labor – Wage and Hour Division.

### **A18 LOBBYING AND INFLUENCING FEDERAL EMPLOYEES CERTIFICATION REGARDING LOBBYING**

The Bidder or Offeror certifies by signing and submitting this bid or proposal, to the best of his or her knowledge and belief, that:

(1) No Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid, by or on behalf of the Bidder or Offeror, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of an agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the awarding of any Federal contract, the making of any Federal grant, the making of any Federal loan, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement.

(2) If any funds other than Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with this Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement, the undersigned shall complete and submit Standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying," in accordance with its instructions.

(3) The undersigned shall require that the language of this certification be included in the award documents for all sub-awards at all tiers (including subcontracts, subgrants, and contracts under grants, loans, and cooperative agreements) and that all sub-recipients shall certify and disclose accordingly.

This certification is a material representation of fact upon which reliance was placed when this transaction was made or entered into. Submission of this certification is a prerequisite for making or entering into this transaction imposed by section 1352, title 31, U.S. Code. Any person who fails to file the required certification shall be subject to a civil penalty of not less than \$10,000 and not more than \$100,000 for each such failure.



## **A19 PROHIBITION OF SEGREGATED FACILITIES**

(a) The Contractor agrees that it does not and will not maintain or provide for its employees any segregated facilities at any of its establishments, and that it does not and will not permit its employees to perform their services at any location under its control where segregated facilities are maintained. The Contractor agrees that a breach of this clause is a violation of the Equal Employment Opportunity clause in this contract.

(b) “Segregated facilities,” as used in this clause, means any waiting rooms, work areas, rest rooms and wash rooms, restaurants and other eating areas, time clocks, locker rooms and other storage or dressing areas, parking lots, drinking fountains, recreation or entertainment areas, transportation, and housing facilities provided for employees that are segregated by explicit directive or are in fact segregated on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin because of written or oral policies or employee custom. The term does not include separate or single-user rest rooms or necessary dressing or sleeping areas provided to assure privacy between the sexes.

(c) The Contractor shall include this clause in every subcontract and purchase order that is subject to the Equal Employment Opportunity clause of this contract.

## **A20 OCCUPATIONAL SAFETY AND HEALTH ACT OF 1970**

All contracts and subcontracts that result from this solicitation incorporate by reference the requirements of 29 CFR Part 1910 with the same force and effect as if given in full text. The employer must provide a work environment that is free from recognized hazards that may cause death or serious physical harm to the employee. The employer retains full responsibility to monitor its compliance and their subcontractor’s compliance with the applicable requirements of the Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970 (20 CFR Part 1910). The employer must address any claims or disputes that pertain to a referenced requirement directly with the U.S. Department of Labor – Occupational Safety and Health Administration.

## **A21 PROCUREMENT OF RECOVERED MATERIALS**

Contractor and subcontractor agree to comply with Section 6002 of the Solid Waste Disposal Act, as amended by the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act, and the regulatory provisions of 40 CFR Part 247. In the performance of this contract and to the extent practicable, the Contractor and subcontractors are to use products containing the highest percentage of recovered materials for items designated by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) under 40 CFR Part 247 whenever:

- 1) The contract requires procurement of \$10,000 or more of a designated item during the fiscal year; or
- 2) The contractor has procured \$10,000 or more of a designated item using Federal funding during the previous fiscal year.

The list of EPA-designated items is available at [www.epa.gov/smm/comprehensive-procurement-guidelines-construction-products](http://www.epa.gov/smm/comprehensive-procurement-guidelines-construction-products).

Section 6002(c) establishes exceptions to the preference for recovery of EPA-designated products if the contractor can demonstrate the item is:

- a) Not reasonably available within a timeframe providing for compliance with the contract performance schedule;
- b) Fails to meet reasonable contract performance requirements; or
- c) Is only available at an unreasonable price.

## **A23 SEISMIC SAFETY**

In the performance of design services, the Consultant agrees to furnish a building design and associated construction specification that conform to a building code standard that provides a level of seismic safety substantially equivalent to standards as established by the National Earthquake Hazards Reduction Program (NEHRP). Local building codes that model their building code after the current version of the International Building Code (IBC) meet the NEHRP equivalency level for seismic safety. At the conclusion of the design services, the Consultant agrees to furnish the Owner a “certification of compliance” that attests conformance of the building design and the construction specifications with the seismic standards of NEHRP or an equivalent building code.

## **A24 TAX DELINQUENCY AND FELONY CONVICTIONS**

### **CERTIFICATION OF OFFERER/BIDDER REGARDING TAX DELINQUENCY AND FELONY CONVICTIONS**

The applicant must complete the following two certification statements. The applicant must indicate its current status as it relates to tax delinquency and felony conviction by inserting a checkmark (✓) in the space following the applicable response. The applicant agrees that, if awarded a contract resulting from this solicitation, it will incorporate this provision for certification in all lower tier subcontracts.

#### **Certifications**

The applicant represents that it is ( ✓ ) is not ( ✓ ) a corporation that has any unpaid Federal tax liability that has been assessed, for which all judicial and administrative remedies have been exhausted or have lapsed, and that is not being paid in a timely manner pursuant to an agreement with the authority responsible for collecting the tax liability.

### **Term Definitions**

**Felony conviction:** Felony conviction means a conviction within the preceding twenty four (24) months of a felony criminal violation under any Federal law and includes conviction of an offense defined in a section of the U.S. code that specifically classifies the offense as a felony and conviction of an offense that is classified as a felony under 18 U.S.C. § 3559.

**Tax Delinquency:** A tax delinquency is any unpaid Federal tax liability that has been assessed, for which all judicial and administrative remedies have been exhausted, or have lapsed, and that is not being paid in a timely manner pursuant to an agreement with the authority responsible for collecting the tax liability.

## **A26 TRADE RESTRICTION CERTIFICATION**

By submission of an offer, the Offeror certifies that with respect to this solicitation and any resultant contract, the Offeror –

- 1) is not owned or controlled by one or more citizens of a foreign country included in the list of countries that discriminate against U.S. firms as published by the Office of the United States Trade Representative (USTR);
- 2) has not knowingly entered into any contract or subcontract for this project with a person that is a citizen or national of a foreign country included on the list of countries that discriminate against U.S. firms as published by the USTR; and
- 3) has not entered into any subcontract for any product to be used on the Federal project that is produced in a foreign country included on the list of countries that discriminate against U.S. firms published by the USTR.

This certification concerns a matter within the jurisdiction of an agency of the United States of America and the making of a false, fictitious, or fraudulent certification may render the maker subject to prosecution under Title 18 USC Section 1001.

The Offeror/Contractor must provide immediate written notice to the Owner if the Offeror/Contractor learns that its certification or that of a subcontractor was erroneous when submitted or has become erroneous by reason of changed circumstances. The Contractor must require subcontractors provide immediate written notice to the Contractor if at any time it learns that its certification was erroneous by reason of changed circumstances.

Unless the restrictions of this clause are waived by the Secretary of Transportation in accordance with 49 CFR 30.17, no contract shall be awarded to an Offeror or subcontractor:

- 1) who is owned or controlled by one or more citizens or nationals of a foreign country included on the list of countries that discriminate against U.S. firms published by the USTR or
- 2) whose subcontractors are owned or controlled by one or more citizens or nationals of a foreign country on such USTR list or
- 3) who incorporates in the public works project any product of a foreign country on such USTR list.

Nothing contained in the foregoing shall be construed to require establishment of a system of records in order to render, in good faith, the certification required by this provision. The knowledge and information of a contractor is not required to exceed that which is normally possessed by a prudent person in the ordinary course of business dealings.

The Offeror agrees that, if awarded a contract resulting from this solicitation, it will incorporate this provision for certification without modification in all lower tier subcontracts. The Contractor may rely on the certification of a prospective subcontractor that it is not a firm from a foreign country included on the list of countries that discriminate against U.S. firms as published by USTR, unless the Offeror has knowledge that the certification is erroneous.

This certification is a material representation of fact upon which reliance was placed when making an award. If it is later determined that the Contractor or subcontractor knowingly rendered an erroneous certification, the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) may direct through the Owner cancellation of the contract or subcontract for default at no cost to the Owner or the FAA.

## **A27 VETERAN'S PREFERENCE**

In the employment of labor (excluding executive, administrative, and supervisory positions), the Contractor and all sub-tier contractors must give preference to covered veterans as defined within Title 49 United States Code Section 47112. Covered veterans include Vietnam-era veterans, Persian Gulf veterans, Afghanistan-Iraq war veterans, disabled veterans, and small business concerns (as defined by 15 USC 632) owned and controlled by disabled veterans. This preference only applies when there are covered veterans readily available and qualified to perform the work to which the employment relates.

**EXHIBIT A**  
**SCOPE OF WORK**

The Consultant shall perform Professional Planning, Design, Consulting, and Operation and Maintenance (O&M) Technical Support Services related to the DEN Baggage Handling System (BHS), Individual Carrier System (ICS). Services will be assigned by task, each task will include a scope of work, schedule, and a budget assigned for the specific task.

Generally, the services will be assigned as follows:

1. The Consultant shall act as the Subject Matter Expert to support and assist DEN on all activities relating to the DEN BHS and ICS.
2. The Consultant will provide strategic and operational analysis, capacity analysis, assist with capacity planning, project budget estimates, emerging technology assessments, planning and design services relating to the BHS, ICS, or related equipment.
3. The Consultant will write and maintain Technical Specifications and Scopes of Work under the direction of DEN. Specifications shall be reviewed and updated as required for presentation and approval by DEN.
4. The Consultant shall act as the technical adviser to DEN for the BHS and ICS, reviewing project Request-for-Information (RFI's) and other project technical submittals.
5. The Consultant will provide services including testing and commissioning of portions of the BHS and ICS, as well as other related assignments at the discretion of DEN.
6. The Consultant will attend Factory Acceptance Testing, Emulation or other related activities as required, at a location agreed with DEN to verify compliance with technical specifications.
7. The Consultant will update drawings and schematics as required/ requested.
8. The Consultant will provide technical support of the BHS and ICS control/ computer systems.
  - A. Support services shall be provided within a timely manner via remote and/or on-site as necessary to ensure sufficient operation of the DEN BHS/ ICS.
  - B. Ensure that all computer systems (patches) and anti-virus are up to date.
  - C. Provide troubleshooting assistance to the O&M Contractor(s).
  - D. Provide to DEN root-cause analysis of system failures or operational issues upon request.
  - E. Provide analysis and support of BHS ATR's when requested by DEN.
  - F. Maintain functionality of BHS videowall(s) and remote viewing station(s).
9. The Consultant will assist DEN with oversight of the existing O&M contractor/s who are or will be responsible for the O&M of the BHS and ICS. Perform reviews, analysis, and inspections in agreement with DEN to protect the assets from unnecessary degradation with a goal to reduce DEN's total cost-of-ownership and maximize system availability.
10. The Consultant may be authorized to instruct the O&M contractor(s) to procure parts and equipment for the BHS or ICS on behalf of DEN as authorized in writing by DEN.
11. The Consultant shall monitor and support DEN's on-site located BSM/ BPM gateway (BagLink) with the third party (ARINC) using AVINET and local Airline connectivity.
12. The Consultant shall provide software source/ application code software engineering and support for the existing DEN BHS Sort Controllers.

13. The Consultant may be required to attend/lead meetings, prepare documents/ reports, prepare, and give presentations, and be available to support and advise DEN on issues relating to the BHS and ICS.
14. The Consultant may also be authorized to provide services for other assignments which may include, but not limited to; baggage, passenger and vehicle traffic simulation modeling, identification and analysis of existing and emerging transit and baggage system technologies for future application and use at the Airport, airline schedule and equipment analysis, and benefit-cost and feasibility analyses for processing systems at the Airport.
15. The Consultant may also perform services, hereinafter referred to as "Additional Services" related to the subject matter of this Agreement, but which DEN determines to be not described in the Scope of Work or in excess of the requirements of the Scope of Work. The Consultant shall be compensated for such Additional Services, only if the services, fees, and reimbursable expenses have been authorized in writing in advance by DEN, in accordance with approved billing rates. In no event shall the approval of Additional Services and the cost of performing them, be deemed to constitute an agreement by DEN to an increase in the Maximum contract Liability set forth herein.
16. DEN will supply the Consultant with office space to accommodate their onsite staff.

### **Compensation and Payment**

1. DEN agrees to pay to the Consultant, and the Consultant agrees to accept as its sole compensation for its costs incurred and services rendered under this Agreement, compensation based on the Consultant's monthly invoices in accordance with this Contract.
2. Fee Based work
  - a. The Consultant shall be paid a fixed fee for certain identified Tasks as developed and negotiated between DEN and the Consultant. If the parties revise or amend these fee-based tasks or amend this agreement, the basis for negotiations for increase or decrease in the fee to be paid to the Consultant on account of work added to or deleted from its fee-based tasks, as the case may be, shall be the hourly rates set out in Exhibit B, and the Consultant's fee shall not exceed such hourly rates.
3. Hourly based work, billing rates:
  - a. The Consultant shall be paid a fee for its services rendered hereunder, at the hourly billing rate for the classification of the person performing such services and the Consultant's fee shall not exceed such hourly rates.

### **Expenses**

1. The Consultant shall be reimbursed for expenses incurred in connection with its work under this Agreement and properly invoiced with proper receipts/invoices, in accordance with the following schedule:
2. Reproduction, postage, and courier services (when necessary) at cost.
3. Badging and parking expenses shall be included in the hourly rates.
4. Travel expenses.
  - a. All reimbursable travel shall have prior approval from DEN.
  - b. Travel may be approved within the task order at assignment.
  - c. Vehicle rental costs will be allowed only if it can be demonstrated that such rental costs afforded the most economical travel method available, taking into consideration the element of time.

- d. No reimbursement shall be approved for airfare costs greater than the most economical rate available to the traveler at the time of his or her trip. Hourly billing rates for the traveler shall not be billed for any period of time for which the trip was extended for personal convenience.
  - e. Meals for travelers shall be limited to the yearly Denver metro area U.S. General Services Administration (GSA) per diem rate.
  - f. Sleeping accommodation expenses shall be limited to a reasonable amount, taking into account costs of alternate accommodations in the location and other relevant factors.
  - g. Personal expenses such as personal telephone expenses and entertainment shall not be included.
5. Subconsultants
  6. Other expenses related to the Consultants services which have prior approval from DEN.
  7. Any costs/expenses not listed or incurred in accordance with this section as a reimbursable expense, shall be presumed to be included in the Consultants hourly billing rated and therefore not separately reimbursable.

**B. Acceptable Certificate of Insurance Form and Submission Instructions**

Please read these requirements carefully to ensure proper documentation and receipt of your certificate(s) of insurance.

- ACORD FORM (or equivalent) certificate is required.
- SUBMIT via emailed in pdf format to: [contractadmininvoices@flydenver.com](mailto:contractadmininvoices@flydenver.com)
- ELECTRONIC CERTIFICATES are required, hard copy documents will not be accepted.
- THIRD PARTY SOFTWARE may be implemented during the term of this Agreement to manage insurance compliance and documents with required use by Vendor of such system.
- REFERENCE on the certificate must include the DEN assigned Contract Number.

**C. Coverages and Limits**

1. Commercial General Liability:

Vendor shall maintain insurance coverage including bodily injury, property damage, personal injury, advertising injury, independent contractors, and products and completed operations in minimum limits of \$5,000,000 each occurrence, \$5,000,000 products and completed operations aggregate; if policy contains a general aggregate, a minimum \$5,000,000 annual policy aggregate must be maintained.

- a. Such insurance shall also provide contractual liability covering liability assumed under this Agreement (including defense costs assumed under contract) within the scope of coverages provided.
- b. Such insurance shall include Mobile Equipment Liability, if such equipment will be used to perform services under this Agreement.

2. Business Automobile Liability:

Vendor shall maintain a minimum limit of \$1,000,000 combined single limit each occurrence for bodily injury and property damage for all owned, leased, hired and/or non-owned vehicles used in performing services under this Agreement.

- a. If operating vehicles unescorted airside at DEN, a \$10,000,000 combined single limit each occurrence for bodily injury and property damage is required.
- b. If Vendor does not have blanket coverage on all owned and operated vehicles and will require unescorted airside driving privileges, then a schedule of insured vehicles (including year, make, model and VIN number) must be submitted with the Certificate of Insurance.
- c. The policy must not contain an exclusion related to operations on airport premises
- d. If transporting waste, hazardous material, or regulated substances, Vendor shall carry a Broadened Pollution Endorsement and an MCS 90 endorsement on its policy.

- e. If Vendor is an individual or represents that Vendor does not own any motor vehicles and Vendor's owners, officers, directors, and employees use their personal vehicles for business purposes, Personal Automobile Liability insurance coverage will be accepted provided it includes a business use endorsement.
  - f. If Vendor will be completing all services to DEN under this Agreement remotely this requirement will be waived.
3. Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability Insurance:  
Vendor shall maintain workers compensation coverage in compliance with the statutory requirements of the state(s) of operation and Employer's Liability insurance with limits no less than \$100,000 per occurrence for each bodily injury claim, \$100,000 per occurrence for each bodily injury caused by disease claim, and \$500,000 aggregate for all bodily injuries caused by disease claims.
- a. If Vendor is a sole proprietor, Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability is exempt under the Colorado Workers' Compensation Act. It is the sole responsibility of the Vendor to determine their eligibility for providing this coverage and executing all required documentation with the State of Colorado.
4. Property Insurance – Business Personal Property:  
Vendor is solely responsible for any loss or damage to their business personal property or personal property of its employees, including, without limitation, furnishings, materials, tools, and equipment. If Vendor carries property insurance on its personal property located on DEN premises, a waiver of subrogation as outlined in Section E will be required from its insurer.
5. Excess/Umbrella Liability:  
Combination of primary and excess coverage may be used to achieve minimum required coverage limits. Excess policy(es) must follow form of the primary policies with which they are related to provide the minimum limits.

**D. Additional Insured**

For all coverages required under this Agreement (excluding Workers' Compensation, Employer's Liability and Professional Liability, if required), Vendor's insurer(s) shall include the City and County of Denver, its elected and appointed officials, successors, agents, employees and volunteers as Additional Insureds by policy endorsement.

**E. Waiver of Subrogation**

For all coverages required under this Agreement (excluding Professional Liability, if required), Vendor's insurer(s) shall waive subrogation rights against the City and County of Denver, its elected and appointed officials, successors, agents, employees and volunteers by policy endorsement.

**F. Notice of Material Change, Cancellation or Nonrenewal**

Each certificate and related policy shall contain a valid provision requiring notification to the Certificate Holder in the event any of the required policies be canceled or non-renewed or reduction in required coverage before the expiration date thereof.

1. Such notice shall reference the DEN assigned contract number related to this Agreement.
2. Said notice shall be sent thirty (30) days prior to such cancellation or non-renewal or reduction in required coverage unless due to non-payment of premiums for which notice shall be sent ten (10) days prior.
3. If such written notice is unavailable from the insurer or afforded as outlined above, Vendor shall provide written notice of cancellation, non-renewal and any reduction in required coverage to the Certificate Holder within three (3) business days of receiving such notice by its insurer(s) and include documentation of the formal notice received from its insurer(s) as verification.

**G. Additional Provisions**

1. Deductibles, Self-Insured Retentions, or any other type of retention are the sole responsibility of the Vendor.
2. Defense costs shall be in addition to the limits of liability. If this provision is unavailable that limitation must be evidenced on the Certificate of Insurance.
3. A severability of interests or separation of insureds provision (no insured vs. insured exclusion) is included under all policies where Additional Insured status is required.
4. Provision that coverage is primary and non-contributory with other coverage or self-insurance maintained by the City shall be provided on policies which the City requires Additional Insured status.
5. The insurance requirements under this Agreement shall be the greater of (i) the minimum limits and coverage specified hereunder or (ii) the broader coverage and maximum limits of coverage of any insurance policy or proceeds available to the Lessee. It is agreed that the insurance requirements set forth herein shall not in any way act to reduce coverage that is broader or that includes higher limits than the minimums set forth in this Agreement.
6. All policies shall be written on an occurrence form. If an occurrence form is unavailable or not industry norm for a given policy type, claims-made coverage will be accepted by the City provided the retroactive date is on or before the Agreement Effective Date or the first date when any goods or services were provided to the City, whichever is earlier, and continuous coverage will be maintained or an extended discovery period of three years beginning at the time work under this Agreement is completed or the Agreement is terminated, whichever is later.
7. Vendor shall advise DEN in the event any general aggregate or other aggregate limits are reduced below the required per occurrence limits. At their own expense, and where such general aggregate or other aggregate limits have been reduced below the required per occurrence limit, the Vendor will procure such per occurrence limits and furnish a new certificate of insurance showing such coverage is in force.
8. Certificates of Insurance must specify the issuing companies, policy numbers and policy periods for each required form of coverage. The certificates for each insurance policy are to be signed by a person authorized by the insurer to bind coverage on its behalf and must be submitted to the City at the time the Vendor signed this Agreement.
9. The insurance shall be underwritten by an insurer licensed or authorized to do business in the State of Colorado and rated by A.M. Best Company as A- VIII or better.
10. Certificate of Insurance and Related Endorsements: The City's acceptance or approval of a certificate of insurance or other proof of insurance that does not comply with all insurance requirements set forth in this Agreement shall not act as a waiver of Vendor's breach of this Agreement or of any of the City's rights or remedies under this Agreement. The City's acceptance or approval of any submitted insurance certificate is subject to the approval of DEN Risk Management or its designee. All coverage requirements specified in the certificate shall be enforced unless waived or otherwise modified in writing by DEN Risk Management. Vendor is solely responsible for ensuring they are in compliance with all insurance requirements and that all formal policy endorsements are issued by their insurers to support the requirements herein.
11. The City shall have the right to verify or confirm, at any time, all coverage, information or representations, and the insured and its insurance providers shall promptly and fully cooperate in any such audit the City may elect to undertake.

12. No material changes, modifications or interlineations to insurance coverage required by this Agreement shall be allowed without the review and written approval of DEN Risk Management.
13. Vendor shall be responsible for ensuring DEN is provided updated Certificate(s) of Insurance prior to each policy renewal.
14. Contractor's failure to maintain required insurance shall be the basis for immediate suspension and cause for termination of this Agreement, at the City's sole discretion and without penalty to the City.

## MWBE UTILIZATION STRATEGIES

Through the duration of our on-call technical services contract with DEN, it is anticipated that Logistical Planners will be tasked with various projects. While it is difficult to anticipate the work that will be asked of Logistical Planners with specificity, it is our commitment to ensure that 7% of our contract paid dollars will be delegated to MWBEs certified with the City & County of Denver.

Due to the nature of this niche area of expertise, Logistical Planners has made strong connections with several MWBE businesses in Denver with whom we utilize consistently on our awarded projects at DEN. These firms include:

- Gehring & Associates – MWBE
- Castillo Architects – MWBE

- Classique – MWBE

In addition to utilizing the firms with whom we have created these successful working relationships, it is our goal to continue to seek new and other firms in our community to add to our subcontractor partners. As each new task order is assigned to Logistical Planners, we will look within our current MWBE subcontractors as well as utilize the Division of Small Business Opportunity (DSBO) directory to seek new partners. In doing so, it is Logistical Planners' commitment to provide equitable opportunities to MWBE firms in Denver.

With each task order that allows for the use of subcontractors, we will utilize a flow-down approach to contractually ensure the protection of subcontractors including non-discrimination clauses.

Logistical Planners has been fortunate to have had a continual, longstanding relationship with these firms. The success of the work we do begins and ends with our team.

Logistical Planners conducts ongoing assessments and analyses of all EDI efforts to ensure that our EDI plans are accomplished. Every opportunity Logistical Planners is provided is an opportunity for us to look within our community and do our part to make sure our team is a direct reflection of Denver's diverse talent. We will continue with this approach as we have for the last twenty years.

## TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE & SUPPORT SERVICES

A part of ensuring the success of the relationships cultivated with our historically underutilized subconsultants is to do our part in not creating unnecessary hardship. An example being prompt payment to our subcontractors. Recognizing the responsibility we have as the prime consultant, Logistical Planners commits to ensuring our subcontractors are paid within 35 days of receipt of the subcontractor's approved invoice. If the invoice requires revision, Logistical Planners will notify the subcontractor within 10 days of invoice receipt. The financial health of our subcontractors is integral in the health of the entire project.

With the importance of staying current with technology, we have found it beneficial to help and mentor our subs by assisting in their learning of the Revit tool and providing positive QC reviews. Our Subcontractor Liaison is the assigned point of contact that our subcontractors utilize to be trained on various programs and processes such as Revit.

In addition to providing direct training to our subcontractors, we have also began hosting an annual Roundtable Discussion & Luncheon. This meeting is hosted by Logistical Planners' CEO, Dr. Matthias Frenz, and attended by Logistical Planners' Project Manager(s), EDI Consultant, and our subcontractors. Invitations are emailed to the necessary Logistical Planners staff, consultants, and subcontractors, whether M/WBE or other. This meeting is held to provide insight and gain feedback of experiences as it relates to equity, diversity, and inclusion within their firms and as a subcontractor partner. We utilize this venue to highlight efforts Logistical Planners is making to close the gap of underutilization, but most importantly, this has become an opportunity for our subcontractors to share their experiences with us so that we may find new ways to continue our allyship.



## PROCUREMENT PROCESS

As a small firm, Logistical Planners' team shares the responsibility of making every good faith effort in choosing the best subcontractors to fill each roll of a task initiative within our contracts. Logistical Planners also utilizes the B2Gnow vendor directory to identify potential certified subcontractors using commodity codes (NAICS codes) for the service needed. Logistical Planners requests and reviews the resumes, qualifications, and references of the proposed staff/firm to review qualifications as they pertain to the work required. When awarded a task order, our Project Manager emails each of our subcontractors the scope of work with a request for proposal. Our subcontractors then submit their proposed fee and scope of work. The Project Manager will then review the qualifications to select the best qualified firm. The Project Manager keeps the record of bidders for each project, including the notation of why the selected firm was deemed most qualified to perform the work. All records will be on file and accessible to DSBO.

Good faith effort requirements Logistical Planners has in place is to secure an MWBE firm first. If for any reason the certified firm selected is unable to fulfil the contract post-award, Logistical Planners commits to first seeking to replace the certified firm with another certified (MWBE) firm.

Additionally, Logistical Planners will not reduce the scope of work originally agreed upon with the MWBE firm unless the client reduces our overall scope of work. Logistical Planners will provide written communication regarding anything affecting the scope of a participating MWBE firm to DSBO. Logistical Planners will not take action on the reduction, substitution or termination of a MWBE subcontractor without having received written approval from DSBO to ensure Logistical Planners is operating within the DSBO ordinance.

Our subcontractors each sign contracts that are a flow down of our contractual obligations to the City and County of Denver to ensure compliance with City requirements. Logistical Planners' intention to provide structure in the way of a flow down is to ensure all subcontractors are also utilizing non-discriminatory practices and providing equal opportunities within their organizations.

## COMMUNICATION AND VENDOR MANAGEMENT

In addition to the communication that has been described above, Logistical Planners maintains a close level of communication with our subcontractors through project managers and our Subcontractor Liaison. Since we are a small firm subcontracting with small firms, we have found it works best to maintain close coordination through all our work, allowing for the quickest resolution to any challenges that may arise.

Although we have not experienced escalation of any challenges to date, if a potential conflict did arise, the clauses we have in place describe the steps to resolve any potential disputes. The first step is to aim to resolve any matters through Logistical Planners' Project Manager. If a dispute cannot be resolved, prior to proceeding with any arbitration, Logistical Planners will contact the DSBO office to ask for support in finding a resolution.

The awarded work to our MWBE subcontractors is monitored monthly within the B2Gnow system as described by the DSBO ordinance and monthly payments are reported in the B2Gnow system by our



Project Controller. This allows for our MWBE subcontractors to confirm or alert us of any discrepancies so that we can make the necessary adjustments.

If for any reason a MWBE subcontractor should be terminated or require substitution, Logistical Planners will inform the DSBO office. If after engaging DSBO Logistical Planners proceeds to engage with another MWBE firm, all approved payments will be made to the subcontractor, and the work will be transferred to another MWBE firm as described above. Logistical Planners will have ongoing communication with the appropriate City office. The Project Controller also manages inputting this information into B2Gnow to maintain compliance with DSBO. Logistical Planners will have open and ongoing communication with the DSBO office.

## LOGISTICAL PLANNERS' EDI CULTURE

Since 2008, we have been utilizing our current team of subconsultants, four in total, two woman-owned and one minority-owned. Having had positive results by developing our current team of subconsultants, in 2021, we reached out to the community to learn more about what we could do as an organization to improve our social and community involvement. The result of our investigation led us to Selena Dunham of Classique LLC with whom we have established a working relationship that has proven to be invaluable in expanding our existing approach and sharpening our focus.

Through our collaboration with Classique, we have now begun to formalize the activities that we are engaged in and have added new focus to expanding our approach. We are utilizing our EDI lens in all our business activities including procurements. We have adjusted our mission statement to reflect our goals and culture. We have also added EDI language to our employment recruiting and to our new employee policy package.

Logistical Planners has conducted employee training to strengthen awareness and to instill the importance of fostering an environment of belonging. Learning about the different biases that each of us have and how to make sure all are cognizant about the affects these biases have on our perspectives. Most importantly, we discussed examples of ways in which we can be allies to all.



Updates to this plan will be performed annually by Logistical Planners LLC and approved by DSBO, beginning in October of 2023 or at the request of DSBO.*
