Duties of the Auditor's Office

City Charter and DRMC

Denver City Charter, Article V, establishes independence of the Auditor's Office and general authority and duties while conducting audits of the city and county.

Enforcement of City Wage Ordinances

Includes enforcement of prevailing wage (§20.76), civil wage (§38-51.9), and minimum wage within the City and County of Denver. Denver minimum wage, and the Federal Davis-Bacon Act.

Federal Enforcement

Oversight of the Davis-Bacon Act on behalf of contractors and subcontractors on federally funded construction projects.



2026 Budget Allocation

Budget to remain flat compared to 2025 at \$16,196,607.

Mayor & Finance
Department has no
oversight to dictate
the Auditor's Office
budget or freeze
positions.

Commitment of savings for 2026 will be equal to the 3% request.



Denver Labor Litigator

Need for a Denver Labor Litigator grows.

Elevated risk of the ability to collect for workers.

Resolution - Auditor's Office will split the cost of a City Attorney for this role. The AO will contribute up to \$110,000 with an increase to the annual budget.
