Assessing ordinance to approve the 2021 annual costs for the following Local Maintenance District included in the Board of Equalization scheduled for October 20, 2020:

Consolidated Larimer Street Pedestrian Mall	\$45,000*	13% Increase	9

\*This district’s assessment for 2021 will be \$40,000 since there are sufficient reserves held by the district to cover a portion of the proposed 2021 budget. The increase in the budget is to improve the overall tree canopy on the district by (i) removing existing dead trees and stumps, (ii) working with the City to plant new trees, (iii) installing tree guards to protect new trees in vulnerable areas, and (iv) establishing a consistent watering plan for all trees on the district.
