As council members you know in recent years these Five Points leaders have addressed many issues, including:



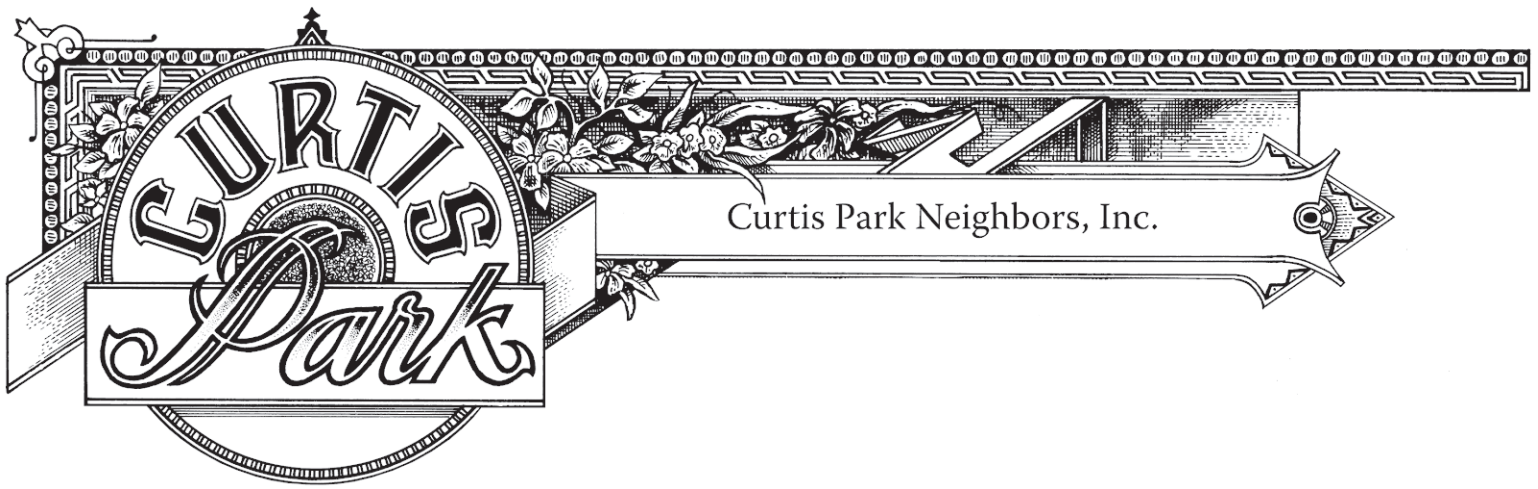
