"Protect, enhance, and perpetuate the use of structures and districts"







Latino / Chicano Historic Context

- Partnership with Councilmembers Amanda Sandoval and Jamie Torres, I Am Denver, OSEI, Mead & Hunt,
 Dr. Nicki Gonzales, community advisors and connectors
- Broad overview on the citywide settlement and development patterns of Latino and Chicano communities in Denver up to the 1990s
- Extensive community engagement interviews, Storyvine, community meeting, online survey
- Funded by CPD, Councilmembers Sandoval and Torres, History Colorado's State Historical Fund, and the Peter Grant Preservation Services Fund for Colorado of the National Trust for Historic Preservation









Customized Design Guidelines for La Alma Lincoln Park Historic Cultural District

- Landmark Preservation Commission adopted customized design guidelines that reflect the history and culture of the La Alma Lincoln Park neighborhood
- Based on input by community stakeholder group





Citywide Landmark Design Guidelines Update Project

- To be addressed in 4 phases
- Phases and updates based on community input community meetings, surveys
- Each phase to be adopted by Landmark Preservation Commission



Adaptive Reuse

- Preservation is about reusing existing buildings, whether they're designated or not
- Adaptive Reuse Administrator will assist small businesses with permitting based on the 2020 Adaptive Reuse Strategy Report. He/she will:
 - Develop the adaptive reuse program starting along the East Colfax corridor
 - Work toward simplifying the reuse of existing buildings











Landmark Design Review – 2016 to 2021 (through Nov.)

53 tax credit applications certified by Landmark Preservation Commission

\$761,041.19 in tax credits issued for rehabilitation of historic residential properties
