# City Council 2022 Budget Priorities

1. Focus on evolving our Community Engagement and Customer Service to support residents navigating city services, resources and accessibility including translation inclusion
2. Increase affordable housing options and support for those experiencing homelessness throughout our city. Mitigate and reduce involuntary displacement of community members and businesses.

# Denver City Council Racial Equity Lens

1. Are all historically disadvantaged groups who are affected by the decision we are making currently represented in this process including those who have been historically oppressed because of their race, gender, sexual orientation, class, disability, immigration status and age? 2. How will the proposed decision affect each group?
3. How will the proposed decision be perceived by each group?
4. Does the decision advance racial equity or mitigate unintended consequences?

- Ortega (2) – DSD Staffing/Retention Survey; Funding Violence Prevention Programs
- Black (3) – Mental Health and Addiction Services; Litter Clean-up; Fund DPR's Alternative Outdoor Rec Plan



## **Budget Priority #4: Prioritize and support the recovery, resilience and encourage innovation of our workforce, local businesses, and community organizations.**

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### **Potential Additions: (12 Minutes – 8 New Policies)**

- Flynn (1) – Pop Up Business Funds
- Hinds (1) – Hero Pay for Non-City Essential Workers
- Kniech (1) – Premium Pay for Service Contractor Employees
- Ortega (1) – Collaboration between Organizations receiving funding from DEDO/Workforce Development, HOST, etc for Employment or Housing Navigators
- Torres (4) – Investment in small Commerical Corridors/BIDs/Creative Districts; Nonprofit Shared Space Initiative; Food Insecurity Strategies; Non-profit Young Adult Employment funding



## **Budget Priority #5: Protect our natural environment through policy and invest in communities to combat climate change**

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### **Potential Additions: (6 Minutes – 4 New Policies)**

- Torres (1) – Funding for E-bike Rebates
- Black (1) – Funding for Median Maintenance
- Kashmann (1) – Incentives to remove bluegrass in favor of xeriscape
- Ortega (1) – Hydrogen Fueling Stations

## **Budget Priority #6: Increase complete multimodal transportation connections throughout the city.**

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### **Potential Additions: (4.5 Minutes – 3 New Policies)**

- Black (1) – Bus Shelter Maintenance
- Kashmann (1) – EV Shuttle Expansion
- Ortega (1) – Railroad Safety Study
