The members of the commission should reflect the 5 diversity of Denver, including the ethnic, racial, and geographic constitution of the 6 population as well as the diverse professional backgrounds, experience, and expertise of 7 the citizens people of Denver. The commission shall consist of up to thirty-three (33) 8 members as follows: 9 The following fifteen (15) officers or the officer's designated representative: (a) 10 (1) The mayor. 11 The manager of human services. (2) 12 (3) The manager of safety. 13 The chief of police. (4) 14 (5) The sheriff. 15 (6) The presiding judge of the county court. 16 (7) The city attorney. 17 The chief municipal public defender. (8) 18 (9) The Denver director of community corrections. 19 (10)The manager of public health and environment. 20 (11)The director of the division of adult parole. 21 (12)The chief probation officer, Denver adult district court probation department. 22 (13)The chief probation officer, Denver county court probation. 23 (14) The office head, Denver's state public defender's office. 24 The Denver district attorney. (15)25 (b) The following fifteen (15) members to be appointed by the mayor and confirmed by 26 the city council: 27 An attorney in private practice from the defense bar. (1) 28 (2) A provider of services for individuals offenders with demonstrated expertise in 29 evidence-based criminal justice policy and practices. 30 A representative of Denver public schools' leadership team. (3) 31 (4) Two (2) representatives of the juvenile justice system. 32 (5) An academic knowledgeable in evidence-based criminal justice policy and 33 practices.

1	(6) A representative of the behavioral health service system.
2	(7) A representative of homeless service providers.
3	(8) Up to three (3) victim advocates or victim representatives or representatives
4	from community coalitions/organizations that are focused on justice and/or
5	crime prevention from geographically diverse areas of Denver most impacted
6	by crime.
7	(9) A member of the Denver state legislative delegation.
8	(109) Up to three (3) representatives of the Denver community.
9	(1110)A previous justice-involved community representative.
10	(c) Up to three (3) members of the city council, to be appointed by the president of the
11	city council.
12	Sec. 2-255.50. Term of commissioners.
13	(a) The appointed members of the commission shall serve for a period of <u>four (4) years.</u>
14	three (3) years to be staggered by appointing one third of the initial non-designated
15	membership for three-year terms, another third for two (2) years, and the remaining
16	third for one (1) year. Initial terms shall be set by the appointing authority.
17	(b) Commissioners may be reappointed for successive terms up to a maximum of three
18	<u>(3) terms</u> .
19	Sec. 2-255.51. Vacancies.
20	Any vacancy which occurs on the commission shall be filled in accordance with the
21	provisions of section 2-255.49 and the new member so appointed to the commission shall
22	serve the un-expired term.
23	Sec. 2-255.52. Compensation.
24	The members shall serve without compensation; provided, however, that members
25	of the commission may be reimbursed for reasonable expenses incurred in performance of
26	their duties pursuant to the rules and regulations of the city for such reimbursement.
27	Sec. 2-255.53. – <u>Officers.</u>
28	The commission shall establish officers in accordance with its bylaws.
29	Sec. 2-255.53 <u>4</u> Meetings.
30	(a) The schedule of regular meetings of the commission shall be established by a
31	majority of the membership, but the commission must meet at least six (6) times
32	annually.
33	(b) Additional meetings shall be called as needed by the chair of the commission.

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## Sec. 2-255.545. Powers and duties.

2 The purpose of the commission shall be to formulate foster innovation and 3 alternatives in the criminal justice system, to provide initial funding opportunities for projects 4 that advance these ideals, and make recommendations to other agencies as provided in 5 this section. Any such recommendation may be made either to criminal justice departments 6 and agencies of the city itself, or to independent community-based criminal justice agencies 7 organizations operating in the second judicial district pursuant to the authority of the state 8 constitution or state laws; provided however, nothing in this division 11-shall be construed 9 to affect in any way the authority of any state officer or agency to exercise the powers and 10 duties vested in such officer or agency by state law. The powers and duties of the 11 commission shall be as follows:

- 12 (a) To c-Conduct <u>strategic planning and analysis</u> and strategic planning-related to
  13 management of Denver's criminal justice system, to promote accountability by
  14 criminal justice departments and agencies, and to develop performance measures
  15 and standards by which to evaluate the performance of the commission itself;
  - (b) To f-Facilitate development of a coordinated criminal justice system sanctioning philosophy and policies, and monitor implementation of the philosophy and policies by the departments and agencies responsible for administering the criminal justice system in the City and County of Denver;
- (c) To the extent permitted by state law, to-collect and analyze data on the incidence
  and nature of crime in Denver and assess the impact of criminal activities and
  juvenile delinquency upon the residents of Denver, including the extent to which
  social determinants of health, including, but not limited to, housing, employment,
  education, health care, behavioral health care, economic stability, and neighborhood
  safety addressing behavioral health needs-may affect those who become involved in
  the justice system before, during and after systems' involvement;
- 27 (d) To establish a process by which to recommend funding support for programs which
  28 includes monitoring the expenditures and available budget for the commission, and
  29 advising the mayor, city council and other departments or agencies on the
  30 continuation or termination of programs;
- 31 (e-d) Make recommendations to the mayor, the city council and other departments and
  32 agencies through the expending authority regarding the distribution, expenditure,
  33 and management of any and all monies appropriated from the Denver crime

prevention and control fund, to support criminal justice planning activities and use of evidence-based programs and services to improve public safety;

(f-e) To u-Undertake, on a continuing basis, an evaluation of the capacity and operations
 of the criminal justice system by completing regular system mapping, analyzing
 offender flow of individuals and "bed" usage, establishing projections to manage
 future space needs and recommending policy to utilize scarce jail beds for people
 whose behaviors cannot be managed through community- and system-based
 alternatives the most serious offenders and facilitating the development of a range of
 evidence-based sanctions and programs that will reduce recidivism;

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- (f) Stimulate community interest and involvement in appropriately addressing criminal justice and public safety problems;
- 12 (g) To r-Report annually by July 15-October to the mayor and city council 13 recommending changes in policies and programs to reduce victimization, to promote 14 data-guided management, to help guide budgeting and administration, to diminish 15 criminal recidivism and to improve overall public safety; The annual report shall 16 include a detailed plan of recommended expenditures from the Denver crime 17 prevention and control fund for the following fiscal year. The report shall also include 18 information about the jail population by characteristics, length of stay, and offense, 19 trends in the jail population, comparative jail population and crime data, and other 20 appropriate measurements of how the criminal justice system is functioning;
  - (h) To s Seek federal grants and private sources of funding for innovative criminal justice projects and programs;
  - (i) To p-Promote cooperation, collaboration and shared responsibility among justice system departments and agencies including but not limited to: programming, grant writing, appropriations and budgeting, and use of offender risk assessment systems to guide the imposition or modification of sanctions;
  - (j) To seek public input regarding commission activities and citywide needs, all commission meetings are open to the public; <u>and</u>
- (k) To consider the impact on residential neighborhoods related to the release of
  offenders into the community when formulating or recommending any alternatives to
  incarceration, including but not limited to the expansion and concentration of
  community corrections facilities;

1	(I) To foster innovation and alternatives in the criminal justice system and to provide
2	initial funding opportunities for projects that advance these ideals; and
3	(mk) To p-Perform ongoing system data collection, to the extent permitted by state law,
4	including, but not limited to: as described in commission bylaws.
5	(1) Researching the jail population, how it has changed, and the measures
6	needed for each individual to reduce repeat offense;
7	(2) Mapping the criminal justice system to identify decision points and timelines
8	for processing compared to appropriate performance standards; and
9	(3) Conducting an inventory of existing programs, whether programs address
10	factors that research shows reduce offender recidivism, and the extent to
11	which they follow evidenced-based practices.
12	(n) As appropriate, the commission will work with judicial officers in an advisory capacity.
13	Sec. 2-255.5 <del>5</del> <u>6</u> . – Procedures
14	The commission will establish and adopt bylaws and internal guidelines governing its
15	operations, including duties and responsibilities of the commission's leadership officers,
16	and will promulgate rules and regulations as necessary to achieve the purposes of this
17	division.
18	Sec. 2-255.5 <del>6</del> 7. – Crime prevention and control fund created.
19	There is hereby created a crime prevention and control fund, hereinafter "fund," for
20	the purpose of implementing recommendations from the commission, receiving revenue
21	and making transactions per said recommendations.
22	Sec. 2-255.57 <u>8</u> . – Staffing and administrative support.
23	Staffing and other administrative support for the commission shall be provided by the
24	department of <u>safety, of public health and environment and hiring decisions shall be made</u>
25	with input from the commission's officers.
26	Sec. 2-255.58 <u>9</u> . – Relation to city departments, agencies, and expending authorities.
27	(a) Departments and agencies of the city responsible for administering the criminal
28	justice system and related services shall cooperate with the commission to support
29	the purpose of this division.
30	(b) No expending authority shall make any expenditure from the fund unless and until
31	the commission is consulted on the expenditure and afforded an opportunity to
32	review the proposed expenditure and make a recommendation to the expending
22	authority prior to the disbursement of any monies in the fund. However, the

1	expending authority of the commission is authorized to approve payments of up to
2	ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) for expenditures that are consistent with the
3	commission's annual plan for expenditures from the fund, as required by section 2-
4	255.54, without prior consultation with the commission. Such expenditures shall be
5	reported to the commission at the following meeting.
