I am a second generation Colorado native who owns the house directly across the street from 1741 Gaylord Street at 1760 Gaylord Street. I STRONGLY support saving this historical home. Mine was built 14 years before (1888) and these old homes are too few and far between. My husband is British with his parents living in a 400 year old home. The British understand the importance of preserving history.

I have lived with and through the developers who took down the Denver Skin Clinic to put up 1790 Gaylord. Barbara Reed, from the Denver Skin Clinic was my mother's really good friend. While both have since passed, I tried to buy her building, too and unfortunately could not make the deal work. I have also lived through the YORK and still deal daily with movers who won't park in front of the building as they are supposed to and instead park in the alley for hours at a time blocking my access to my building.

Since the lot next door to me was so small for a large development, their property is inches not feet but INCHES from my property, I had to fight the developers as they said my port cochere overhangs their property.

YES, in the end I won. It was not cheap nor easy but certainly worth the fight.

I am trying to understand why someone would want to tear this building down.

**Is it not big enough?** It's 7,000 square feet - one of the largest mansions in the neighborhood. Still need more space? Denver has 8,400 parcels of vacant land – almost 18,000 acres. Maybe try one of those lots first. This one is occupied.

**Is the house not "green" enough?** Nearly half of all greenhouse gases come from constructing, demolishing and operating our buildings. We fret about recycling a pop can but will brazenly throw away an entire house. We must accept that "the greenest building is one that already exists." (C. Elefante)

**Does the house not mean anything?** Maybe take a moment to try to understand that this house has been around for over 120 years. When it was built, Teddy Roosevelt was the president of a country with only 45 states. He had just gone for his first ride in an automobile. Things like aspirin, crayons and the radio were brand new. The Wright brother's hadn't even taken flight yet. Whether we realize it or not, we gravitate to old buildings because we need a link between the past and present –

Old buildings give us a sense of identity. They help us to remember. "Memory is impossible without physical places on which to ground it, for they bear witness to past events." (M. Page) By tearing down 1741 Gaylord we are destroying one more piece of our city's memory.

**Maybe a new house would be better?** As a Denver resident, a Colorado native and an architect, I can assure you that whatever gets built on this plot of land will not compare to what is there now. Modern-day architects repeatedly fail to produce brilliant design on demand. And if they could systematically create work that is better than that of the past, preservationists would have nothing to focus on, as that discipline "thrives on the fears of our own ineptitude." (A. de Botton) Why put the Mona Lisa behind glass if we could reproduce another masterpiece exactly like it? We demolish buildings in hopes of replacing with something better. I assure you that will not be the case for 1741 Gaylord. Whatever gets built will just be adding to Denver's infestation of inferior buildings. The grass is not greener on the other side of the wrecking ball.
