# What is the Denver Opportunity Index?

The Denver Opportunity Index is a data-driven initiative focused on identifying opportunities for strategic collaboration that will help improve residents' quality of life, thereby enhancing the safety of all citizens and guests of Denver.

- "Can I put food on the table?
- "Can I save for the future?"

#### **Behavioral Health**

- "Do I have health insurance?"
- "Do I have access to mental health services?"
- "Do I or a member of my family suffer from an addiction."
- "Does violent crime impact my life?"

- "Am I employable?"
- "Can I get the education I need?"
- "Do I have a support system?"





- 17% below federal poverty line (5 year avg)
- Property crimes 24/1,000 residents
- 36.5% can't afford housing

## **Behavioral Health**

- Violent crimes 7/1,000 residents
- 201 Drug Related Deaths (2017)
- 135 Suicide Deaths (2017)
- 64,591 did not receive needed mental health care
- 9.0% don't have health insurance

- ~50% of the average daily jail population have a mental health consideration
- 13.6% without H.S. diploma
- 48.9% without college degree



## Approach

Evaluated 142 census tracts in Denver

Analyzed variables to rank the tracts within each pillar



## Example of how we broke down 142 Census Tracts

Each census tract was evaluated on several criteria that culminated in a ranking (# of 142) for each of the criteria with #1 representing an area with the most opportunity and #142 representing the least opportunity.









#### Phase 1 - Fall 2018

- Host "Listen and Learn" community meetings on the Three Pillars
- Meet with community organizations to share data on specific census tracts
- Complete action items by the end of the year

#### Phase 2 - 2019

- Use input from Phase
  1 community
  meetings to bolster the
  pillar data sets and
  make the data available
  to government, non profit and faith based
  organizations
- Implement Precision
  Policing Model

#### Phase 3 - 2020

- Begin the process of establishing goals, objectives and budget priorities, following a mid-year review in 2019
- Prepare for the new data sets from the 2020 census



# DOS Action Items – Phase 1

## **Financial Security**

- Develop a volunteer model for Department of Public Safety staff
- Improve ID/intake process at jails
- Review cite and release protocols
- Provide first responders with a resource guide for citizens who need support services

## **Behavioral Health**

- Expand behavioral health training for DOS staff
- Expand alternative respond models (DFD Med Unit and DPD Co-Responder Program)
- Train first responders to offer community resources to high utilizers

- Expand cultural sensitivity training for DOS staff
- Host behind the scenes tours of safety agencies
- Evaluate impact of inmate programming at jails
