CB18-xxxx 3 SERIES OF 2018 COMMITTEE OF REFERENCE: 4 Safety, Housing, Education & Homelessness 5 A BILL 6 For an ordinance amending Division 11, Article VIII of Chapter 2 of the Revised Municipal Code of the City and County of Denver to update procedures and 7 transfer governance of the Crime Prevention and Control Commission from the 8 Department of Human Services to the Department of Public Health and 9 **Environment.** 10 11 BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY AND COUNTY OF DENVER: 12 That Division 11, Article VIII of Chapter 2 of the Denver Revised Municipal Code 13 shall be amended by deleting the language stricken and adding the language underlined, to read as 14 follows: 15 Sec. 2-255.48. - Legislative intent. 16 The city council hereby declares that neighborhood safety, crime prevention, and control 17 are major goals for the City and County of Denver. The legislative intent of this division is to 18 implement an evidence-based, accountable, and efficient public safety strategy to reduce crime, 19 and including juvenile delinquency and to increase neighborhood safety. To that end, the council 20 establishes a crime prevention and control commission Crime Prevention and Control 21 <u>Commission</u> which shall have the following purposes: 22 (1) To reduce crime, partly by reducing criminal recidivism; 23 (2) To facilitate coordination among justice system agencies; 24 (3)To support the development of a data-driven criminal justice system that offers a 25 range of evidence-based sanctions and programs: 26 (4) To facilitate the development of information technology and data necessary for 27 effective criminal justice policy development, jail population management, and 28 evaluation of sanctions and programs to hold offenders accountable; and 29 To facilitate efficient use of jail space by encouraging alternatives, where (5) 30 appropriate; and 31 To recommend expenditures from the crime prevention and control fund for which an appropriation of \$1.2 million is intended to be made in fiscal year 2006, 32 33 increasing to at least \$3.5 million per annum by fiscal year 2009.

Sec. 2-255.51. - Vacancies.

Any vacancy which occurs on the <u>crime prevention and control commission</u> Commission shall be filled in accordance with the provisions of section 2-255.49 and the new member so appointed to the <u>commission</u> Commission shall serve the un-expired term.

Sec. 2-255.52. - Compensation

The members shall serve without compensation; provided, however, that members of the Commission may be reimbursed for reasonable expenses incurred in performance of their duties pursuant to the rules and regulations of the city for such reimbursement.

Sec. 2-255.53. - Officers.

The crime prevention and control commission shall elect from its membership, a chairperson and such other officers as it may designate who shall serve for such term or terms as the commission shall specify and who may serve successive terms upon reelection by the commission. The chair shall serve a one (1) year term with a limit of two (2) successive terms.

Sec. 2-255.54<u>3</u>. - Meetings.

- (a) The schedule of regular meetings of the crime prevention and control commission

 Commission shall be established by a majority of the membership, but the

 commission must meet at least six (6) times annually.
- (b) Additional meetings shall be called as needed by the chair of the commission Commission.

Sec. 2-255.5<u>54</u>. - Powers and duties.

The purpose of the crime prevention and control commission Commission shall be to formulate and make recommendations to other agencies as provided in this section. Any such recommendation may be made either to criminal justice departments and agencies of the city itself, or to independent criminal justice agencies operating in the second judicial district pursuant to the authority of the state constitution or state laws; provided however, nothing in this division 11 shall be construed to affect in any way the authority of any state officer or agency to exercise the powers and duties vested in such officer or agency by state law. The powers and duties of the crime prevention and control commission Commission shall be as follows:

1 (a) To conduct analysis and strategic planning related to management of Denver's 2 criminal justice system, to promote accountability by criminal justice departments and agencies, and to develop performance measures and standards by which to 3 4 evaluate the performance of the commission itself; 5 (b) To facilitate development of a coordinated criminal justice system sanctioning 6 philosophy and policies, and monitor implementation of the philosophy and policies 7 by the departments and agencies responsible for administering the criminal justice 8 system in the City and County of Denver: 9 (c) To the extent permitted by state law, to collect and analyze data on the incidence 10 and nature of crime in Denver and assess the impact of criminal activities and 11 juvenile delinquency upon the residents of Denver;, including the extent to which 12 addressing behavioral health needs may affect those who become involved in the 13 justice system before, during and after systems' involvement; 14 (d) To establish a process by which to recommend funding support for programs 15 which includes monitoring the expenditures and available budget for the 16 Commission; 17 (d) Make recommendations to the mayor, the city council and other departments and 18 agencies regarding the distribution, expenditure, and management of any and all 19 monies appropriated from the Denver crime prevention and control fund, to 20 support criminal justice planning activities and use of evidence-based programs 21 and services to improve public safety: 22 (e) To undertake, on a continuing basis, an evaluation of the capacity and operations 23 of the criminal justice system by completing regular system mapping, analyzing 24 offender flow and "bed" usage, establishing projections to manage future space 25 needs and recommending policy to utilize scarce jail beds for the most serious 26 offenders and facilitating the development of a range of evidence-based sanctions 27 and programs that will reduce recidivism; 28 (f) To stimulate community interest and involvement in appropriately addressing 29 criminal justice and public safety problems; 30 (gf) To report annually by October July15 to the mayor and city council recommending

changes in policies and programs to reduce victimization, to promote data-guided

1		management, to help guide budgeting and administration, to diminish criminal
2		recidivism and to improve overall public safety. The annual report shall include a
3		detailed plan of recommended expenditures from the Denver crime prevention and
4		control fund for the following fiscal year. The report shall also include information
5		about the jail population by characteristics, length of stay, and offense, trends in
6		the jail population, comparative jail population and crime data, and other
7		appropriate measurements of how the criminal justice system is functioning;
8	(h)	To establish task forces or subcommittees to study in detail key aspects of policies
9		and programs within the scope of the criminal justice system;
10	(<u>ig</u>)	To seek federal grants and private sources of funding for innovative criminal
11		justice projects and programs;
12	(j h)	To promote cooperation, collaboration and shared responsibility among justice
13		system departments and agencies including but not limited to: programming, grant
14		writing, appropriations and budgeting and use of offender assessment systems to
15		guide the imposition or modification of sanctions;
16	(<u>ki</u>)	To seek public input regarding commission activities and citywide needs, including
17		at least one open public hearing meeting per year; all meetings are open to the
18		public.
19	(I)	To consider the impact on residential neighborhoods related to the release of
20		offenders into the community when formulating or recommending any alternatives
21		to incarceration, including but not limited to the expansion and concentration of
22		community corrections facilities; and
23	(m)	To foster innovation and alternatives in the criminal justice system and to provide
24		initial funding opportunities for projects that advance these ideals; and
25	<u>(n)</u>	To perform ongoing system data collection, to the extent permitted by state law
26		including, but not limited to:
27		(1) Researching the jail population, how it has changed, and the measures
28		needed for each individual to reduce repeat offense;
29		(2) Mapping the criminal justice system to identify decision points and timelines
30		for processing compared to appropriate performance standards; and

1	(3) Conducting an inventory of existing programs, whether programs address			
2		factors that research shows reduce offender recidivism, and the extent to			
3		which they follow evidenced-based practices.

5		of any monies in the fund. Any expenditure that is consistent with the				
6		commission's annual plan for expenditures from the fund, as required by section 2-				
7		255.55, shall be deemed to have received the recommendation of the commission				
8		without the necessity for further review by the commission. However, the				
9		expending authority of the Commission is authorized to approve payments of up to				
10		\$10,000 for expenditures that are consistent with the Commission's annual plan for
