15	Sec. 2-255.48 Legislative intent.				
16	The city council hereby declares that neighborhood safety, crime prevention, and control				
17	are major goals for the City and County of Denver. The legislative intent of this division is to				
18	implement an evidence-based, accountable, and efficient public safety strategy to reduce crime				
19	and including juvenile delinquency and to increase neighborhood safety. To that end, the council				
20		a crime prevention and control commission Crime Prevention and Control Commissio	n

1 Sec. 2-255.49. - Commission created.

There is hereby created a crime prevention and control commission <u>Crime Prevention and</u> <u>Control Commission, hereinafter referred to as Commission</u>. The members of the commission <u>Commission</u> should reflect the diversity of Denver, including the ethnic, racial, and geographic constitution of the population as well as the diverse professional backgrounds, experience, and expertise of the citizens of Denver. The commission <u>Commission</u> shall consist of thirty-one thirtythree (343) members as follows:

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(a) The following twelve <u>fifteen</u> (125) officers or the officer's designated representative:

9	(1) The mayor.
10	(2) The manager of human services.
11	(3) The manager of safety.

25	(a)	The appointed members of the crime prevention and control commission		
26		<u>Commission</u> shall serve for a period of three (3) years to be staggered by appointing		
27		one third of the initial non-designated membership for three-year terms, another		
28		third for two years, and the remaining third for one year. Initial terms shall be set by		
29		the appointing authority.		
30	(b) Commissioners may be reappointed for successive terms.

1 Sec. 2-255.51. - Vacancies.

Any vacancy which occurs on the crime prevention and control commission <u>Commission</u> shall be filled in accordance with the provisions of section 2-255.49 and the new member so appointed to the commission <u>Commission</u> shall serve the un-expired term.

5 Sec. 2-255.52. - Compensation

6 The members shall serve without compensation; provided, however, that members of the 7 Commission may be reimbursed for reasonable expenses incurred in performance of their duties 8 pursuant to the rules and regulations of the city for such reimbursement.

9 Sec. 2-255.53. - Officers.

10 The crime prevention and control commission shall elect from its membership, a chairperson 11 and such other officers as it may designate who shall serve for such term or terms as the 12 commission shall specify and who may serve successive terms upon reelection by the commission. 13 The chair shall serve a one (1) year term with a limit of two (2) successive terms.

14 Sec. 2-255.54<u>3</u>. - Meetings.

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- 15 (a) The schedule of regular meetings of the crime prevention and control commission
 16 <u>Commission</u> shall be established by a majority of the membership, but the
 17 commission must meet at least six (6) times annually.
 - (b) Additional meetings shall be called as needed by the chair of the commission Commission.
- 20 Sec. 2-255.554. Powers and duties.

21 The purpose of the crime prevention and control commission Commission shall be to 22 formulate and make recommendations to other agencies as provided in this section. Any such 23 recommendation may be made either to criminal justice departments and agencies of the city itself, 24 or to independent criminal justice agencies operating in the second judicial district pursuant to the 25 authority of the state constitution or state laws; provided however, nothing in this division 11 shall 26 be construed to affect in any way the authority of any state officer or agency to exercise the powers 27 and duties vested in such officer or agency by state law. The powers and duties of the crime 28 prevention and control commission Commission shall be as follows:

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- 1 (a) To conduct analysis and strategic planning related to management of Denver's 2 criminal justice system, to promote accountability by criminal justice departments 3 and agencies, and to develop performance measures and standards by which to 4 evaluate the performance of the commission itself;
- 5 (b) To facilitate development of a coordinated criminal justice system sanctioning 6 philosophy and policies, and monitor implementation of the philosophy and policies 7 by the departments and agencies responsible for administering the criminal justice 8 system in the City and County of Denver;
- 9 (c) To the extent permitted by state law, to collect and analyze data on the incidence 10 and nature of crime in Denver and assess the impact of criminal activities <u>and</u> 11 <u>juvenile delinquency</u> upon the residents of Denver; <u>including the extent to which</u> 12 <u>addressing behavioral health needs may affect those who become involved in the</u> 13 <u>justice system before, during and after systems' involvement;</u>
- 14(d)To establish a process by which to recommend funding support for programs which15includes monitoring the expenditures and available budget for the Commission, and16advising the mayor, city council and other departments or agencies on the17continuation or termination of programs;
- 18 (de) Make recommendations to the mayor, the city council and other departments and
 19 agencies through the expending authority regarding the distribution, expenditure,
 20 and management of any and all monies appropriated from the Denver e<u>C</u>rime
 21 <u>pP</u>revention and e<u>C</u>ontrol fund, to support criminal justice planning activities and
 22 use of evidence-based programs and services to improve public safety;
- 23(ef)To undertake, on a continuing basis, an evaluation of the capacity and operations24of the criminal justice system by completing regular system mapping, analyzing25offender flow and "bed" usage, establishing projections to manage future space26needs and recommending policy to utilize scarce jail beds for the most serious27offenders and facilitating the development of a range of evidence-based sanctions28and programs that will reduce recidivism;
- 29 (f) To stimulate community interest and involvement in appropriately addressing
 30 criminal justice and public safety problems;

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- 1 (g) To report annually by October July15 to the mayor and city council recommending 2 changes in policies and programs to reduce victimization, to promote data-guided 3 management, to help guide budgeting and administration, to diminish criminal recidivism and to improve overall public safety. The annual report shall include a 4 detailed plan of recommended expenditures from the Denver crime prevention and 5 control fund for the following fiscal year. The report shall also include information 6 7 about the jail population by characteristics, length of stay, and offense, trends in the 8 jail population, comparative jail population and crime data, and other appropriate 9 measurements of how the criminal justice system is functioning;
- 10 (h) To establish task forces or subcommittees to study in detail key aspects of policies
 11 and programs within the scope of the criminal justice system;
- 12 (ih) To seek federal grants and private sources of funding for innovative criminal justice
 13 projects and programs;
- 14 (ji) To promote cooperation, collaboration and shared responsibility among justice 15 system departments and agencies including but not limited to: programming, grant 16 writing, appropriations and budgeting and use of offender assessment systems to 17 guide the imposition or modification of sanctions;
- 18 (ki) To seek public input regarding commission activities and citywide needs, including
 19 at least one open public hearing per year; all meetings are open to the public;
- 20(Ik)To consider the impact on residential neighborhoods related to the release of21offenders into the community when formulating or recommending any alternatives22to incarceration, including but not limited to the expansion and concentration of23community corrections facilities; and
- 24 (I) <u>To foster innovation and alternatives in the criminal justice system and to provide</u>
 25 <u>initial funding opportunities for projects that advance these ideals; and</u>
- 26 (m) To perform ongoing system data collection, to the extent permitted by state law
 27 including, but not limited to:
- (1) Researching the jail population, how it has changed, and the measures
 needed for each individual to reduce repeat offense;
- 30(2)Mapping the criminal justice system to identify decision points and timelines31for processing compared to appropriate performance standards; and

- (3) Conducting an inventory of existing programs, whether programs address
 factors that research shows reduce offender recidivism, and the extent to
 which they follow evidenced-based practices.
- 4 (n) As appropriate, the crime prevention and control commission <u>Commission</u> will work
 5 with judicial officers in an advisory capacity.

6 Sec. 2-255.565. - Procedures.

The <u>eCommission</u> is authorized to <u>will establish and</u> adopt bylaws and internal guidelines
governing its operations, <u>including duties and responsibilities of the Commission's leadership</u>, and
to <u>will</u> promulgate rules and regulations as necessary to achieve the purposes of this division.

10 Sec. 2-255.56. – Crime Prevention and Control Fund created.

11 <u>There is hereby created a Crime Prevention and Control fund, hereinafter Fund, for the</u> 12 <u>purpose of implementing recommendations from the Commission, receiving revenue and making</u> 13 <u>transactions per said recommendations.</u>

14 Sec. 2-255.57. - Staffing and administrative support.

15 Staffing and other administrative support for the crime prevention and control commission 16 Commission shall be provided by the department of human services <u>Department of Public Health</u> 17 <u>and Environment</u>. The manager of human services shall appoint an executive director for the 18 commission, after consultation with the commission. The executive director shall not be removed 19 unless and until the manager consults with the commission regarding the removal.

- 20 Sec. 2-255.58. Relation to city departments, agencies and expending authorities.
- (a) Departments and agencies of the city responsible for administering the criminal
 justice system and related services shall cooperate with the crime prevention and
 control commission Commission to support the purpose of this division.
- (b) No expending authority shall make any expenditure from the crime prevention and control fund. Fund unless and until the commission Commission is consulted on the expenditure and afforded an opportunity to review the proposed expenditure and make a recommendation to the expending authority prior to the disbursement of any monies in the fund. Any expenditure that is consistent with the commission's annual

1	plan for expenditures from the fund, as required by section 2-255.55, shall be					
2	deemed to have received the recommendation of the commission without the					
3	necessit	for further review by the commise	sion. However, the expending authority			
4	of the C	commission is authorized to app	rove payments of up to \$10,000 for
