

The DHS Mill Levy Program manages taxpayer funds dedicated to services for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD) in Denver.



Mill Levy Advisory Council Timeline

November 2018: Request for Information January 2019: First advisory council meeting April/ May 2019: DHS investigation of recommendations

October 2018: <u>DHS Needs</u> <u>Assessment</u> December 2018: Appointed advisory council members

April 2019: First recommendations to DHS for review June 2019: Draft Request for Proposal



Advisory Council Meetings

7 advisory council meetings convened from Jan – June 2019 with 25+ guests

Meetings are open to the community and include a public comment period

- Outreach via DHS website, social media, email, community meetings





Mill Levy Advisory Council Priorities

- Greater understanding of the mill levy
- Cultural sensitivity and inclusion
- Communications and outreach

Current priorities to be explored:

- Affordable housing
- Transitions services
- Mental health



Leading the Way

From the Boulder County Needs Assessment report, Nov. 2018:

Mill Levy Accountability and Reporting

The recommendations that follow are based on best practices implemented in Denver following their audit, and seek to protect Boulder County, grantees receiving dollars from the Mill Levy, and most importantly individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities being served by these tax dollars. These recommendations seek to ensure that funds continue to support and meet the needs of Boulder residents with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

First in the state to shift I/DD mill levy funding practices:

- Community Centered Board contract on 100% <u>reimbursement</u> basis
- Community feedback informs programming of taxpayer funds
- Boosting transparency and understanding of mill levy funded services



Looking to the Future

 How can we best use mill levy funds to serve Denver residents with intellectual and developmental disabilities and their families?



1. Equity & Access

Ensure every individual in Denver has access to the support that they need to live a healthy and high quality life.

- What opportunities are there to make a lasting impact?
- How will we continue to engage the community and stay connected to residents with I/DD to inform projects funded by mill levy dollars?



2. Safety & Wellness

Support and advance sustainable health, wellness, and safety outcomes for the community.

3. Connectivity

Increase connectivity as a department to improve community partnerships, reduce internal silos, and work collaboratively with city and state partners.

Denver Residency Guidelines


- Informed by D.R.M.C. § 53-550 (c) and Medical Services Board Rule 8.607.1(F)
- Denver's City and County limits are the same; however, a person could have a Denver mailing address and not be a Denver resident, or vice versa. DHS primarily uses the Assessor's Office property records to determine residency.
- DHS has provided guidance for mill levy funded services that may result in **indirect** or **spillover** benefits, as well as transition of services (90 days).
- Children with I/DD in DHS custody are considered Denver residents regardless of their current placement.





Projected Funding Available (2018 to 2020)

\$20 Million *Preliminary certified assessed valuation data will be available from the City Assessor's Office in August or September.

Needs Assessment: First Tier Recommendations



DHS should establish a formal structure like an advisory council to help disburse dedicated mill levy revenue.



DHS should explore ways to relieve the burden of housing costs for Denver residents with I/DD and providers who otherwise cannot afford to live in Denver.

DHS should encourage the employment of people with I/DD in Denver.

DHS should focus on addressing the needs of those on the waiting list for services.



DHS should develop resources to support transitions to adulthood for people with I/DD.



DHS should enhance the capacity to provide mental health services for people with I/DD who also have a mental health diagnosis.



Percent of all respondents indicating an issue was a "Big Problem"






Biggest Problems by Respondent
