## **General Vacation information**

What is a vacation

 A vacation is the release of Public Right of Way, when the City and County of Denver deems it is no longer necessary.

What is the vacation process

- Once the request is received it goes through a 3 week review to any where between 30-39 agencies, internal and external
- Once all comments received have been approved, it goes through a 21 day public notification period, where signs are posted by the requestor, and letters are sent to all adjacent landowners and RNO's within 200 feet of the vacation area

## **Protests**

- If no protests are received, it moves to City Council for final approval.
- If protests are received, the City reviews each one to determine if they have technical merit.
  - If they do not, it moves to council
  - If they do, we put the requestor in touch with the protestor to resolve the issues

What is Technical Merit

The City of Denver holds in Trust certain pieces of property
which are dedicated as Right of Way's for Transportation and
Utility needs. When a request to vacate a Right of Way is
made, a review is completed to determine if the required utility
and transportation needs can be met without this piece of
property being a dedicated Right of Way



## **General Vacation information**

Cost for a Public Right of Way Vacation

- Initial Review fee \$1000.00
- Legal description review fee \$300.00
- Ordinance request fee \$300.00
- Total \$1600.00

In the past 5 years we have had the following amount of vacation projects

- 2019 8
- 2018 17
- 2017 22
- 2016 32
- 2015 23

And in these past 5 years, the number of project that received protests are as follows:

- 2019 1
- 2018 2
- 2017 6
- 2016 7
- 2015 2

Of the projects with protests, all but 3 have passed council. The other 3 are still being resolved

## 2099 Chestnut PI Vacation Request

- Original request was July 24, 2017
- Revised request was June 28, 2018 addressing reviewer comments
- Public Notification May 17, 2019 signs were posted and letters sent
- Public notification ended June 6, 2019
- 42 protests were received
- All 42 protests were deemed to lack technical merit
- Lack of merit emails were sent to the 42 protestors on July 22, 2019
