

- DPS provides onsite training and support so teachers and community members can learn how to use and implement restorative approaches across the ECE-12 spectrum.

De-escalation strategies

formal training for teachers on: "How do you deescalate situations so that you don't even have to go down the path DPS recognized from its data that, especially for children of color, suspensions are for defiance or disrespect that of thinking about needing a suspension or an expulsion for your kids?" get on teachers' nerves rather than more objective offenses like drug distribution or vandalism. DPS provides

School culture

- DPS suggests that a restorative school culture is the most important research-based strategy to use that has social and emotional scope and sequence for the entire year. Teachers must be helped to understand how to teach appropriate emotional expression and emotional regulation for the specific students they are teaching
- Eliminated the use of suspension and expulsion for students ages three through nine except for extreme safety
- In the first full year of implementation out-of-school suspensions for ECE-3rd graders dropped over 60%.



Policy Changes – Restraint and Handcuff Use

- Handcuffs are prohibited for use on students 5th grade and under
- Clarification on emergency exception for use of handcuffs on middle and high school students
- Clarification on roles and responsibilities for notification to Denver Police when handcuffs are used

Formalized process for notification to principal and parents when hold, restraint, or handcuffs are used

- Additional training for all Department of Safety Staff in the following topics:
- Foundational Bias
- Non Violent Crisis Intervention
- Trauma Informed Practices
- Behavior Barriers
- Restraint Policy
- Development of a Safety Data Dashboard
- Over \$1M investment into social and emotional learning supports for students in Affective Needs Centers
- Clarification of expectations with schools on appropriate use of DPS Safety and Denver Police resources
