



When Will The Law Apply?

Qualifying emergencies include

- A state or local disaster or emergency declared by the Mayor, City Council President or a public health order issued by the Executive Director of the Denver Department of Public Health and Environment.
- Other situations that clearly threaten public health or life that are described in a written request to the Mayor, City Council President or the Executive Director of the Denver Department of Public Health and Environment.

⁽c) Hearings are only proceeding with an applicant's written consent and signed waiver.



Proposed Stakeholder Outreach

- Councilmember Interviews
- Create a survey to go out to city residents at large: via listservs, newsletters, social media



- 6-part affinity group process, 2-hour targeted session per group
 - 1) Developer, business owners, others affected by Quasi-judicial hearings
 - 2) Disability groups with access problems to technology; unhoused, hearing/sight issues, language access issues
 - 3) Parents with availability, childcare, transportation issues in order to get to the meetings
 - 4) City staff who must be at meetings on different days/times
 - 5) Boards & Commissions members
 - 6) RNO's

Strengths


- Increased accessibility to citizens.
