




Agency Structure






Key Strategic Metrics

The Denver Recycles Team transitioned out of the DOITI GF budget into CASR. Now the CASR Resource Management Team, this unit will continue to promote waste diversion, composting and recycling, as well as circular economy and natural resources.

The oversight and implementation of the Bring Your Own Bag (Fee on Disposable Bags) moved from DOTI to CASR. This Fiscal Administrator position has been filled and is being transferred to CASR GF budget in 2022.



Business & Non-Profit Neighborhood Engagement

The Certifiably Green Denver (CGD) program administration is being restructured along with a neighborhood liaison position to assure recovery efforts are focused in NEST neighborhoods and minority- and women-owned businesses. \$100,000 is earmarked for projects to improve energy efficiency and sustainability for the target businesses.

The two positions were restored in 2021 using ARPA funds, and moved to the General Fund for 2022.



Benchmarking Program

The Benchmarking Ordinance requires owners of buildings 25,000 SF and larger to report building energy performance each year. In years 2017-2021, the required compliance program was funded by a grant that is expiring in 2021. This expansion provides the base funding required to enforce the ordinance.




Leading with Equity

There are significant inequities in who is most impacted by climate change.

Examples of CASR's Equity Metrics

- Reduced household costs for energy or transportation
- Reduced exposure to air pollution, such as particulate matter and nitrogen oxides
- Percent of budget benefitting disproportionately impacted communities
- Increased access to good green jobs
- Number of disproportionately impacted people with increased access to and influence on public decision making for air quality, energy and climate policy and regulation


