Working Groups – Subject Matter Experts





The City has dedicated substantial time and resources to evaluate 112 community-driven recommendations for potential adoption.





Part II: Review Timeline

Phase 1

May 2021:

- Received recommendations (recs)
- Met with task force members

June 2021:

- Developed structure and processes
- Launched citywide review

July 2021:

- Established working groups and executive branch meetings
- Compiled clarifying questions

Aug. 2021:

- Sent questions to task force liaison

Phase 2

August 2021:

- Paused assessment of recs awaiting task force response
- Identified recs already implemented
- Validated prior implementation
- Identified 1st batch of recs to assess
- Assigned recs to working groups

Sept./Oct. 2021:

- Ongoing assessment of 1st batch of recs

Oct. 2021:

- Received responses to questions
- Met with task force members

Phase 3

Nov./Dec. 2021:

- Launch public-facing dashboard
- Launch community resource map
- Complete 1st batch of assessments
- Update stakeholders

Jan. 2022 - Ongoing:

- Continue rec assessment and cross-agency coordination
- Ongoing dashboard updates
- Ongoing stakeholder updates
- Complete rec review by June (*goal*)
- Ongoing implementation (as applicable)

On-line, public-facing communication tool

- ✓ Will be available at www.denvergov.org/safety
- ✓ Will be updated monthly
- ✓ Will reflect review status for each recommendation
- ✓ Will reflect the outcome of rec assessments
- ✓ Will include supportive documentation

User-friendly "hub" with contextual information

- ✓ Dashboard can be sorted by the public
- ✓ Searchable by recommendation number or category
- ✓ Identifies the lead agency and response type
- ✓ Includes links and supportive documentation

Part III: Review Outcomes

Strategy 1 – Empower with Resources

Recommendation: 4

- *“Decentralize trauma-informed referral sources to enable community to help each other rather than having to call police or wait for business hours of a single entity (e.g. motel vouchers, etc.)”*

Status: Previously Implemented, Will Expand

Response Highlights:

- Access to resources currently de-centralized and available via varied methods
- Cross-function teams exist for needs assessment and case management
- Will add Community Navigators/Liaisons to assessment & case management teams
- Will incorporate interactive resource map tool to increase access and awareness
- Will expand use of standard contracting language requiring trauma-informed standard of care by vendors/non-City resources

Part III: Recommendation Outcomes

Strategy 2 – Minimize Unnecessary Interaction

Recommendation: 50

- *“Create an app to access alternatives for behavioral health crises”*

Status: Will Implement

Response Highlights:

- Requests for Web-based, centralized resource lists
- In-Process rollout of mapping tool
- Integration of city- and community-based resources
- Expandable and customizable to fill gaps

Part III: Recommendation Outcome

Strategy 3 – Support Successful Reentry

Recommendation: 71

- *“Provide pre-release services to stabilize people with mental illness before transitioning them to wrap-around community-based care”*

Status: Previously Implemented

Response Highlights:

- Treatment options: Men’s and Women’s Mental Health Transition Unit; High Acuity Transition Unit; Psychiatry Services; Individual therapy; Social work services
- Competency Services: Denver Sheriff Restoration and Transition Unit; Competency Enhancement Program (JBBS grant)
- Substance Misuse Services: Recovery in Secure Environment Program; Medication Assisted Treatment Program
- Re-entry services: Presentence Reentry Coordinator Program; Mental Health Center of Denver Behavioral Health Navigator; The Wellness Program; The Frequent User Service Enhancement Program; Second Chance Center

Part III: Recommendation Outcome

Strategy 4 – Heal the Community

Recommendation: 82

- *“Prioritize family unification for children separated from parents/guardians by allowing persons-involved to choose whose care they are placed in”*

Status: Previously Implemented

Response Highlights:

- Denver Child Welfare and DPD’s Missing and Exploited Persons Unit collaboration + joint assessments / investigations
- DPD calls Child Welfare hotline when a parent is taken into custody or other instances where a temporary change in caregiver is needed
- Background check of parent-identified preference for caregiver
- Protocols written into DPD policies and training materials

Part III: Recommendation Outcome

Strategy 5 – Public Safety Policy

Recommendation: 93

- *“Mandate “duty to intervene” & report in all Use of Force cases that extends liability to law enforcement who fail to intervene”*


Status: Previously Implemented

Response Highlights:

- The Law Enforcement Integrity and Accountability Act requires this
- DPD and DSD policies and procedures require this and train officers and deputies on these requirements
- DPD and DSD both participants in nationally endorsed Active Bystandership for Law Enforcement Program requiring policy standards and community endorsement
- Program modernizes Department culture and teaches skills both to intervene and receive interventions for any type of misconduct, regardless of rank
