Executive Summary with Rationale and Impact:

Detailed description of the item and why we are doing it. This can be a separate attachment. This proposed addition to the DRMC would recognize Juneteenth (June 19th) as an official city holiday/paid holiday for city employees, beginning in 2023. In 2021, Mayor Hancock and CM Herndon advanced a bill designating the Saturday closest to June 19th as a "commemorative" holiday for the City of Denver. Following that action, the Federal government and the State of Colorado have moved to make Juneteenth a formal holiday, as have several peer cities and neighboring jurisdictions. As required by Charter, Office of Human Resources determined the "generally prevailing" practice around city holidays through a survey and have recommended the addition of this holiday. This bill adds Juneteenth to the current list of city holidays, making this the 12th paid holiday. The bill also repeals the designation of Juneteenth as a commemorative holiday to make clear the holiday is now formal.

Juneteenth recognizes the end of slavery in the United States and has been celebrated in Denver since 1953, where the first events were held in Denver's historic Five Points neighborhood.
